## Myths of the Charity Raffle

We do not want to raise money for the State Council: The money that goes to the State Council pays \$30,000 for the prizes, printing, and incentives that go back to your council. The total is about 15% of the state's share of the raffle. The State Council uses the other 35% to support state-wide 501c3 projects. A win-win for both.

We do local events to raise money for our charity: If you figure the man hours needed to conduct a Pancake Breakfast or Fish Fry use that energy to sell tickets and you will earn a lot more for your charity. Doing both is even better.

Some Raffle Chairman tell me they are retired so they have time to put together the letters, separate and stamp the tickets, and sell most of the tickets: In addition to supporting charities, it is just as important for all Knights to have an opportunity to participate in a very successful project even if they cannot attend meetings. Use your energy to figure out ways for the council to sell more tickets.

**I cannot afford \$60 to buy the three books of ticket that you give me**: If you know three people that are Catholic ask them to buy a book of tickets from you. You sold your three books and it did not cost you anything except your time.

I do not want to give all our members tickets because someone sent them back unsold last year. Really, how many sold or bought them that never attend a meeting?

I do not think we should waste our time giving tickets to all our members [a lot of our members are old and cannot afford them]: Every once in a while, the news has a story about someone that everybody thought was poor, died and gave \$1 million dollars to take care of cats, dogs, or a university. How do you know what everyone in your council is worth or thinks is important?

**I do not believe in raffles:** That is an easy one. Mark the memo line on the check "DONATION" and return blank tickets.

**Yes, but if I am going to donate, I will give it to the charity directly:** Good, do that. Keep in mind the lesson of the 1<sup>st</sup> Degree is Charity. Give an equal amount to your council. You will help your council raise money so they can reach a goal that will earn them an incentive.

We are a small council so we cannot compete with large councils: Our data shows that small councils sell more raffle tickets per member than large councils.

The poster has 30 tickets for \$100 [Century Sale]. I do not think anyone will give us that much money. In 2019 there were 532 Century Sales for \$54,530. They were not all members; some were people other than Knights.

**How much does the Charity Raffle really earn for charity?** From 2004 to 21019 the total for charity without expenses was \$3,476,571.
