And they hoped that if they could simply stay afloat a little longer, someone would reach down and rescue them again. Yet those in the first tub had never known hope. And because they had never seen hope materialize in the past, they simply gave up!

As we look into God's Word to see what our hope should really be, we're immediately drawn to Hebrews 11:1, which says, *"Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see."* Here we see that the biblical idea of hope is very closely tied to the concept of faith.
