Dr. Brent Gibson, a board-certified physician executive, is the founding principal of Avocet Enterprises, a health services consulting firm that specializes in improving healthcare delivery for vulnerable populations, particularly those in correctional environments like jails and prisons. As an Army Veteran with over a dozen years of senior leadership experience in both not-for-profit and for-profit sectors, 15 years of public health and health leadership experience, and 20 years as a licensed physician, Dr. Gibson brings a wealth of expertise to the healthcare industry. He has published extensively, with 110 professional publications and presentations.

In his prior role at the National Commission for Correctional Health Care (NCCHC), Dr. Gibson served as both Chief Health Officer and Managing Director of NCCHC Resources, Inc. He was responsible for strategic oversight, advising the CEO and the Board of Directors, and leading the development of clinical standards that shaped correctional healthcare nationwide. His leadership at NCCHC Resources, Inc. resulted in an innovative continuous quality improvement initiative that enhanced healthcare programs across correctional facilities. As a General Medical Officer and Occupational Medicine Specialist, he served in various academic and garrison roles, including as the installation medical authority at a major chemical weapons depot. His public health background is reinforced by a graduate degree and residency completed during his active-duty service.

Beyond his professional career, Dr. Gibson is dedicated to giving back to the community.
