

GHA's Leapfrog Innovation in Whole Person Care

We are thrilled to announce that we have just launched an intelligent technology approach at Morrow Valley Farmstead to provide a personalized journey beyond staff being "always-on" fall detection and alerts to ensure immediate response, to predicting and minimizing fall risk. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), falls and fall injury are a risk of the elderly population. However, Individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder are more at risk of falling and getting injured than their non-ASD peers. This multi-faceted vulnerability follows individuals with ASD throughout their lifetime. One can imagine that technology for fall detection designed for the elderly, which has existed for some time, would easily help GHA support staff overcome these challenges. GHA's approach strives to minimize the fall risk and prevent it, not just detect falls. GHA professionals realized early on that the same technology innovation would likely be a good fit for the individuals that the organization supports.

The GHA Team embarked on a journey in search for innovation, specifically searching for a partner who shares in GHA's organizational

Braswell Trust & Landfall Foundation Award More Than \$70,000 for Stanly and New Hanover County Programs

We are excited to announce we received funding from the James R. and Bonnie L Braswell Trust (\$65,000) and The Landfall Foundation (\$5,400) for the purchase of iPads and iPad Medical Rolling Kiosks to be used at our residential and day services programs in Stanly and New Hanover Counties. We currently use Therap Services, an electronic records platform, for health records, consent forms, billing, communications, etc. Adding iPads will allow staff to administer medications in a time-sorted method to prevent errors. In addition, the iPads at all sites will allow for caregivers to move about freely while providing care, thus making those we serve more comfortable in their settings. We have also received funding for QliqSOFT software that enables HIPAA-compliant secure texting for all devices to be accessed anywhere, allowing for encrypted, secure communication at all times. Qligsoft Secure Texting can help enable safe, quick, HIPPA-compliant communication from any device between GHA care team members, physicians, and even families/guardians. QliqSOFT has been



installed on program devices and personal devices for management staff. Staff are busy preparing medical IT equipment for installation and training for staff members. We are so appreciative of both the Braswell Trust and Landfall Foundation for providing funds to purchase needed equipment providing a platform for all staff to enter records securely reducing our risk management and increasing quality assurance.

Autism and the Holidays

Helpful Tips from GHA Autism Supports

The holidays are a time for family and fun, but can also bring stress for individuals with autism. There often are changes in routines, extra people, transitions, noises, smells, etc. Some planning and preparation tips can help ease the tension:

- Maintain typical routines when possible such as morning and bedtime schedules;
- Ensure favored items and sensory supports are readily available and have backups;
- Make plans to accommodate food preferences amongst the special holiday meal;
- If unlimited access to all the special food is an issue, plan for ways to limit access such as setting up in the opposite end of the house, being outside versus inside if weather permits, or placing the food in a contained area;
- Have chargers, backup batteries, wifi access, downloads, etc. for electronics;
- Find a quiet space away from people and festivities to reduce overstimulation;
- Keep holiday expectations realistic for the individual with autism even if that includes shorter visits or fewer activities;
- Have a quick escape plan in case things become chaotic or overwhelming;
- Look at your holiday plans through the eyes of your loved one with autism and incorporate what's meaningful to them to make it a happy holiday for everyone!

For Quality Management, Gathering Survey Data is Just the Beginning!

Each year, Quality Management surveys all individuals GHA supports to be sure they are happy with their daily lives and satisfied with their services. Surveys are available in different formats including a written survey and a picture survey. Working with Residence Managers, Quality Management tries to match the survey format with the communication needs of each individual. Some individuals complete the form independently while other individuals receive staff assistance, as needed.

Thirty-seven individuals responded to the written format. Six questions with Yes/No answers were presented. For the written format, answering patterns showed positive responses to all survey questions and a very high level of happiness and satisfaction. A summary is shown in Table 1.

Survey Questions: Written Format	Yes	% Yes	No	% No

Do you feel safe almost all the time?	37	100%	0	0%
Do you know who to tell if someone is mean to you? If so, who?	37	100%	0	0%
As a result of services with GHA, is your life better?	34	100%	0	0%
Overall, are you happy with your life?	37	100%	0	0%

Sixty-three individuals responded to three questions using the picture format. Respondents answered by pointing to an emoji depicting very happy, happy, sad or very sad. A more varied pattern emerged from the answers obtained using the picture survey format. Table 2 summarizes these responses.

After gathering all the survey data, Quality Management's process does not stop. The Department reinterviews individuals who report an aspect of their lives which needs attention. Every year follow-ups are completed and, if needed, GHA's Clinical Team provides support. Quality Management not only identifies situations which can be improved but also helps create improvement plans.

Navigating Medicaid Transformation

Tailored Plans are North Carolina's planned Medicaid health plans for recipients with Intellectual/Developmental Disabilities and other significant behavior health conditions. Tailored Plans will provide coordinated care management, physical health, pharmacy, and behavior health services. This involves transitioning from fee-for-service health insurance run by the state to integrated Managed Care Organization health plans with care management. There have been several transition challenges related to Medicaid Transformation. To ensure beneficiaries can seamlessly receive care, the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services has delayed the implementation of NC's Tailored Plans several times, with plans to proceed at a date yet to be determined. Beneficiaries who will be covered by the Tailored Plans, including most of those whom GHA Autism Supports serves, will continue to receive care as they do today. It is a GHA priority to navigate Medicaid Transformation to ensure whole-person care and quality health outcomes for the individuals we support.
