Speaking from the Heart--The Southerland Family Shares Their Journey

What better way to make us all aware of autism than to share the story of Thomas Calvin, the oldest of two boys of Thomas and Marie Southerland of Lumberton, North Carolina. Mr. and Mrs. Southerland resided in Queens, New York where both Thomas Calvin and his younger brother Shaun were born just 21-months apart. At 2 years of age, Mr. & Mrs. Southerland noticed that their beautiful son Thomas Calvin had difficulty making eye contact or following voices and other objects of interest. Initially, doctors assured them that nothing was wrong. By 4 years of age, they observed very little developmental improvements including limited language and lack of engaged play with others.

Shortly thereafter in 1978, the family relocated to North Carolina in hopes of securing more resources to assist Thomas Calvin. Initially, the family learned that an autism diagnosis might be on the horizon at a diagnostic center in Florence, South Carolina. Shortly thereafter, the family learned of his official diagnosis of autism with some degree of intellectual disability at the Developmental Evaluation Center in Fayetteville, North Carolina.

In 1980, Thomas Calvin was enrolled in the public school system in Lumberton, where school officials maintained that he needed to be "mainstreamed" in a regular classroom setting, a plan that proved to be unsuccessful. A TEACCH therapist advocated for the family that led to the school system providing a one-on-one teacher for Thomas Calvin.

While attending the Autism Society of North Carolina's Annual Conference in October of 1984, Mr. and Mrs. Southerland encountered Dr. Tom Mates from the Wilmington TEACCH program who informed them of a vacancy in a new children's residential program in Albemarle. After countless conversations and visits, Thomas Calvin moved into the GHA children's home in February of 1985, his new home for the next 2 1/2 years. He briefly aged out of the children's home, and spent the interim period back in Lumberton with his Mom and Dad and in a residential home in Greensboro, before returning to the Thompson Home, a new GHA adolescent home, in August of 1989. "While at GHA Autism Supports, Thomas Calvin's progress has grown exponentially. Dawn Allen and her staff have more than provided aid and support for Thomas, but they have been therapeutic for the entire family."

According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, studies have demonstrated that individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder exhibit habits that put them more at risk for tooth decay and cavities (Sheller, 2018). Most recently, GHA Autism Supports has partnered with the associates at Locust Pediatric Dentistry to provide dental care to many of the residents in Stanly County. The entire staff has worked closely with GHA clinicians to block off several dedicated hours to see the individuals supported by GHA. The plan has eased transitions



Medicaid Transformation—Keeping You In the Know

Medicaid Managed Care transformation efforts have restarted. Standard Plans are scheduled to go live July 1, 2021, while Behavioral Health I/DD Tailored Plans are scheduled to launch on July 1, 2022. Medicaid currently operates under a fee-for-service model, but will transition to Managed Care. Under Managed Care, the State will contract with insurance companies which are paid a predetermined rate to provide all the services that a person needs. Medicaid will change to Standard Plans for many individuals, such as low-income beneficiaries, in July, 2021. Individuals with Intellectual or Developmental disabilities, such as the individuals served by GHA

Autism Supports, will transition to Tailored Plans July 1, 2022. The intent of Transformation is to provide more "whole-person" care that includes physical and behavioral health in a cost-effective way. As Medicaid Transformation progresses, GHA will strive to keep you informed about any changes that may impact your loved one's care.


room and restrooms looking spic and span every shift. Congrats Stephen!

Many agencies are interested in this information, including the US Census Bureau, Autism Society of North Carolina, as well as all of the organizations receiving our charitable requests and grant submissions. Our most important reason for keeping track of so many variables is being able to understand more about the individuals we support.

Interesting facts:

- On March 30, 2021, GHA supported 93 individuals: 25 females and 68 males
- If we classify by race, there were 13 African American, 77 White, 2 Multi-racial and 1 Asian American.
