From the Pastor

As most of you are aware, Mary and I recently enjoyed a two-week vacation driving the Blue Ridge Parkway. This trip, in at least one significant way, was like no other vacation that I have ever taken – and that caused some anxiety for me.

On every other vacation we have taken I have planned ahead and reserved a place for us to stay every night of our trip, be it a friend's home, a hotel or a campground. This time I made a few reservations early in the trip (for nights 2, 3, 4 and 5 with a good idea where we would spend night 1). From that point on our decision was to “play it by ear.” We would see what the weather was like, how far we felt like driving, and what attractions might interest us before deciding where to spend the night. On a couple occasions we just stopped for the evening and walked up to the registration desk hoping they might have a room available. In a sense we went wherever the spirit moved us – and it was good. (Not once did we end up sleeping in the car!)

Going where the spirit leads....

That's been one of the recurring themes in the Book of Acts that we've been studying on Tuesday evenings. The first lesson from this past Sunday (6th Sunday of Easter) is a prime example.

⁹During the night Paul had a vision: there stood a man of Macedonia pleading with him and saying, “Come over to Macedonia and help us.” ¹⁰When he had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them. (Acts 16:9-10)

Paul had a plan. He was on his way through gentile territory to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ. Then he had a vision. The Holy Spirit intervened and told him to go to Macedonia. And so Paul and his compatriots detoured to Macedonia and proclaimed the good news.

Not that I would advocate doing anything important without some plan, but I think it's also important to be willing to go where the Spirit moves us. It is important to take the time to listen to the voice of God, which can come to us in subtle, and sometimes not-so-subtle ways. It is important for us, as individuals and as congregations, to keep our minds and hearts open to the Spirit which can lead us to unexpected places to be the presence of God where it is needed.

And so I invite you to have a plan for what you can be and do in God's mission. But I also encourage you to be open to the calling of the Spirit and to go where the Spirit sends you.

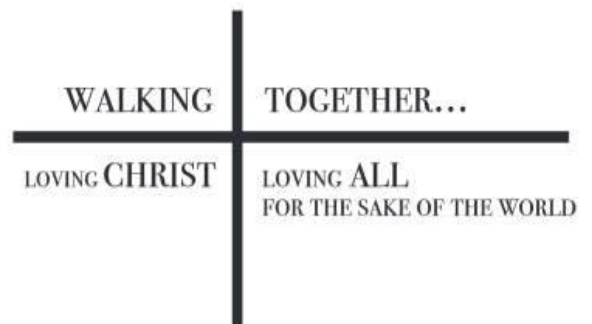
