From the Pastor

As we near the end of June I'm sure that many of you are wondering when we might be able to meet again. It is a question that occupies my thoughts, too. So let me share with the kinds of things that I've been considering.

First, my priority has been to follow the recommendations of the governor, the Illinois Department of Public Health and the Centers for Disease Control.

My understanding is that currently the governor will not enforce restrictions for churches. That means we could open up without fear of any legal ramifications. At the same time he encouraged churches that do start in-person, inside worship to remain consistent with current guidelines. In the current phase that would mean limiting gatherings to 10 people, remaining six feet apart, and all participants wearing a mask.

I think that Illinois will enter the next phase of re-opening in July (and perhaps has entered Phase 4 by the time you read this). In this phase the recommendation is to have gatherings of no more than 50 people. In order to limit the risk of spreading the coronavirus at worship we would need to adhere to the following guidelines:

- Everyone would be required to wear a mask through the entire service.
- No gathering in the narthex or upper room but come in, worship and leave.
- No singing or congregational responses.
- Abbreviated liturgy (maybe 30 minutes total).
- Households would have to sit at least six feet apart.
- There would probably not be a bulletin.
- There would probably not be communion. (I'm working out a way to offer it at a time other than Sunday morning when we might be able to have fewer people in the building and for just a short period of time. My intention is to start this in July.)
- No passing of offering plates.
- Drinking fountains would be turned off.
- Maybe only allow one person in restrooms at a time.
- We would ask that no one who has a temperature or been exposed to the virus attend.
- Guidelines also recommend that people at high risk of serious complications from contracting the virus (including those over 60 years old) not participate.

In addition, I've been bothered over the last week or so with stories I've read about churches that held in-person worship, following the protocols in place, and still spread the virus to close to half the participants.

It is also troubling to me that it is possible for someone to be asymptomatic (and never have symptoms) and still be covid positive. That means that the virus could be spread by someone who has no idea they have it.

There was also a discussion among pastors with the Bishop recently (at a virtual meeting I did not attend) that involved having parishioners sign a liability waiver before attending services. I don't know what kind of support there was for requiring a waiver, but at the very least it would emphasize to people attending worship that there is a risk involved. (By the way, I would be against the waiver.)

I'm afraid that my description of what reopening will look like is somewhat discouraging, but I think it is important for people to have realistic expectations. Getting together for worship on Sundays in the near future will be not be "normal," and won't be for some time to come.

As all of this started in March I think I shared how much I struggled with the decision to close the church. I was literally sick to my stomach for the better part of a week. The decision about reopening is becoming just as gut-wrenching for me. I, too, long to get back together with everyone. But at the same time, we need to be responsible for the health and safety of those around us.

What is the acceptable level of risk? Are we OK with the possibility of inadvertently spreading the virus, of making one of our friends sick – or worse? By following the appropriate guidelines – keeping six feet apart, wearing a mask, not singing, not visiting in the building before or after worship, using hand sanitizer, etc. – we can reduce the risk, but we can't eliminate it.

Regardless of starting in-person worship or not, we would continue to provide an online version of worship every week.

Those are my thoughts for now.

It would be helpful to me and the council to know what your thoughts are. If we started worshipping in-person again under the conditions listed, would you come? Do you think it is wise for us to open up in July or would you be more comfortable waiting until August or September? Please let us know. You can call or email me, leave a message at church or contact a council member.
