As Jewish families and friends gather this week at their Passover Seder dinners, and Christians at their Easter brunches, as Muslims gather next month at Eid al-Fitr feasts, and others at the first picnics of the season, that kind of hospitality is at the heart of those meals.

Hospitality is also at the heart of what we do and who we are here at Toco Hills Community Alliance. The food we provide makes celebratory meals possible for those we serve, of course. What we do here is about so much more than food, though.



So many of the people we serve are hesitant and nervous about coming to us, especially so our friends for whom English is a second language. In order to be inviting and put them at ease, our volunteers have learned and use greetings in Spanish. This is just one way we express our genuine welcome of all those who come for service.

When people come for service, we certainly share food, clothing, and referrals with them, but our relationship is not just a transaction, but a mutual one in which those we serve also share with us, often in the form of gratitude, or like the woman last year who made us masks by hand to help keep us safe.



Even in the brief moments of interaction we have with those we serve and our volunteers, community is formed. When someone who is usually there is missing, we know. For example, we have one particular unhoused friend who usually comes on Tuesdays. When

To keep you up to date on just some of the many things going on at THCA:

- With the addition of our refrigerated van a little over a year ago, our donations from stores have increased quite a bit. So much so that we actually had to hire a part-time driver in the mornings to cover all of them!
