D-day's 82nd Anniversary was held June 6, 2026, at our Regimental Cenotaph with Padre Gates officiating. The Pipes and Drums of the Regiment and the Regimental Association led the Veterans and the Regiment to the cenotaph to remember the sacrifices of our soldiers who fell on June 6, 1944.

COMMAND TEAM MESSAGE - August 2026

A full Reserve Summer Training cycle is coming to an end, and we are now well into preparations for the upcoming fall training period, as we continue to support individual and collective readiness for domestic and international operations. With many members of the Regiment away this summer, either completing basic training, infantry courses, or teaching on courses, The Canadian Scottish Regiment (Princess Mary's) stands ready to do what our nation asks at home and abroad.

Our training will continue to hone individual and small unit tactics, with emphasis on Offensive Operations in an advanced dispersed operations paradigm, in response to the developing nature of war and technology. We will utilize experiences learned from the ongoing war in Ukraine, including basic Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV) defensive training. As always, the regiment continues its support of 39 CBG and 3rd Canadian Division with instructors and students for individual courses and collective training activities.

With Canadian Army Modernization well underway, 39 CBG and The Canadian Scottish will soon fall under the command of the 2nd Canadian Division (2XX). Of interest, 2XX will encompass all 10 Canadian Army Reserve Brigades. Transfer of Command Authority (TOCA) is on 10 September after which we will bear the blue division patch on our left sleeve, no longer the French Grey. 2XX will also be known as the Defence of Canada Division. This designation has raised concerns regarding deployment opportunities for reservists. It is important to note, that the Commander of the Canadian Army fully expects to rely on the Primary Reserves to augment the Regular Force on deployments, now and into the future. I do not expect any major changes to the duties of our soldiers or regiment: we will continue to train for war.

Within Army Modernization, 39 CBG will form a Battle School, in which some key Can Scots will serve in the Island Company. The initial draft includes Maj Shawn Claire; Capt Rob-Roy MacKenzie; and MCpl Joshua Kotorinski.

Pipes and Drums

The Regimental Pipes and Drums had a busy summer supporting events around Victoria and elsewhere. Seven members of the band travelled to Halifax to participate in the Royal Nova Scotia International Tattoo as part of the Tattoo Massed Pipes and Drums. It was a great experience for all, except for the scorching heat. On August 9 four pipers, including the Pipe Major, performed at the Gala dinner at Government House in support of the David Foster Foundation's weekend events. The weekend of Aug 20-24, the band performed at the BC Tattoo at the PNE in Vancouver. This is the resurrection of the Okanagan Military Tattoo. The intent to showcase the bands of British Columbia, which was accomplished in splendid fashion! The Tattoo was held in the Agrodome, but bands were also performing throughout the PNE grounds. With a little break to rest and recuperate, the Pipes

and Drums will be back at it in September when they will support the RA Pipes and Drums at the Royal Roads Homecoming. The Pipes and Drums will be losing a long-time member this August as Sgt Aaron Mattock moves to Winnipeg. His partner has taken a position with the Winnipeg Symphony. Our loss is good news for the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders, as Sgt Mattock has already secured a position within their Pipes and Drums. We all wish them luck on their new adventure.

Reserve Summer Training

As always, the regiment continues its outstanding tradition of supporting Brigade, and Division training above and beyond what is expected. The Full-Time Summer Employment (FTSE) program began in late May, and 74 members signed up for various lengths of contracts throughout the summer. We sent off 57 pers to attend courses throughout the summer to include Basic Military Qualification (BMQ), Rank Qualification- Infantry (RQI), Primary Leadership Qualification (PLQ) to grow and increase number of highly qualified soldiers and NCOs. We also had four captains complete the demanding Army Operations Course (AOC), increasing the number of officers qualified to be promoted to major. The unit also provided 8 instructors and staff on the BMQ and RQI courses that were conducted at Albert Head. Additionally, 12 soldiers deployed to other various tasks not covered under the FTSE program. These could be located within 39 CBG, 3 Div or other training centres throughout Canada. Finally, we are deploying about 20 officers and soldiers to Ex Western Sabre in Wainwright, to participate in the final 3 Division exercise conducted under the current organization.

As the training cycle moves into the fall period, our regiment remains steadfast in preparing soldiers, NCOs, and officers for overseas service. With deployment opportunities on the horizon, our training continues to emphasize warfighting—an essential focus given the growing frequency and scale of our operational commitments. The global security landscape is increasingly volatile, as ongoing conflicts in Ukraine, and across the Middle East remind us of the challenges ahead.

Our regiment understands the demands our nation may place upon us. Through rigorous, realistic training and the unwavering support of the Regimental Family, we are building the resilience, cohesion, and readiness required to meet those demands. We will be Ready for the Fray.

Your Regiment Needs You - Join The BOLD 100

The Endowment Fund continues to seek individuals to join the ranks of its **Bold 100 Project**.

The Endowment Fund was established in 1981 to support the components of The Canadian Scottish Regimental Family and their activities. Since then, the fund has provided thousands of dollars to assist in the purchase of uniforms, accoutrements, and band instruments; maintenance and upkeep of regimental memorials and artifacts; support of youth/cadet and veteran's recognition programmes; and other support for serving soldiers and veterans.

All funds donated to the Endowment Fund are deposited in accounts generating interest or dividends and only the income earned is dispersed. Hence, donations continue to generate income and fund activities in perpetuity. Allocation of funds is determined by an independent Allocation Committee governed by strict Terms of Reference, thus ensuring that funds are used appropriately. Administration and operation of the fund is done by volunteers, so operational costs are near zero.

The Endowment Fund currently has approximately \$400,000, which generates an annual income of about \$10,000 per annum, which is provided to the elements of the Regimental Family to aid in their work for the good and welfare of the Regimental Family and its members. While significant, this sum represents approximately 40% of actual Regimental Family funding needs, resulting in a number of *ad hoc*, and often competing fund-raising efforts throughout the year. It is the aim of the Endowment Fund Committee to bring the Endowment Fund's principal to \$1,000,000 by 2030. This could generate an income of between \$20,000 - \$40,000 per year and will consequently fund most Regimental Family activity, thus making constant fundraising initiatives unnecessary. Importantly, as this income is from earned interest and dividends on the principal, which is never touched, this annual income will continue in perpetuity.

To help us achieve our \$1,000,000 goal we are seeking one hundred (100) bold individuals who will commit to donating a sum of just \$50 per month for a period of five years. This will generate in excess of \$300,000 by 2030 and greatly assist in allowing us to achieve our goal.

Individuals joining the **Bold 100** will receive formal recognition, a certificate and member-identifying pin, a free subscription to the CanScot Newsletter, Regimental Association membership and, and a standing invitation to all donor recognition events.

This program has been created in response to comments by many Regimental Family members who have been considering *end-of-life* legacy gifts to the Regiment through the Endowment Fund but wish to have a more immediate and direct impact.

Finally, we recognize that personal circumstances can change so donors can leave the programme at any time should circumstances require.

The Canadian Scottish Regimental Mountaineering Team

The Canadian Scottish Regimental Mountaineering Team is preparing to return to Mount Rainier in September 2026. This expedition continues a tradition that began with Mount Baker in 2016 and has since included Mount Rainier, Golden Hinde, Mount Athabasca, Denali, and other challenging objectives. The team uses mountaineering to build fitness, resilience, leadership, trust, and field skills that directly support the infantry profession.

Mountaineering is more than adventure. It develops the same qualities soldiers depend on in the field: teamwork, navigation, endurance, decision-making under pressure, rope-team trust, and the ability to operate in harsh and unforgiving conditions. Every climb strengthens the confidence and cohesion of serving members.

In September 2026, the team intends to summit **Mount Rainier — 14,411 feet**. This will be a demanding glacier climb requiring preparation, technical training, physical conditioning, and disciplined teamwork. The objective builds on the team's previous successful Rainier climbs in 2017 and 2023, and the 2025 Mount Baker climb where 10 Canadian Scottish members and 1 Seaforth Highlander summited as a team.

Your donation helps support training, safety equipment, travel, mountain skills development, and expedition costs for serving soldiers taking part in the Mount Rainier objective.

The Canadian Scottish Museum – Clark Russell

Museum volunteers have been very busy this year painting out the museum, upgrading the electrics and installing new lighting as well as overseeing the installation of new display cases. If you haven't already been inside the museum to look at the results, please do so.

As part of the refurbishment/renewal we obtained funding to replace the display cabinet for the Vimy Memorial Cross on the second-floor balcony of the Armouries. 75 years after it was first installed! During the work on the new cabinet the Cross was on temporary display in the museum itself. The cabinet has been completed including some relevant background photos. The Cross itself has been reinstalled. In addition, we have created a smaller display cabinet below the one containing the Cross. This smaller cabinet is currently housing some relevant WW 1 artifacts.

In addition to the cabinet work, we are in the process of working on a timeline for the Cross over the last 109 years. For example, we know that after repatriation from France the Cross was installed in Pioneer Square in 1938 and then relocated to the Armouries in 1951 when it was replaced by the current permanent memorial in Pioneer Square.

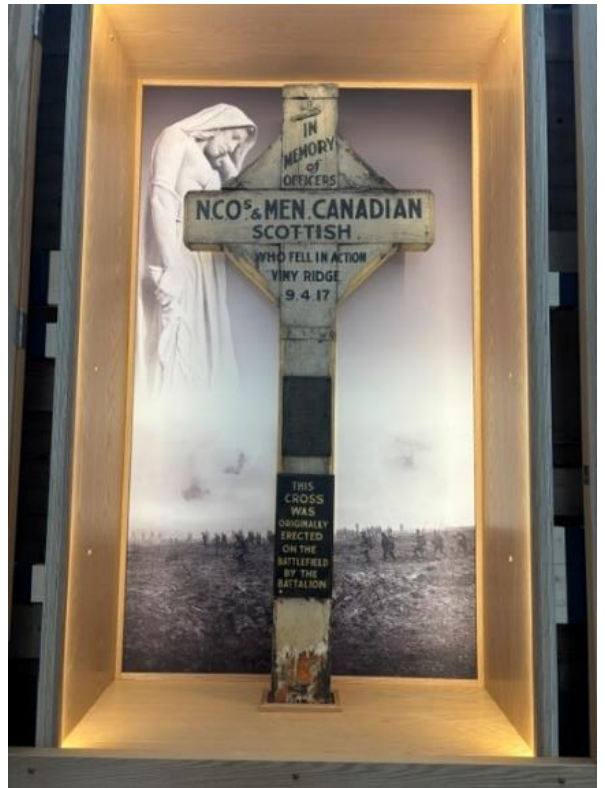
What we are having trouble pinning down is when it was removed from its original location on Vimy Ridge, returned to Canada and where it resided prior to 1938. If anyone has any information, please let us know.

In terms of future displays, we are interested in obtaining stories/photos/artifacts related to current military operations in Latvia/Poland, and Mali. We also continue to look for more of the same related to Afghanistan.

We are also welcoming and accepting any stories/artifacts and related historical information related to our veterans from both World War 1 and 2 as well as all those times of peace in between. Finally, we are always looking for volunteers to assist us in running and maintaining the museum, especially in the areas of archival research and Web related work.

Reminder: We also return to winter hours effective 1 September, 1000-1230 hours Tuesdays and Thursdays.

New Vimy Cross Pictures



Pte. HUGH GOODWIN STROYAN – Frank Mahieu

The first time ever today July 31st, 2026, together with Jessie Stroyan, her husband John and her mother Gillian Stroyan, we paid tribute to my adopted soldier Pte. HUGH GOODWIN STROYAN of the 16th Bn. Canadian Scottish.

It was the first time ever that relatives from Canada stood at Hugh's grave to pay tribute to the boy. A poignant and beautiful moment. A privilege to be part of this. This was joined in spirit by David Stroyan (Vancouver). In honour of dear Hugh, we conducted a private ceremony with the usual Order of Service. Hugh was the son of Ernest J. and Sarah Jessie Stroyan (née Marples). He was born on 19 December 1896 in Derby (UK) and baptized on 19 April 1897 in Boulton, Derby. His father was a banker's clerk (1897). On October 7th, 1910, the whole family left England via Liverpool on passenger ship 'Empress of Britain' bound for Quebec. Finally, they settled in Vancouver, BC, Canada where Hugh became a carpenter.

At Vancouver he joined the Seaforth Highlanders of Canada in 1912. When he enlisted on 23 Sept 1914 for war service he was sent to the 16th Bn. The Canadian Scottish. He stated he was born on 19 December 1895. This made him appear as being 19 years old but in fact he was 17 and underage, to become 18 that December. and so he arrived at the Western Front soon to confronted with the hell of war.

On the evening of April 22nd, 1915, the 1st gas attack was launched by the Germans. A serious gap in the line was made by the fleeing gas stricken French. The Canadians were rushed in to battle head over heels. Hugh Goodwyn Stroyan, was hit and died on 23 April 1915, aged only 18, in the attack at Kitchener's Wood in which the 16th Battalion (Canadian Scottish) and 10th Bn. were engaged on the evening of the 22nd and the night and morning of the 23rd of April.

Pte Hugh G. Stroyan died of wounds, an eyewitness says he was killed instantly and he was brought to the HQ and Aid Post of his 3rd Canadian Brigade at Mouse Trap Farm (Shell Trap Farm). The burial had to wait seen the farm was heavily shelled by the Germans. Later that period he was buried at the nearby Seaforth Cemetery (Cheddar Villa), Hugh being the only Canadian soldier resting there. Only and exactly 7 months after enlistment he fell, far from home, far too young.

The band also played at the Pro Pat's Legion on August 9th in celebration of the Legion's 100th Anniversary. It was well attended and we played to an appreciative crowd; lunch was also provided to everyone at the event.

We will return to regular practice sessions in early September to prepare ourselves for the performance year ahead, and we look forward to seeing everyone in the future.

D-Day 82nd Anniversary – We Will Remember Them

On June 6, 2026, members of the Canadian Scottish Regimental family gathered at Pioneer Square and the Regimental Cenotaph to commemorate the 82nd anniversary of D-Day and to remember the Canadian Scottish soldiers who fought and fell on June 6, 1944.

The ceremony began with the Pipes and Drums of The Canadian Scottish Regiment (Princess Mary's) and the Regimental Association Pipes and Drums leading veterans, serving members of the Regiment, and members of the Regimental family to the Cenotaph.

With Padre Gates officiating, those assembled paused to remember the courage, service and sacrifice of the soldiers of the Canadian Scottish who landed on Juno Beach on D-Day and those who did not return home. Brigadier-General (Ret'd) Heppell also addressed those gathered, reflecting on the significance of the day and the importance of continuing to remember those who served.

The ceremony included the playing of the Last Post and Lament, followed by the laying of wreaths. In a particularly meaningful moment, our Second World War veteran, Nick Janicki, laid a wreath on behalf of the Canadian Scottish Regimental Association, providing a direct and personal connection between today's Regimental family and the generation we gathered to honour.

Following the ceremony, veterans, serving members, families and guests returned to the Sir General Arthur Currie Armoury for lunch, organized by the Women's Auxiliary. The gathering provided an opportunity for veterans and members of the Regimental family to share stories, renew friendships and continue the fellowship that has always been an important part of the Regiment.

The Canadian Scottish Regimental Association extends its thanks to the Women's Auxiliary, the Regiment, the Regimental Association, and the entire Regimental family whose work and support made the commemoration possible.

We also gratefully acknowledge the support of Veterans Affairs Canada, whose funding helped make the commemorative activities and veterans' gathering possible.

More than eight decades have passed since Canadian Scottish soldiers stepped ashore in Normandy, but their service and sacrifice remain part of who we are as a Regiment and as a Regimental family.
