Command Team Message – 29 September 2022 - LCol David Proctor, CO; CWO Braid Fairall, RSM

With the world's attention still focused on events unfolding in Ukraine, news of the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II stunned the world. Her long and steadfast reign endured for seven decades and was a testament to duty and service. Her presence touched many generations of Canadian families, who watched her grow from the teenage Princess who trained as a mechanic during WWII, to the young Queen who charmed crowds on her many tours throughout the country, and to her family roles as mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother many times over.

CWO Newcombe and I had the honour of representing the Regiment at the Memorial Service for Her Majesty at Christ Church Cathedral, the Regimental Kirk. Pipe Major Roger McGuire performed Highland Cathedral as part of the service. We were also invited to a reception at Government House, hosted by the Lieutenant Governor of BC, the Honourable Janet Austin OBC.

With the ongoing events in Ukraine, our efforts in the late summer and fall are focused primarily on individual and small unit tactics training in the urban operations environment. As always, we will take part in community relations events to highlight the presence of The Regiment in the local communities. Participation in our training exercises will focus the soldiers on the realities we face in the current situation in the world. Similar to the world situation over 30 years ago, we find ourselves once again standing on heightened watch to maintain deterrence.

EXERCISE / TRAINING UPDATES

The majority of Regimental activity in late summer was supporting individual training courses at the Brigade, Division, and Army level. However, we were also fortunate to be able to participate with small contingents in several collective training and notable activities highlighted below:

Exercise Grizzly Defender 2022 – Thirteen C Scot R soldiers participate in a major 41 Canadian Brigade Group training event focused on offensive and urban operations in the Wainwright training area in late August.

Exercise Scottish Blackfish – An adventure training event also conducted in late August, which provided a dozen soldiers with a physically challenging, unique, and rewarding team-building exercise. This encompassed a multi-day, waterborne exercise, learning skills and navigating on paddle boards in the waters surrounding Victoria. On the final day of the exercise, the participants conducted site inspections and maintenance on The Regimental Vimy Monument at Pioneer Square.

MARPAC's Defence on the Docks - The Royal Canadian Navy hosted its Defence on the Dock event for the first time since the beginning of the pandemic. The annual event, held since 2017, kicked off on 17 September at Ship Point in the Inner Harbour. It provided an opportunity for the public to get a small taste of life in the Navy and to connect with members of the Defence community. A small contingent from the Regimental Pipes and Drums performed alongside the Naden Band as well as conducted a separate performance on their own.

Exercise Scottish Shooter 3-22 – In early September, the leadership of The Regiment conducted C7 rifle Personal Weapons Test 4 (PWT 4) at Heals Range. This was instructor cadre standardization training for advanced shooting techniques required for urban operations, and targeted Section 2ICs and up.

Exercise Scottish Shooter 4-22 – This was a follow-up exercise conducted in late September, where the remainder of The Regiment conducted PWT 3 and 4 qualifications at Heals Range.

We are already deep into a very busy training calendar for all components of The Regiment. Our training focus must always be on warfighting. We have in the past, are currently, and will always, send soldiers and leaders into combat or potential combat zones in support of Canada. We continue to support our Nation's foreign policy aims with soldiers deployed, and training to deploy, on international operations as part of both OPERATION REASSURANCE in LATVIA and OPERATION IMPACT in the MIDDLE EAST.

Please read them over carefully and if you have someone you feel meets these requirements, please mail your nomination, with an explanation to: The Canadian Scottish Regiment (Princess Marys) Regimental Association, PO Box 44180 RPO GORGE, Victoria, BC V9A 7K1.

Purpose:

- to recognize outstanding service to an individual who by their dedication and hard work has demonstrated to the selection Committee a superior commitment to any (and or all) branch(es) of the Regimental Family

Eligibility for nomination:

- anyone who has demonstrated the above traits (living or posthumous)
- nomination must be received by the selection committee before February 3, 2023 to be considered for that year's presentation
- Presentation to be made at the Association Annual General Meeting which is held the first Saturday of March each year
- The award need not be presented each year
- If there is only one nomination in a given year that does not mean the selection committee must present the award to that person
- The selection committee may choose their own nominee (all must agree)

Eligibility to make a nomination:

- any member of the Regimental Family

Regimental Family includes any member of:

- the serving Regiment
- the Regimental Association
- the Canadian Scottish Women's Auxiliary
- Any member of any one of the Canadian Scottish Cadet Corps including training officers

Selection Committee:

- Consists of the President of the Regimental Association, the Honourary Colonel and the Regimental Sergeant Major. The democratic process is to be observed except when the nominee is brought forth by the selection committee as described above in the eligibility for nomination section.

Costs:

- Initially, the costs will be borne by the President of the Regimental Association. If the Executive wishes to cover costs for future Presidents they may choose to vote on that at their own discretion. Each year's costs will include a "take home" trophy and the engraving of a plate to be put on the Apermanent@ trophy which is to remain in the Association's Display Case located on the balcony near the Museum entrance at the Bay Street Armoury.

Regimental Museum - Jack Drysdale

Now that the Covid 19 restrictions have been lifted, we are open to visitors again. The museum is open for the winter season, September to May every Tuesday from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM. Group tours can also be arranged for specific timings and events by contacting the Museum at 250-363-8753, or cscotrmuseum@shaw.ca.

The Museum is a Member of The Greater Victoria Military Museum Working Group (GVMMWG) which meets every two months and a member of Tourism Victoria offers web page advertisement and pamphlet distribution. We are also affiliated with the Organization of Military Museums of Canada (OMMC)

To keep the museum and the displays dynamic, we are undergoing a design review and have hired a museum consultant to assist in developing a new image. To get there our five-year strategic plan has been created and our first large (\$75,000.00) Department of History and Heritage (DHH) museum grant has been received. Things are moving along.

We are developing student training boxes for teachers to demonstrate the history of military events through the eyes of a Can Scot. These boxes include uniforms, equipment, and a teaching guide to help immerse students in history. Jack Drysdale is running this project.

We have a new student hire, Erik Butterfield, who is assisting in developing our digitization program and sorting. This eventually will give us the ability to store delicate original artifacts but use images for research and other uses. This project includes photographs, film records, and paper records.

Al Dadd's is dedicated to organizing our holdings in the basement with the eventual aim of recording our holdings in the soon to be received DHH artifact management system that we will be using to keep track of our collection.

Of interest is our aim to highlight The Regiment's roles in domestic operations in Afghanistan and the United Nations. We are short of artifacts and images of our soldiers in those operations. If you have anything we can copy, or borrow, or if you wish to donate to the museum, we would be most appreciative.

Over the last few months, the Museum has participated in displays at The BC Aviation Museum, McCauley Point, and the Navy on the Pier event. Overall, a successful return to museum outreach.

As always, we are always looking for volunteers, and don't forget, we are always looking for artifacts!

Moving forward, we have a Field Training Exercise (FTX) planned for October 1-2 to refresh ourselves with field craft skills and to be better prepared for a spring FTX which will include a ruck March into Canadian Forces Maritime Experimental and Test Range (CFMETER) training area. The Canadian Scottish Remembers - Derrick Egan

At the 11th hour, on the 11th day, of the 11th month of the year 2022, millions of people worldwide will reflect in silent remembrance of those who made the ultimate sacrifice for their countries.
