

With the lifting of pandemic restrictions, Regimental life was able to fully resume. Former Can Scot receives Commendation.

Royal Canadian Artillery Museum, at Canadian Forces Base Shilo, collections manager Clive Prothero-Brooks was recognized for his 45 years of exemplary service with the Canadian Armed Forces at Base Headquarters. He received a 3rd Canadian Division Support Group Command Team Commendation, with it presented to him by 3CDSG Commander Colonel Scott McKenzie. The citation reads:

Book of Memory - Jim Dumont

In the May 2022 issue of *The Can Scot*, I had an article to bring everyone up to date on what happened over the previous couple of years. Since that time, a lot of organizing and sorting has taken place. Also, I have had persons inquiring to see if a name had been put in the Book of Memory or the status. Unfortunately, I have not had the book updated at this time. I am now working on accomplishing that, although it will still take some time.

After putting everything together, names that are in a position to go into the book has increased to about 70. I have broken them into four groups corresponding to the actual four books. Right now, I am working on surnames that start with A to E and have about four with all the information required that can now be prepared for the book, although they won't be put into the book until I go through the whole group. Putting the actual page into the book, also takes quite a bit of time so I don't want to do that until all the names for that group are ready to go.

The next while, we will be putting in a lot more time on preparation rather than sorting and organizing. At this time, I am hoping to have all the ones I have the required information for to be in the book by the end of May. Of the 70 names, 18 are names that were submitted by the articles that Derek Egan has put in requesting sponsorship for WW 1 persons which I think we have all of the information needed. Some of the other names are missing some information, usually a date of death. There will also be some that require a fair amount of time on research. Hopefully, that will be a minimum.

The Can Scot Newsletter-Jim Dumont

After 124 newsletters over 31 years, I have decided that this will be the last newsletter that I will be the Editor. It has been most enjoyable to be able to keep up with what is going on in the Regimental Family and I thank all the persons, over the years, who have submitted articles. Without your submissions, I would never have been able to provide the information to our Regimental Family and other Associations and persons.

I know I did the newsletter for February 1992, although I believe I might have done one or two before then. Looking back on that edition was very interesting. Endowment Fund - Derek Egan

The Regimental Family needs your support today and into the future.

The Endowment Fund was established in 1981 to support the components of The Canadian Scottish Regimental Family and their activities. Since then, the fund has provided thousands of dollars to assist in the purchase of uniforms, accoutrements, band instruments, maintenance and upkeep of regimental memorials and artifacts; support of youth, cadets, and veteran's programmes, provision of educational bursaries and other support for serving soldiers and veterans in need.

All funds donated to the Endowment Fund are deposited in accounts generating interest or dividends and only the income earned is dispersed. Hence, your original donations will continue to generate income and fund activities in perpetuity. Administration and operation of the fund is done by volunteers, so operations costs are near zero as a proportion of annual generated income.

Your gift to the fund can be one-time, monthly, made by cheque, online, or in person. Donations can be in cash, property or securities. The Fund holds charitable status, so all donors will receive a tax receipt that can be useful with personal or estate tax exemptions. Gifts made in a will or estate may provide tax benefit now, though the funds will not be available until sometime in the future.

Regimental Museum - Randy Evans, Director

The museum has been busy diminishing the 2022 Museum Development Fund (MDF) grant we received in May 2022. The museum's Permanent Exhibit Renewal Study (Master Plan) will be completed in March 2023 and submitted to the Directorate of History and Heritage (DHH) to support our request for further funding. Our volunteers contributed hours of research and work to supply the Master Plan contractor – D. Jensen and Associates – the material they needed to round out the cunning plan.

Funds from our successful 2022 MDF request have also been used for Website Creation, Inventory Support, and Educational Outreach Programs. The museum launched our new website in December 2022, (cscotrmuseum.ca – take a look- and any feedback is welcome), hired a UVic Student to assist with digitization and research, and completed three School "Discovery Boxes". The large, lockable wheeled totes, filled with military uniforms, artifacts, and lesson plans, are sent to Greater Victoria's three school districts for teachers to pass on our Regimental History to their students. We also support the local School Field Ttrip Program and have purchased a tent and flag banners to identify our outreach display events.

The Museum set up display and information tables at the following local events: Fort MacAulay Day, Esquimalt, Saturday, May 28, The Air Museum New Display event, Sydney Monday, June 20; The Air Museum Open House Sydney, Saturday – Sunday, August 21-22; CFB Esquimalt "Defense on the Dock", Ships Point, Victoria, Saturday, September 17; and the Victoria Gun Show, Saanich Fair Grounds, Saturday, October 29.

This year the week-long Museum Course, provided by the Organization of Military Museums of Canada (OMMC), will be held in Kelowna, so we will be able to send two delegates to the valuable training program. The course was cancelled due to Covid in 2020 and 2021, and we could not afford to go in 2022 due to the hugely inflated airfare required to fly to New Brunswick.

The museum currently has 13 active volunteers who are contributing to the Master Plan projects. If we are successful in our bid for more funding, we will be able to realize our development plan goals in the next few years. If not completely funded, we will take longer, but will continue to improve what we can with available resources. We currently have an outstanding and capable cadre of volunteers who are dedicated and proud to promulgate and celebrate our Regiment's storied past.

We continue to attend the museum every Tuesday morning, 9:30 AM to 1:30 PM, for maintenance and development, and are now open to the public. Our summer season opening times for June, July and August are 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM, Tuesday to Friday, excluding stat holidays. Group tours can also be arranged at other times depending on the Armoury schedule.
