This wonderful opportunity for families to join together and learn.

The Management of Viewcrest Village has granted the use of the area behind 3422 Almira Dr to place a community garden that will be run by the tenants who join. We will have access to an outside water faucet that will be monitored. There will be a shared tools shed available for the tenants use (see project coordinator for keys).

Each person can select what to grow, get your children involved, and work with the residents who join the Community Garden.

You will see the layout of the plot and decide what size raised bed you wish to lay your garden (there are $4 / 10' \times 4'$ long beds and $15 / 4' \times 4'$ sq ft beds). There will be a compost bin $4' \times 4'$ available. The area will be fenced and maintained by the residents who join. There will be a small \$5.00 monthly fee for Seeds and Soil.

Enclosed are necessary forms to sign up for the Community Garden. All tenant packets will be kept in paper form on file and will be used solely for the Community Garden coordinator. No information will be shared.

The following is a list of the composting guidelines. Please follow these guidelines so there are no invasive weeds or plants. They are necessary for a proper compost bin for future use in the garden

To create a compost pile to suit your planting needs: A compost pile is made by layering brown materials, like leaves and straw, with green materials, like plant scraps. The ratio should be roughly one part green material to two parts brown material. You can also add dry, coarse materials like sticks to help aerate the pile. Add kitchen scraps, such as coffee grounds, egg shells, vegetable peels, and scraps. DO NOT add any meat scraps, fats, Dairy products (it is not good for your garden and they bring rodents).

Add water to compost to keep is moist Add worms to work your materials into compost. Turn the compost every three to four days to speed up decomposition.

Add compost to your garden - You can add compost to your garden in a few ways:

- New garden beds: Add a 3-4 inch layer of compost to the soil surface and mix it in with a digging fork or spade.
- Existing garden beds: Add a quarter-inch to 1-inch layer of compost to the soil surface each year.
- Around plants: Spread a 1-inch layer of compost around the base of perennials, keeping it
 a few inches from the stems.
- Mix compost with topsoil Mix compost with topsoil and fine sand to provide balanced bedding for vegetables.
- Add fertilizer Add organic or inorganic fertilizer to compensate for the nitrogen that compost absorbs from the soil.

Viewcrest Village Community Garden Planting Guidelines

Planning a garden needs a lot of thought. Learn to plant what can successfully grow in the Pacific Northwest. Yes you can grow pretty much all year here. Joining a community garden will help you learn:

- When to start your seedlings indoors for spring planting.
- How to harden plants and when to transplant to your garden beds (After the last frost dates).
- Planting directly to your garden beds.
- Plant spacing for better growth.
- Which plants can be staggered such as leafy greens for a long season of harvest.
- Which plants take longer to mature such as carrots.
- How to plant with companion plants ie: tomatoes with basil.
- Which herbs help with pest control.
- When to stagger planting for summer, fall, and winter crops.
- How to protect plants using netting, (no chemicals).
- Proper water usage. When to water / how much to water.
- Gauging soil alkaline / ph balance.
- Managing yard waste to turn into compost for the next year.
- Harvesting your crop and storing it properly for future use.
