Crimean War and the Cemetery





Essex-born Robert Bugg served in the Crimean War before moving to Victoria in 1868. He settled in Coburg, established a rope and twine works, was a member of the Coburg Shire Council in the 1880s and a lodge member. He died in April 1915 and was buried at Coburg Cemetery. His funeral was attended by a number of Crimean War veterans and escorted by a master of the Royal Navy veterans. He is buried in the Church of England section, compartment A, grave 21.

Celestina Sagazio talks to members of Friends of Coburg Cemetery and Coburg Historical Society

The guest speaker at the first Coburg Historical Society meeting for 2013, on 20 February, (a joint meeting with the Friends of Coburg Cemetery), was Dr Celestina Sagazio who worked at the Victorian National Trust for 26 years and now works for the Southern Metropolitan Cemeteries Trust. To an audience of about 25 people, Dr Sagazio spoke on the subject of the heritage values of cemeteries and conservation techniques. She illustrated her talk with a power point presentation including photographs of the recent infrastructure improvements and heritage interpretation at the Coburg Cemetery, aerial views and photo images of various Melbourne cemeteries.

Dr Sagazio argued that cemeteries offer a sense of continuity with our past communities and land-scapes. They contain an historical record of the local communities that created them. Headstones, for example, can have fascinating historical facts sometimes found nowhere else. Cemeteries are

time capsules and are the least changed cultural aspect of our society. They reflect attitudes and the social and economic development of their local communities and sometimes contain fine memorials, buildings, structures, gates, fences, layouts and landscapes. But for a long time they were ignored as a consequence of our fear of and our reluctance to talk about and consider death. Dr Sagazio argued for the acceptance of the principles of cultural heritage significance (aesthetic, historic, scientific and social) and the conservation management practices, as outlined in the Burra Charter (1979 and revised in 1999).

In Victoria, the National Trust Cemetery Committee (now disbanded) was the first to undertake heritage surveys and assess the historical significance of cemeteries. At one time, significance was synonymous with the graves of white, Anglo Saxon, well to do males. Now those of women, the poor, working class, other ethnic and racial groups as well as children are considered in assessments of significance. Cemeteries can also be an important habitat of native plants, birds and animals.

Dr Sagazio believes that every cemetery has at least local significance. The existing features of each cemetery should be recorded and its significant features identified. Victorian Cemeteries can now be protected by their listing on the Victorian Heritage Register if they have state significance or covered by a Local Government Heritage Overlay if they have municipal significance. Dr Sagazio listed the types of monuments, great number of working class graves, the entrance gates, its location on top of a hill and the cypress plantings as contributing to the regional significance of Coburg Cemetery

The cultural significance of the cemetery is conserved by maintaining, repairing, preserving, restoring, reconstructing and adapting. The philosophy of the Burra Charter ensures conservation practices are underpinned by the cautious approach of doing as much as possible to care for the cemetery and make it useable, but changing it as little as possible. The responsibility for grave maintenance lies with the descendants who hold the right of interment. If descendants cannot be located, newspaper advertisements can be placed in local papers to try to locate them and if there is no response, then work on graves can be carried out. Dr Sagazio advised us that it is better to repair cracked gravestones than to replace them with new ones. The appropriate adhesives for different headstone materials should be identified and used. If a brace is required for a badly broken tombstone, a metal which

will not rust should be used. She advocated a gentle approach to the cleaning of headstones - no scrubbing with hard brushes, no harsh detergents, and the use of fish oil on iron work once the rust is brushed off. Great care should be taken with inscription renewals

as the original lettering can be obliterated. She strongly recommends obtaining the advice of expert conservators before repair work is undertaken.

At the conclusion of her talk, Dr Sagazio answered questions from the audience. The Coburg Historical Society President, Malcolm McIlvena, then thanked Celestina and presented her with a small gift.

Shot by Mad Dog Morgan!

Highway Robbert.—On Sunday night last two carriers, named William Seacomb and George Spry, of Pentridge, were "stuck up" by two men at the Black Springs, a place three miles from Pyalong. The men were armed and presented pistols, and plundered the carriers of a cheque on the Bank of New South Wales, Melbourne, for 128 15s 8d, drawn by a man named Alexander, of Deniliquin; also a £5 note, and one £1 note. Spry refused to give up his money, upon which one of the men fired at and wounded him in the shoulder and leg.—Argus.

Born and bred in Coburg when it was newly cleared farmland, George Spry hit the newspapers when he was shot and robbed by the famous bushranger, Dan 'Mad Dog' Morgan.

As carriers and bullockies, the Spry men were successful Coburg businessmen. George and his brother worked on the Victorian goldfields for a while and had been contracted to transport valuables for banks and government. One Sunday night in April 1861 at Pyalong just north of Kilmore, George was accosted (or 'stuck up' as The Argus described it) and, refusing to give up the money, copped three bullets that crippled him for years.

George eventually settled into farming, but not before he had been held up again, this time by the famous Pentridge escapee, Harry Power.


After returning to North Coburg to live with his sister, weakened and

April 1861 at Pyalong just north of Kilmore, George was accosted (or 'stuck up' as The Argus described Crippled, George fell into the Merri Creek not far from the Coburg Cemetery, drowning.

He is buried with his mother and father in the Cemetery, only a short distance from the suburban street that still carries his father's name.

The site will advertise our various events as they are planned and provide links to our membership forms, our storyboards and our brochures. The site will also contain links to the history of the cemetery



Lieutenant Alfred Lucas - WW1 hero

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Alf Lucas was born in Gippsland but moved to Northcote with his family while still a boy.

A bright boy, both Alf and his brother George attended Melbourne High School.

After joining the 1st AIF, he moved rapidly through the ranks to become a Lieutenant in the 8th FAB and was awarded the Belgian Croix de Guerre for bravery.

Having survived the war, Alf Lucas fell victim to the 1919 flu epidemic, finally succumbing to tubercular meningitis at the Caulfield Military Hospital on 15 December 1919.

He is buried in the Coburg Cemetery, in the Church of England section, compartment H, grave 101.

His father George, who died just before Alf's enlistment, is buried in an unmarked grave in the Church of England section, compartment D, grave 522.
