ROYAL CANADIAN SEA CADET CENTENNIAL PARADE



On September 9th 2018 Queens Park, Toronto was the site of an historic occasion where Sea Cadets gathered to celebrate their 100th anniversary! The Navy League of Canada has been proudly supporting this world-class youth program of future leaders since 1918 alongside our partners in the Canadian Armed Forces.

In honour of this event we had the privilege of having the Honourable Elizabeth Dowdeswell, Lieutenant Governor of Ontario as our speaker. The Honourable Dowdeswell inspected the troops stopping to talk with various cadets. Here are some excerpts from her speech. "The qualities that best define cadets----inventiveness, resourcefulness, duty, loyalty, compassion and tolerance----are at the heart of good governance and are the hallmarks of good citizenship.

The challenges we face in the 21st century cannot be solved through tired and outdated visions. If we are to anticipate and respond to rapid technological change, climate change, and geopolitical change, we must be resilient. We need expansive new approaches and ways of critical thinking. So I hope that you will continue to be curious. For, as cadets, you are well qualified to make a significant contribution now and in the future. Each of us can make a difference in this world. We are, after all global citizens."

Navy League Honours, Awards and other Recognitions

As this issue of Flag Hoist reaches you it is time to consider Corps Candidates worthy of recognition for the Navy League Cadet Medal of Excellence as well as other medals and potential RCSC Scholarships. The average Ontario Division Corps had an enrollment of almost 40 Sea Cadets as we started this training year so that probably makes 4 to 6 Senior Cadets at most eligible for special recognition.

Since the majority of our Sea Cadets join in September and October as the school year begins, those who have been with us four or more years should have already received any deserved Service Medal or Bars in time for Remembrance Day Parades and other observances.

It is the Branch's responsibility to submit the appropriate Form NL(104)E or(F) Award Application Form and all supporting documents to the Ontario Division Office well before the March 1st 2019 deadline. This also applies for the Divisional Music Award documentations. NL21 Administrative Orders section 2.06 gives appropriate direction and guidance.

The beginning of the calendar year is a busy time for our RCSC Commanding Officers as they are dealing with summer training applications at this time which some might understandably consider a higher priority than honours, awards and scholarships. Here is where Branch Presidents and RCSC Chairpersons can offer to assist Corps CO's and staff in organizing documentation to ensure complete and timely submissions.

Letters of reference by Branch Presidents and Corps CO's need to do more than simply state that the Cadet meets the criteria and thus deserves the award. A principle of Claim and Support should be followed. Instead of just stating that the cadet is "active in the community" it is a reasonable expectation that several examples of the individual's community involvement and accomplishment are provided. Similarly, any other statement of a Cadet's positive attributes should be factually supported to the most positive degree.

An up-to-date copy of the individual's Cadet Information Card (CIC) is an essential part of the submission and is carefully and extensively evaluated by the Divisional Honours and Awards Committee. It might be entirely appropriate to remind the Corps CO of this requirement since we Branch people cannot maintain and update a Cadet's personnel file.

Since the Cadet is expected to submit an essay outlining how Cadet Membership has affected and enhanced his or her life experience to date it is unlikely or more probably not possible to make this award a surprise to the individual.

Submissions must be complete and are best submitted in the order outlined in NL 21. A crisp and clear colour picture of the Cadet in uniform is also recommended and while it will not be used to assess the candidate's qualification for the potential award it is readily available for publicity purposes.

It is our policy that all Navy League Honours and Awards be presented by an appropriately attired Branch or Divisional Executive Member at the earliest possible formal occasion after any award is officially announced. Divisional Area Representatives and other Directors are readily available to assist in presentations if requested. The Navy League Cadet Medal of Excellence should be presented immediately after the Divisional AGM in April with the expectation that the Cadet might wear it in uniform for Battle of Atlantic Observances. It would be entirely appropriate to present or to re-present the accompanying certificate at any awards ceremony prior to the ACR or at the ACR itself. Since we are now providing the Service Medal and Bars at no charge to the Branch a "nice to do" action on the part of the Branch is to have the Cadet's medal(s) mounted as Branch support of their Senior Cadet(s). Carefully and extensively prepared references and recommendations saved on computer can often be readily reworked or updated with only slight effort to support RCSC Scholarship Applications and other potential recognition opportunities.
