- Gifts Discount Notification Email was sent in early December to chapter and city council presidents. The email contains the discount order form, Founder's Day gift sheet, and a letter from Director of Gifts, Danel Ward. The discount is 10% starting January 1, 2024 and running through February 29, 2024.
- Endowment Fund Ballot Email will be sent in early January to chapter presidents. The email will contain a list of the current endowments as well as any renewals.
- Recommending Prospective Members to International: When recommending a prospective new member to International, please include the following information: The recommending member's name, member number and chapter number; the prospective member's full name, address, email, phone number, age and chapter preference (online, local or both); and confirmation of the prospective member's consent to share her contact information with chapters in her area.

SWHCC January 2024 Meeting

There was laughter and fun as LIO chapter members entertained us with their "organizational recruitment" skit.

The President of the local HOA, Barbara Hupe, had invited Mary Crochet to speak at their HOA meeting to inform the neighborhood about a great organization called Beta Sigma Phi. Mary is the "go to" person in the neighborhood to share her years of knowledge about the group.























The following Standing Rule 18 is being proposed by Alpha Delta Theta Chapter. Should the Standing Rule pass, then the current Standing Rule 18 will be renumbered to Standing Rule 19.

Proposed Standing Rule 18

18. Starting with the 2024-2025 Council Year, a SWHCC Chapter Rotation Schedule will be established to serve in the position of Council President-Elect, thus serving as Council President the following year. The remaining Chapters will submit by the February Council Meeting, one nominee to serve as one of the remaining SWHCC Officers (Council Vice President, Council Recording and Corresponding Secretary and Council Treasurer). The Nominating Committee will work with those nominated to determine who will serve as Council Vice President, Council Recording and Corresponding Secretary and Council Treasurer.

Reason for the Proposed Standing Rule

Each year, it continues to be difficult to get members to volunteer to serve on the Council Board so the time has come for Chapters to nominate a member to serve for the year. The rotation schedule for President-Elect will allow all Chapters to have a Chapter Rep serve as the Council President on a 5 year rotation based upon the current Chapters in Council. In addition, this proposed standing rule would combine the positions of Recording and Corresponding Secretary, allowing for five officer positions. Currently, with just five chapters, this would allow each Chapter a voice on the Council Board serving in one of the Officer positions. It would be understood when the Chapter member is nominated by the Chapter to serve on the Council Board, that they will serve in one of the positions listed. As we continue to grow SWHCC and work on increasing our Chapter numbers, we will make adjustments such as splitting the Recording and Corresponding duties.

If the above Proposed Standing Rule passes, then Standing Rule 14 would be amended to the below:

Current Standing Rule 14 reads:

14. The Nominating Committee shall meet, at the earliest date possible following its election, to agree upon names of candidates chosen from the incoming council members to be submitted for the respective elective offices. A written report listing the nominees for each office will be emailed to all chapters prior to the March Meeting.

Change to Read:

14. The Nominating Committee shall coordinate with those nominated by the Chapters to determine who will serve in each of the Council Officer positions. A written report listing the nominee for each office will be emailed to all chapters prior to the March Meeting.

After the January Council Meeting, Xi Alpha Zeta Chapter amended what was proposed by Alpha Delta Theta as noted below. This will first require Chapters to vote on the Alpha Delta Theta proposal and if that motion passes, then a vote can be taken on the amended Xi Alpha Zeta proposal. Please come prepared to the February Council meeting to take a Chapter vote.

Proposed Standing Rule 18

18. Starting with the 2024-2025 Council Year, a SWHCC Chapter Rotation Schedule will be established to serve in the positions-of-Council President Elect, thus serving as Council President the following year. The remaining Chapters will submit by the February Council Meeting, one nominee to serve as one of the remaining SWHCC Officers (Council President-Elect and Council President the following year, Council Vice President, Council Recording and Corresponding Secretary and Council Treasurer). The Nominating Committee will work with those nominated to determine who will serve as Council Vice President, Council Recording and Corresponding Secretary and Council Treasurer.

Reason for the amendment to the Proposed Standing Rule from ADT

This amendment would still allow for the combination of the Recording and Corresponding Secretary into one office. And still promote the individual voice of each chapter with equal representation on the board. However, having all offices on a rotating basis will allow chapters the opportunity to nominate the appropriate member for a specific office in the designated year.



The ADT January social found us in the home of Karen Sweet-Angel (along with sous chef Sherry Sweet) for some lessons in a tantalizing foray into Persian Cuisine. Karen learned the art of Persian cooking while living in Iran, tastes closer to Mediterranean cuisine than that of most Middle Eastern fare. The meal started with sabzi khordan, a mix of basil, mint and Italian parsley paired with radishes, green onions and paneer (similar to feta cheese, but creamier.) This was wrapped in bread and then eaten.







The main course was chelo kabab, Persian rice and ground meat kabob, along with broiled tomatoes and salad Shirazi (diced tomatoes, cucumbers and red onions), prepared by Barbara and Diane. Karen explained how to make the meat paste, and everyone had the opportunity to prepare a skewer for the grill. Cathy did an excellent job with the grilling.

Served with rice and the sides, including the crispy rice that was a favorite with everyone, the meal was prepared and enjoyed by all.



Two days later, he underwent surgery to correct the issue known as "esophageal atresia with tracheoesophageal fistula (EA/TEF)", which basically means his esophagus was not attached to his stomach. The scenario in which this repair can be done successfully for a child so small is very rare, especially on the first try. Through what can only be described as a miracle, Oliver's surgery was successful, and the surgeons at Texas Children's were able to reattach his esophagus to his stomach in one surgery.

Chris shared that they started the restaurant so that his family could all work together. They wanted to create a space where people could come to the table and eat together since his son, Oliver was not supposed to be able to eat at all.

Why Gourmet? Gourmet sandwiches and fine food are something to remember. They hope to provide a community centered around good food and family time. A portion of all profits go directly to support missions around the world, children's medical research, and families of NICU babies.

The family and staff believe so strongly in the power of prayer and its ability to bring forth miracles that they have a prayer wall and pray for members of the community who fill out prayer requests.


