


After our delicious lunch, our next stop was Spice Village, a collection of over 80 boutique shops with everything from clothing to home deecor to gifts. Located in a 1908 warehouse and opened in 1997, it offers a unique shopping experience in a historic 30,000 square-foot building in the heart of downtown Waco.





After we shopped to our hearts' content, we headed to our accomodations for the weekend. We arrived at the Magnolia Hilcrest Estate, a beautiful historic home built in 1903 in the heart of Waso that seemed stuck in a time gone by. A renovation by the Magnolia Homes team updated features while maintaining the home's original details and character. There were 5 bedrooms, accomodating 12 people (unfortunately Melinda was not well and was unable to attend), so we split up and settled in. After settling in, we had time for some catching up and indulging in some gourmet cupcakes and lemonade before heading out for dinner.









Dinner was at the Backyard Bar-Stage-Grill in Waco. Encompassing music, food and fun. Conceptualizedn by 4 Texans, in 2015 they opened a 1000 capacity live music, nulti-bar, restaurant and family-friendly 12,000 sq. ft courtyard venue, offering something for every age. On the night we were there, Kin Faux was the featured act. A high energy Texas/Rd DirtnCountry band whose obvious influnces, along the lnes of Charlie Daniels, Alabama and R4estless Heart, show strongly through the virtuoisc fiddlr and strong harmonies. Carol presented a program on the Tulip. Tulips are perennials that bloom in the spring and die back after blooming to an underground storage bulb. They can grow to between 4 and 28 inches in height. There are about 120 species and the name is thought to be derived from the Prsian word for "turban" where they were worn to show affluence. First appearing in Asia around 1000AD, they were foiund in a band stretching from Southrn Europe to Central Asia. In 15^{th} century, they became a symbol of the Ottoman Empire. They were rapidly introduced to Northern Europe and became much sought after during the "tulip mania" from 1636-37. Today they are closely associated with the Netherlands. In Christianity, the tulip symbolizes passion, belief and love. White represents forgiveness while purple represents royalty.




