
From Pastor Katie

Happy New Year! In the church, we celebrate the new year with the start of Advent. This year we marked it with an Advent workshop and a visit from St. Nicholas. Throughout Advent we will sing, O Come O Come Emmanuel, and wait for our Savior to be born. Our children will tell the Christmas story on December 17 during worship with a pop-up pageant. Our preschoolers will then tell the Christmas story to their parents the week before Christmas. Then we gather on Christmas Eve at 11am, 6pm and 7:30pm and Christmas morning at 10am to hear how Jesus is born for us. That is the gift we get that never gets old and never goes out of style, no matter how many times we hear it! Then we get to celebrate New Year's again on January 1st outside of the church! Often this is

done with promises for new year's resolutions to be more fit and to take on new and exciting things. While those promises are good for us and those around us, I wonder if we might also remember that there is nothing we have to do in order to make Jesus come for us. Jesus comes for us regardless of how good, or not good, we are in life. Coming to church, learning about God, and serving one another and our neighbors, help us see that come to life but are by no means a prerequisite for God's love. May we remember that on the good days and on the bad days and on every day in between, especially with all the busyness that this time of year brings. Jesus comes for us! As God's disciples we are called to reach up to God, reach in to ourselves and one another, and reach out to the community. On Stewardship Sunday, November 12th, we did an exercise in the sermon asking us where we think God is calling us to go in the new year in regards to reaching up, reaching in and reaching out. Each person was given three coins: a dime, a nickel and a penny and then told to put one in each pot based on where they thought we needed to invest more time and resources. The dime went in the pot where we need to invest the most, the nickel into the second most and the penny into the third. Here are the results:



Reach up - \$6.98 Reach in - \$6.47 Reach out - \$11.71

The majority think we need to reach out more to our community so this will become our top priority in the new year. Help us find concrete ways to reach out. (Please remember that we will still be reaching up and reaching in, as they too are vitally important for our growth and well-being.)

It was a joy and a privilege to teach 18 confirmation students about the Ten Commandments this fall. At the end of our unit, I asked the teens to come up with some "new" commandments that God might want to add to the original ten. Their answers were creative, thoughtful, and sometimes funny, so I want to share them with you:

Honor our natural resources and use them wisely – plants, animals, minerals, water, air, and even people!

Practice what you preach – don't be a hypocrite.

Do what is asked of you (if reasonable).

Don't treat others as "less than," especially those of different race, religion, gender, culture, or class.

Thou shalt NOT honor thy phone (or other things that distract us from God and people).

Don't take what you have for granted – have an "attitude of gratitude".

Give back.

Don't give up – be hopeful.

Treat the property of others with respect.

Help others in times of need.

What new tenth commandment would you add to this list? Send me an email with your suggestions (tyenser@atonementwyo.org), and I'll publish the results in next month's newsletter. Meanwhile, remember the lesson about the 10 Commandments that we talked about in confirmation class this fall: we can use the 10 Commandments as a guide to a life of following in Jesus' way, but we can never keep them perfectly. As a matter of fact, we break them all the time! But that's OK, because these holy commandments drive us back into the arms of a loving God who forgives us, redeems us, and fills our lives with mercy and grace.

Worship for Sundays in December

the First Sunday of Advent ♦ December 3 10:00 AM ♦ the Rev. Katie Lyon

Stir up your power, and come! The psalmist's plea in Psalm 80:2 has become familiar to us in the Advent prayers. Isaiah wants God to rip the heavens open. Both cry out for an apparently distant, angry God to show up, to save, to restore. When we hear Jesus describing the coming of the Son of Man with stars falling from heaven, it can sound dire and horrible, not like anything we would ever hope for. But when we really look at the suffering of people God loves, we can share the hope that God would tear open the heavens and come.

the Second Sunday of Advent ♦ December 10 8:45 AM ♦ Pageant Rehearsal, Adult Faith Formation 10:00 AM ♦ the Rev. Katie Lyon

John calls people to repent, to clear the decks, to completely reorder their lives so that nothing gets in the way of the Lord's coming. The reading from Isaiah gives the context for this radical call: the assurance of forgiveness that encourages us to repent; the promise that the coming one will be gentle with the little ones. Isaiah calls us all to be heralds with John, to lift up our voices fearlessly and say, "See, your God is coming!" We say it to one another in worship, in order to say it with our lives in a world in need of justice and peace.

Worship for Sundays in January

Three Kings Day (observed) ♦ January 7 10:00 AM ♦ the Rev. Katie Lyon

The feast of Epiphany ("manifestation") concludes the Christmas season with a celebration of God's glory revealed in the person of Jesus Christ.

In Isaiah and Ephesians, that glory is proclaimed for all nations and people. Like the light of the star that guided the magi to Jesus, the light of Christ reveals who we are: children of God who are claimed and washed in the waters of baptism. We are sent out to be beacons of the light of Christ, sharing the good news of God's love to all people.

Baptism of our Lord (observed) ♦ January 14 10:00 AM ♦ the Rev. Katie Lyon

Our re-creation in baptism is an image of the Genesis creation, where the Spirit of God moved over the waters. Both Mark's gospel and the story in Acts make clear that it is the Spirit's movement that distinguishes Jesus' baptism from John's. The Spirit has come upon us as upon Jesus and the Ephesians, calling us God's beloved children and setting us on Jesus' mission to re-create the world in the image of God's vision of justice and peace.

Common Ground Sunday ♦ January 21 10:00 AM ♦ the Rev. Tom Scornavacchi

Today we celebrate our close relationship with Common Ground Recovery Community through music led by Atonement Praise Band, through sharing our stories in a safe space, and through gathering at the table to share the Body of Christ. We remember through our readings and prayers that, as Pastor Tom likes to remind us, "we're all recovering from something!"

A Place at the Table (Communion Celebration) ♦ January 28 10:00 AM ♦ the Rev. Katie Lyon

In Deuteronomy God promises to raise up a prophet like Moses, who will speak for God; in Psalm 111 God shows the people the power of God's works. For the church these are ways of pointing to the unique authority people sensed in Jesus' actions and words. We encounter that authority in God's word, around which we gather, the word that prevails over any lesser spirit that would claim power over us, freeing us to follow Jesus.

Groundskeeping Update and Yearly Report

The volunteer groundskeeping team completed the third year of maintaining the grounds of Atonement and Common Ground areas. It is a large property with many challenges. The team was formed when COVID hit and money for outside vendors was scarce. I would suggest the team has become a ministry among the members – celebrating weddings, medical recoveries and life's challenges. Our members step up when another member can not meet the scheduled date. The team's passion is evident in the beauty of the grounds.

Maintaining the property includes cutting grass, mulching, weeding, planting, pruning, leaf blowing, fertilizing, playground maintenance, hedge trimming, watering, plant removal and landscaping. We occasionally paint and we maintain the equipment we have acquired. We added a hover mower to our equipment inventory.
