The season of Lent begins on February 18 with Ash Wednesday and continues for 40 days, culminating in Holy Week and Easter Sunday. For centuries, Christians have spent these 40 days focused on fasting, prayer, and almsgiving. But let's get real. How many of us 21st century American Christians practice fasting? And while most of us pray at least sometimes, in our busy lives, isn't prayer more like a quick "Thank you, Lord!" or "Help me, Lord!" instead of spending an hour a day on our knees? As far as almsgiving goes, the word is not really a part of our vocabulary, and while we may be good at writing checks to charities, when was the last time you took to the streets to personally offer money, food, or clothing to the poor among us?

Does all this mean we should give up Lent for Lent? Maybe we just need to rethink how we observe this season. The activities of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving were meant to quiet our minds and draw us closer to God. A time of quiet in God's presence sounds like a pretty good goal for those of us who live busy, stressful, modern lives. So how can we be still and know God? A good start is to join with Common Ground on Wednesday evenings throughout the season. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, February 18, we'll meet at 6:00 pm for a fellowship dinner in Lundin Hall, followed by Lenten worship at 7:00 pm. For those unable to attend Ash Wednesday in the evening, we will once again offer "ashes to go" at 12:00 noon in the narthex or outside at the main entrance, weather permitting.

We are all frail humans who make mistakes big and small and who have a deep need for Jesus, the One who forgives our sins and restores us to wholeness. As we gather for midweek Wednesday worship this Lent, we can hopefully find an hour of serenity and an open, loving community where Jesus has promised his presence, his mercy, and his call to serve the world in his name. See you there!

A Place at the Table ♦ February 1 ♦ 10:00 AM the Rev. Katie Lyon

Today we celebrate the children who participated in *A Place at the Table* communion instruction. They will pour water to remember their baptisms, help read the Gospel Story and prayers, and share in the Holy Meal.

Fifth Sunday after Epiphany ♦ February 8 ♦ 10:00 AM the Rev. Katie Lyon

Light shines in the darkness for the upright, the psalmist sings. Isaiah declares that when we loose the bonds of injustice and share our bread with the hungry, the light breaks forth like the dawn. In another passage from the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus, the light of the world, calls his followers to let the light of their good works shine before others.

Through baptism we are sent into the world to shine with the light of Christ.

Transfiguration of our Lord ♦ February 15 ♦ 10:00 AM the Rev. Tom Scornavacchi

Today's festival is a bridge between the Advent-Christmas-Epiphany cycle that comes to a close today and the Lent-Easter cycle that begins in several days. On a high mountain Jesus is revealed as God's beloved Son, echoing the words at his baptism. This vision of glory sustains us as Jesus faces his impending death in Jerusalem. We turn this week to Ash Wednesday and our yearly baptismal journey from Lent to Easter. Some churches put aside the alleluia at the conclusion of today's liturgy. This word of joy will be omitted during the penitential season of Lent and will be sung again at Easter.

First Sunday in Lent ♦ February 22 ♦ 10:00 AM the Rev. Katie Lyon

Today's gospel tells of Jesus' temptation in the desert. His forty-day fast becomes the basis of our Lenten pilgrimage. In the early church Lent was a time of intense preparation for those to be baptized at the Easter Vigil. This catechetical focus on the meaning of faith is at the heart of our Lenten journey to the baptismal waters of Easter. Hungry for God's mercy, we receive the bread of life to nourish us for the days ahead.

Prayer Warrior

The Atonement Prayer Team wishes to honor the memory of Shirley Becker, a faithful member of the prayer team since day one, more than 30 years ago, who passed away 12/21/2025 at age 96, and for whom we have made a donation to the Thanksgiving and Memorial Fund.

Shirley ministered to all with whom she came in contact. She prayed daily for all the members of the Prayer Team and their families, all the people on the confidential prayer list, all the members of her family, her friends and anyone else who gave a hint of needing prayer. She had a list of people that she called regularly to provide prayer, support, and love. Even the cable guy that came to work at her house ended up on the prayer list! Shirley's rock solid faith and commitment to sharing it have inspired me for years and I am so grateful to have known her.

In the 30 years I have been at Atonement there has been a Weekly Prayers list in the bulletin and now online with a link <https://atonementwyo.org/weekly-prayers> on the church website under the Ministries menu and in the weekly email about the Sunday service. All members and friends of Atonement are invited to pray for the people on this list.

In the 1990s Faith Ann Jones organized a Prayer Chain phone tree to supplement the bulletin list. When someone called the church or Faith Ann directly and asked for prayer, the phone tree jumped into action. Prayers started immediately and continued for 30 days. Shirley was an original member of the phone tree.

On September 28, 2006 Bob Sharett started a monthly meeting with a mission "to pray with and for those who are hurting, and encourage others to follow Christ's teaching about God's promise for prayer by offering opportunities to

study, share, and learn about prayer." The Prayer Chain phone tree prayer partners including Shirley were incorporated into this group which still meets. This team maintains a list, to supplement the Weekly Prayers list, of people who need confidential prayer. There are about a hundred people and families on this list for whom we pray daily. In September 2015 Shirley moved to New Jersey to be near her daughter but committed to pray daily at home.

For me, prayer removes hopelessness. It reminds me that I am not the center of the universe; it gives me perspective. Prayer raises my awareness of God acting in the world. Knowing that God is only a prayer away is comforting, not warm fuzzy blanket comfortable, but deep inside comforting. I pray for that comfort for all of the people on the prayer lists at Atonement and for all of you reading this.

Preschool Playground Surfacing Project

Dear Atonement congregation,

Every day, our preschoolers learn, grow, and discover the world through play. A playground isn't just a place for fun—it's where children develop confidence, friendships, and a love for learning.

Atonement Christian Preschool was required to become a Department of Human Services (DHS) licensed center which we achieved in August 2025. DHS regulations ensure the health and safety of students in early childhood education centers. During our opening inspection, we were made aware that the mulch currently on the playground is a choking hazard for our students under three. Our three toddler classes are unable to play on the playground. Right now, we have an incredible opportunity to update our playground with a rubber surface to create a safe and welcoming playground for all our little ones. To make this dream a reality, we need your help. Proper surfacing is essential to protect children from injuries and ensure that every child, regardless of age and ability, can play freely and safely.

Our goal is to raise **\$35,000 by June 1, 2026**, to install safe, durable surfacing for our preschool playground. Your generosity will help us:

- Provide a secure environment for active play
- Meet safety standards for our youngest learners
- Create a space where children can connect and thrive

Every gift, no matter the size, brings us closer to building a playground that will serve our preschool community for years to come. The completed playground will be dedicated in honor of teacher Debra Hoffman who retired in June 2025 after 27 years of service at the preschool. You Can Help Family Promise in 2026

Family Promise uses the Apartment Shelter model to house families, with three rental properties that shelter 3-6 families (12-20 people). The families move on to permanent housing as quickly as possible.

Staying in one place during their time with Family Promise allows families to have bedtime routines for the children and more flexible work schedules. Since the families are in houses, they have access to a kitchen. Atonement provides prepared meals on Mondays and donates grocery gift cards to cover the rest of the week. Providing gift cards for groceries for the families empowers the families to oversee something when much of their current situation leads them to feel powerless, while cooked meals on Mondays provide a welcome break during this stressful time.

Atonement is scheduled for Family Promise Monday Meal Ministry on April 13, April 20, July 13 and July 20. This is an easy way to directly support families experiencing homelessness!

There are some celebration and fundraising events coming up. Atonement will host a 20th Anniversary Celebration & Fundraiser breakfast on Saturday, April 25 from 8:30am to 10am. Atonement sheltered over 100 families when they were staying in churches, and provided meals for over 70 families when they were staying in shelter homes. 


Gifts of Stocks or Securities

From the Building and Grounds Committee

Every year we have to make improvements on our building and grounds. A summary of completed work from this past year follows:

May - A contractor refreshed the EFIS joints at the base of the stucco surface of our church. When the caulking joints were removed, it was found that the drivet surface was not properly sealed from the initial build in some places. Some Styrofoam insulation was exposed. A mortar coating had to be applied in these areas before the new caulking joint could be installed. We also had to make some external surface repairs near the parking lot that was damaged from the snow plow. Damage was also repaired along the alley.

July - Our next major expense was to repair water infiltration that was getting into the preschool office. A contractor excavated down to the foundation level of the building, repaired stone joints, and sealed that surface from water penetration. We discovered that the rain gutters in that area did not run to a drain but to an extinct French drain. We had to cut an access hole on the retaining wall along the preschool wing and run a new drain line through it. We actually made out better cost-wise than we expected for this unplanned work.

August & October - The sinking concrete stairway to Lundin Hall was repaired and the cracked concrete ramp at the preschool playground was removed and replaced. The slope was improved for proper rain drainage and joint-to-wall was sealed to stop further water penetration into the choir room area. Due to the water infiltration, the landscaped bed leading to the entrance of the Preschool was dug up, and we hired a landscaping firm to install river rock, hardscaping, and plants.


We repainted the parking lot lines and handicap spaces in both parking lots.

The iron railing leading into Lundin Hall from the lower parking lot was replaced.

The preschool flooring was upgraded to carpet flooring tiles in the preschool area.

Our 2025 capital expense budget was only \$37,000, yet we finished the year with \$70,921 in capital expenses. We had to pull funds from other areas of our budget to reach a balanced budget, and we still have more maintenance needs to address this year and in the coming years. We hope to add a link to our website that will list the capital expense project list.
