All Saints Sunday ♦ November 2 ♦ 10:00 AM the Rev. Katie Lyon

It appears utterly contradictory that a king should be crucified with a criminal. This victory appears for all the world as humiliating defeat. Yet through the gate of death Jesus opens the door to paradise.

First Sunday of Advent ♦ November 30 ♦ 10:00 AM the Rev. Sem. April Mulvey

The new church year begins with a wake-up call: Christ is coming soon! In today's readings both Paul and Jesus challenge us to wake from sleep, for we know neither the day nor hour of the Lord's coming. Isaiah proclaims the day when God will gather all people on the holy mountain and there will be no more war or suffering. Though we vigilantly watch for the promised day of salvation, we wait for what we already have: Christ comes among us this day as the word and meal that strengthens our faith in the promises of God.

Test Your Quilt Group Knowledge!

Just as we see the colorful leaves in autumn, Atonement Church is covered in colorful quilts on one Sunday in September. You may have been thinking, "Wow, finally I can sleep in comfort during the sermon," but no! We bring the quilts to church so that we can bless them before they are sent to Lutheran World Relief in Maryland. Lutheran World Relief then sends them all over the world, including to the United States. Some quilts recently were sent to Texas after the floods there. There is a poster in the narthex listing some of the other destinations.

How much do you know about Atonement's Quilt Group? The Quilt Group was founded in 2013. Since then we have made 968 quilts! (almost a thousand! Wow!) The quilts may not feature any religious symbols or flags, and must be 60 by 80 inches, with the knots eight inches apart. Sounds complicated, doesn't it? We joke about quilt math, but we have the process down to a science. When we started out, we used tape measures and foot rules to measure the distance between knots, but now we have a frame which makes the measuring very easy.

We are always looking for volunteers. We normally meet on the third Wednesday of each month at 10:00 a.m. in the Privacy Room at church. Several of us sew the quilt tops and bottoms at home, so the primary role of the volunteers at church is to tie square knots. If you are hazy on knot tying from your Boy or Girl Scout days, we will do a review for you! We have had group members of all ages, from middle school to senior citizens, and even Pastor Lee helped to do some knotting when he was at Atonement. We always have good conversations, and occasionally we are lucky enough to get to hear Deacon Tom play the organ while we are knotting.

We welcome donations of fabric or old sheets. They may be brought to the church office at your convenience. It costs \$2.80 for LWR to ship one quilt, which seems very cost effective. If you have carried around some of those quilts, you





will realize that they are heavy! If you would like to donate money toward the shipping, please make a check payable to Atonement and put "quilt shipping" in the memo. And, of course, we always appreciate prayers for the group members, for the folks who deliver the quilts, and the people who receive them. 
