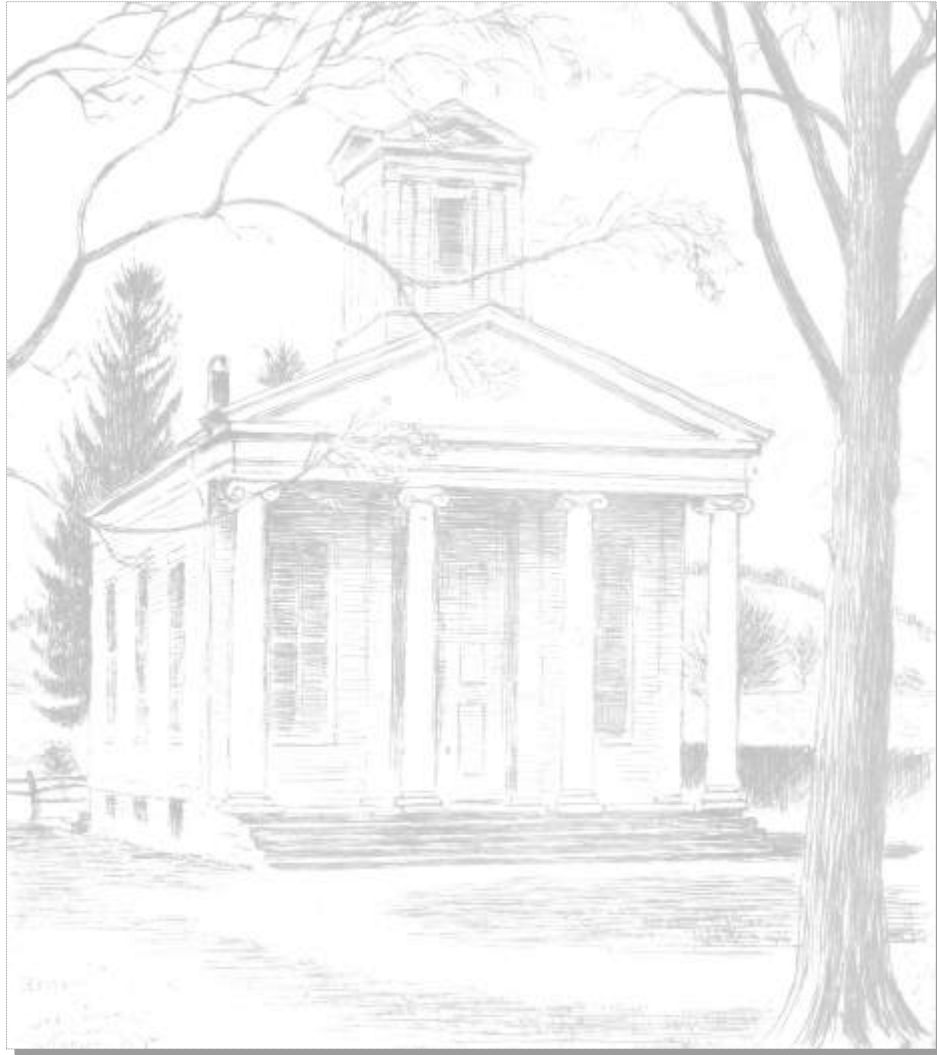

# SAINT LUKE'S CHURCH ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES

January 19, 2020

With the hospitalization of Fr. Mike Watson, Senior Warden Duanne Simon facilitated the meeting which followed Morning Prayer. She also expressed gratitude to those who helped Ginger Horvath with the celebration following the January 12 Confirmation and Reception with the Bishop. Ginger and the Parish provided a beautiful reception which was held in our newly painted undercroft. The very large number of Confirmands and the Bishop's visit was a rewarding milestone for both Fr. Mike and the Parish.

Later that week 2020 began to take a turn at Saint Luke's, as Fr. Mike was required to undergo bypass surgery. Fortunately, the Parish's goals and endurance during Fr. Mike's 3-month convalescence continued, strengthened by his constant leadership and the renewed spirit he inspired in all of us. I would especially like to personally thank Janet Repman and Lynda Magrath for their help and support in supplying the Parish with positive updates during that crucial time.

Fr. Mike officially returned for only one Sunday before the Bishop had to cease church services due to COVID 19. On behalf of the Vestry and Parish, I would like to thank Fr. Mike for his selfless dedication and the tireless hours he invested to keep us in close communication. He kept the mission and spirit of St. Luke's alive with live streaming of services, and dispensed as much Pastoral Care as the parish needed, all from a safe distance. Eric Rieder who diligently works with our Bookkeeper and Marion to provide the Vestry with monthly financial statements as well as our yearly budget.

Joyce and Lester Ottinger, the Altar Guild and LEMs who helped Fr. Mike provide the parish with live-streamed services every Sunday while the

Church was closed, and contributed every Sunday during normal times.

The Building and Grounds Committee, whom along with Santos Cardona and Nora Guerra, dedicate themselves to the care of our church and lawns.

Ginger Horvath, who created a beautiful reception with the help of the Parish for Bishop Dietze and the Confirmands on January 12th, and kept us nourished with her wonderful hot soup and garlic bread every Coffee Hour until the COVID closing.

I would like to personally thank the Vestry for their dedication and diligence in attending monthly meetings via Zoom. We all owe a special thanks to Lynda Magrath and Karen Kellogg for the countless hours they donated to reorganize and direct the Food Pantry, and also to Sue Willis for her continuing participation.

I would like to thank Father Mike on behalf of the Vestry and Parish for his untiring passion and nurturing spirit. We would not have achieved this measure of growth and well-being without his leadership, positive attitude and vision. We are also especially thankful for his open-door policy and his special gift for Pastoral Care. ## **JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT:**

### **2020 Buildings and grounds**

Due to COVID-19, there have been minimal expenses in maintenance to the buildings and grounds since the building has been unoccupied, other than staff and on Sundays (once in person worship resumed). Other than the annual service agreements and the renovations to the classrooms for the new food pantry location, we have had less maintenance this year which includes minor electrical and a new faucet in the men's bathroom that was leaking, a new sump pump was installed to help with the flooding situation we had in the undercroft. With all of this, as you can see, we are well below our budget for this year.

**TREASURER'S REPORT:**

2020 has been a challenging year financially, but also one of continued support by our parishioners, the Thrift Shop and our Space Use Renters who have continued to pay their rent despite not being able to use the undercroft. As a result of Covid-19, there was a \$59K decline in income. Major components of this were: Pledge & Plate (-\$24K), Thrift Shop (-\$14K; it was closed for 3 months), and Fund Raising/Space Use (-\$12). Personal Expenses were up by \$17K, but this was more than offset by lower Operating Expenses, major components being lower utility bills (less heating and A/C) and lower than expected Repairs and Maintenance requirements. During the same period, donations to the Food Pantry totaled \$132K versus a plan of only \$13K. Please note that donations to the Food Pantry can only be used to support its operation and cannot be used to cover other SLC expenses.

In the past, the financial activities of SLC and the Food Pantry were presented as a single entity which is how the accounting system works. However, due to the very high activity level of the Food Pantry, this would have resulted in a distorted picture of SLC's 2020 financial results. Therefore, I have split SLC and the Food Pantry into two parts as shown below, all in thousands of dollars:

As you can see, while there was a significant decline in SLC's net income to -\$3K, this was in reality a very good result considering the very trying financial conditions that SLC experienced during 2020. \*Food Pantry expenses are for food purchases and for the modifications necessary to move the Food Pantry operation to one of the classrooms. The continued support by the parish and the community of the Food Pantry is really something that everyone should be very proud of.

### **SOMERS FOOD PANTRY AT SAINT LUKE'S CHURCH:**

The Food Pantry underwent a change in management in early August of 2020. This was brought about by an upsurge in the number of weekly patrons, and by a corresponding increase in donated goods and funds during the peak Covid-19 months. The Pandemic created unexpected but necessary changes to the structure and operations of the original Pantry, primarily in the creation of the “drive-thru” format. At the same time, many of the long-time volunteers asked to be excused due to personal health concerns. It became incumbent upon St. Luke’s to ask for new volunteers from the parish and the local community, and to provide Vestry oversight and leadership. An Advisory Committee was formed, with the goal of creating an updated Pantry blending the original model with one reflecting current needs. Much time and effort was given by all concerned to achieve this goal, but the desired outcome was not achieved. As a result, the Vestry decided to accept the former director’s resignation and appoint an interim chair and vice chair for the remainder of 2020.

#### ***Friday Drive-Thru Distribution***

The Drive-Thru format, established in late March, continued through the year, in all weathers. Volunteers placed pre-packed bags of non-perishables and fresh food directly into patrons’ car trunks. Additional donations included 30 pizzas delivered on several Fridays from Il Forno restaurant. In the summer, volunteers initiated the offering of optional items offered to patrons (flour, coffee, cleaning supplies, masks, hand-sanitizer.) Inspired by the needs of our regular patrons, Pantry volunteers donated additional diapers. An Additional First-Saturday-of-Month Drive-Thru was held in October, November, and December. The last Drive-Thru of 2020, on December 18th, provided patrons with a double supply of staples and produce, along with bonus holiday groceries and goodies, and gift cards to local grocery stores and CVS.

#### ***Donations and Patronage***

Collection drives were held by Heritage Hills, The Somers PTAs, Girl Scout Troop 1413, Somers High School Class of 2020, and several individual citizens of local

communities who solicited contributions from neighbors and friends. Donations collected from the Somers Firehouse were delivered regularly. Food donations were placed daily in the bins outside the church office, and at DeCicco's Market. A check for \$3,350 was presented to the FP Interim Chair by the Somers Lions, bringing the Lions' 2020 contribution to nearly \$10,000. Fr. Mike was handed a check for \$17,000 from Somers Rotary. A \$25,000 check for the Pantry was mailed to St. Luke's from a local donor at the end of the year.

This year, the FP agreed to take primary responsibility for coordinating a separate Thanksgiving collection and distribution. This event was previously organized by the Somers Schools' social workers, teachers, and PTAs, with St. Luke's serving only as a distribution point. Nearly 200 baskets and bags of Thanksgiving-related food and staples, gift cards, and other goods were delivered by a number of Somers Scout troops, PTAs, Il Forno, local individuals and civic groups. St. Luke's FP volunteers organized and distributed the goods on November 24th.

Drive-Thru Pantry patronage reached a high of about 50 cars in March through May; it decreased slowly to about 20 during the summer, then rose beginning in the Fall to about 30 cars, and increased to over 35 cars during the Thanksgiving/Christmas season. At the same time, parishioners donated goods and gift cards, and numerous unsolicited donations of food, money, and gift cards arrived regularly at St. Luke's. In addition to the usual donations, people brought in turkeys, hams, baked goods, gift cards, and checks for as much as \$500 to \$1000. The collection bins at DeCicco's Market were filled to capacity daily. Assemblyman Kevin Byrne's office's offer of a carload of goods came after the last Drive-Thru had occurred; it was directed, with thanks, to Northern Westchester Community Center's Food Pantry.

### ***Volunteers***

The FP has an email list of 17 individuals, including Fr. Mike. Of the 16, nine are St. Luke's parishioners, seven are from the local community. Several are inactive for various reasons, but wish to remain on the mailing list. All are dedicated, collegial, reliable, and generous with their time and ideas: truly a team effort. On Thursdays the "super sorters and power packers" stored recent donations and prepared the non-perishable bags for Fridays, when additional volunteers packed produce bags, set up and took down the tables and tent, and placed all grocery items in patrons' cars. This was physical work, but everyone pitched in gladly whatever the weather.

FP volunteers, along with Somers Girl Scout Troop 1415 and Troop 1445 spent some

of their Christmas vacation transferring all the food and goods in the Undercroft to the new Pantry space. By the close of 2020, the Undercroft was completely cleared of Pantry supplies, making the new space operational and ready for the first distribution of 2021. It is hoped that Covid subsides enough so that we can segue from “drive-thru” to “choice” mode later this year.

### ***Westchester Planning Office Grant***

The execution and implementation of the \$25,000 Grant to refurbish, outfit, and restock the Food Pantry took priority in the final months of the year. While the chair and vice chair, Karen Kellogg, took the lead in planning, organizing, and purchasing, many thanks go to Joe Ciavardini and John Currie for coordinating with Apap Painting, handling the purchase of appliances, shelving, cabinets and a storage shed. And most helpful assistance was provided by Marion Comins, Duanne Simon, Janet Repman, and of course, Fr. Mike.

I think it is safe to say that we will never again take our hymn singing for granted. Personally, I love singing the Gloria, and it will be a great day when we can do that again.

One bright spot is that we were able to host the Westchester Oratorio Society for the Messiah Sing Along again this year. This was a virtual sing a long. Soloists, conductor and organist were in the church, and others were able to log on at home and sing a long. This

was a very successful event for the Oratorio Society. They increased their audience this year with a strong marketing campaign via social media. They were able to pay their musicians and conductor and make a contribution to St. Luke's as well.

Choir will resume as soon as it is safe to do so. We are blessed with a wonderful choir, and I know they are anxious to be back together in the choir loft. Lester and I are anxious to have them back. At least, at this point, we can see light at the end of the tunnel.

### **THRIFT SHOP:**

Because of COVID, the Thrift Shop was forced to close on March 14th. A barrier was then built around the cash register area and a tent was erected behind the shop. This tent not only allowed us to accept donations again, but also afforded us the opportunity to "air-out" donations before bringing them into the shop and risking COVID contamination.

After a 3 1/2 month hiatus, we ultimately reopened on June 27th, maintaining the suggested safety precautions.

Needless to say, our annual income dropped, but we still managed to bring in \$32,753 as compared to last year's \$42,252!

Again, because of the viurs, we were unable to donate to most of our Outreach recipients, but did make large clothing contributions to the Veterans and the Community Center in Katonah.

Sincere thanks to our volunteers who so steadfastly returned to the shop and special thanks to our volunteer men who are so helpful with heavy lifting and trash disposal. We couldn't survive without all of you!

A special thanks to Pat Schilpp for her generous donation of our new cash register.
