Thanks to all who contributed food and person-power for this event, at which we enjoyed some cooler Autumn weather, and got to enjoy each other's company and a variety of savory picnic foods.







In our last newsletter, our first page reported on the Baptism of little Zachary Loveless, son of one of our new couples, Amanda and Ryan Loveless. In this newsletter, I am happy to report to you about another new couple, Corinne and Curtis Hoffman, whose son, Curtis, Jr. was baptized here on October 13. We had a wonderful contingent of parishioners on hand for that occasion, and there was a special coffee hour afterwards in which we welcomed the Hoffman family and their relatives and friends.

On Saturday, October 19, your Vestry and I engaged in what the Diocese calls "Leadership Team Retreat and Mutual Ministry Valuation." This day-long workshop was a time where we shared Spiritual Reflection; developed guidelines for working together; clarified expectations of each other; reviewed goals accomplished and set goals for the future. This time together enabled us to determine what is working well and what needs our attention; if our goals have been implemented; if our expectations for ourselves and the parish are realistic and possible. Retreat facilitator **Rev. Joanne Izzo** did a wonderful job of giving us clarity and purpose.

New People in Worship Ministry

You all may have noticed that there are new people serving at the altar on many Sundays. Karen Kellogg, Sue Willis, and Mary Churchill have been taking turns with our other regulars, Mike Basile and Duanne Simon, Leading the Prayers of the People and assisting at the Lord's Table. While Pat Schilpp and Dorothea Mangieri are not in the regular rotation on a weekly basis, they will continue to "step up to the plate" for special services, funeral services, and baptisms.

Something you may notice has been happening with some regularity is that we had a "lay preacher" in the pulpit on five different Sundays during September, October, and November. **Steven Siciliano** preached on September 8 and again on St Francis Sunday, October 6; **Joe Ciavardini** on September 29; **Sue Willis** on October 27, and **Mike Basile** on November 3. The original motivation for doing this was that I am asked by the Diocese to "take off" five Sundays a year, and I really did not want to be away from all of you for that many Sundays, so I have taken some "off" days during other weeks and just considered those five Sundays as "off" so that I could be here to celebrate the Eucharist. I am glad that I chose not to go away, because I heard some awesome preaching and enjoyed the Saturdays before those Sundays - just sitting on my deck and not having to think about a sermon! Thanks to Steven, Sue, Joe, and Mike for wonderful contributions of their time, talent, and spirit - and for the days off.

Annual Meeting 2020

Our Annual Meeting will be held on Sunday, January 19, 2020. The meeting takes place after the Sunday Eucharist, and we will either adjourn to the Undercroft or stay in the Sanctuary. It really sounds strange to hear the year "2020," but it is fast approaching and we have to accept that we are almost there!

It is our custom and responsibility to report to the entire parish annually about important events in the parish, to give information about the financial and business aspects of the parish, to vote on the Vestry positions, and conduct other necessary business. This year we will be electing four new Vestry members (normally we only elect three, but there was a temporary change to the Vestry Constitution during 2018 so there is an additional spot that we need to fill.)

Longer-term Future Events

• Don't Walk By, New York City

All of you have heard me speak about two outreach activities that are planned for the future. In February, I will be making a trip to the city to participate in an outreach to the homeless in Manhattan. The event is called **"Don't Walk By,"** and it involves people going into the streets of Manhattan every Saturday in February to reach out to the homeless and invite them to a local church or shelter for a hot meal, medical care, and a place to sleep. I have participated in this mission for the past eight years and have found the work very rewarding. I have signed up to be what is called a "hospitality volunteer" on February 22. **Steven Siciliano** has also signed up.

If you would like to join Steven and me, go to **dontwalkby.org**. When you click on it, a page will open where you can *click on the green tab labeled "register*." There are several different types of services for which you can volunteer, and the one we will do is called "*hospitality volunteer*," the third one down the page. Hospitality volunteers are those who will serve soup and bread to the guests who come to receive a meal. You will click on the number "1" in the box and it will then ask for some information about you—in the box for "which church" put "*other*."

If you do volunteer, please let me know. We can arrange for those of you who wish to carpool with either me, Steven, or another volunteer from the church.

• McDowell County, West Virginia Mission Trip

This mission is a week-long trip to McDowell County, the poorest county in the country in terms of income, unemployment, and also the place where many children are living in poverty and with inadequate shelter. I have been there many times, and I can tell you that our efforts are desperately needed. We will be working with the diocese to find the family with whom we will meet to restore their home to make it more livable. The Bishop of West Virginia has revamped the program in recent years, and I have been a part of it during the revamping.

I already have lined up several contractors from our area, and **Eric Hough**, one of our parishioners, will be going along as well. Eric is very experienced in the building trades, and will be helping organize the teams of workers that come along. Anyone 17 years of age or older is invited; our goal is to get about 15-17 workers. We will drive down in cars if I can get enough people to volunteer to drive. The cost of the trip will be around \$400 per person, which will cover meals and housing at the center where we will stay. In past years when I have taken groups it has been a fun and fulfilling time for everyone. The trip is scheduled for the week of July 19-26, 2020. If you would like to join us, email me and I will let you know more.
