#### Barbara "Barb" Jennes

Few people in Ridgefield have been as active as Barb Jennes in bringing the arts into the community through various aspects of poetry. She has also dedicated her life to helping people with addictions use the arts as a positive outlet.

Born and raised in North Greenbush, N.Y. (across the Hudson from Albany), Barb always remembers writing poetry. She learned early on from her mother that poetry brought on strong emotional connections. Barb majored in English at SUNY Albany, went on to WCSU to get her master's and spent time at the Bread Loaf Writing Conference in Vermont.

After a marketing career with GE Credit, serving as a freelance copywriter and editor, and teaching in the Brookfield, Ct. School System, Barbara came to Ridgefield in 1999 with her husband, Chuck, and daughter, Mallory. She then began teaching English at East Ridge Middle School and was greatly loved by her students.

Now a well-established poet, Barb, has been published in such distinguished journals as; Comstock Review, Tupelo Quarterly, Night Heron Barks, Vassar Review, Frost Meadow Review, Tan River Poetry, Stone Cave, Anti-Heroin Chi, Ekphrastic Review, Writer's Digest, Naugatuck River Review, and Ct. River Journal. Barb has won numerous awards for her poetry and is able to write poetry for almost any occasion from "Bang the Can Poetry" to poems of alienation, abuse, and grief.

From 2020 to 2023 Barb served as Ridgefield's first Poet Laureate. She engaged the community weekly with poetry sessions for all ages, all abilities, and all interests. People learned to better understand poetry as well as write their own. No one can ever say they are not poets after attending one of Barb's sessions.

When asked what award she was most proud of, Barb mentioned the Nancy Comstock Andrews Award for dedication and enthusiastic advocacy, inspiration, and approval of the arts. This is one of Ridgefield's most prestigious awards decided upon by the Ridgefield Counsel of the Arts.

Barb is also very proud of her 2022 International Poetry Award for a Chap Book for her Blinded Bird's Poetry Book. Barb pours her heart out in this book about the three generations of addiction in her family. She has been part of many book signings and talks on this book and helped many through the raw, truthful struggles that she writes about.

When it comes to programs that Barb still provides the community as a volunteer, she mentions her continuing Poetry in the Garden at Keeler Tavern and her Poets from Four Corners. Poetry in the Garden was established in 2021 and is still going strong as is Poetry From the Four Corners Initiated in 2022. Barb is a real institution.

When it comes to being athletic, Barb says she would rather write poetry. She did not learn to swim until age 40 after she almost drowned. After that she assisted the synchronized swim team in New Canaan. There must be a poem in there somewhere.

For future goals, Barb is looking forward to the publication of her next poetry book which she has been working on for three years. She also wants to continue to be actively involved in Ridgefield's poet laureate program and spend time with her new grandchild.



#### Gerri and Bob Lewis

Gerri and Bob Lewis were both Ridgefield High School graduates, (he a football player, she a cheerleader); they were married 55 years ago at the Congregational Church with a reception at the Lounsbury House; and later when they had their own three children, they returned to raise them in the hometown they love.

So, is it any wonder that they jump in whenever their town needs help? As members of CERT (Community Emergency Response Team), Gerri and Bob first began volunteering during major storms where residents were without power. From Hurricanes Irene and Sandy to Isaias, they became part of the Office of Emergency Management to get the town back on track. Once Ridgefield was in recovery after Sandy, they helped run a drive that took them to hard hit areas in Long Island to bring much needed supplies for relief.

During COVID, Bob worked as part of Ridgefield Responds and helped manage the disbursement of over half a million dollars in rental assistance to residents in need. As the Office of Emergency Management Public Information Officer, Gerri was responsible for identifying the roller coaster of information that would keep the community up to date and safe. She also served on the COVID Task Force whose major goal was to help businesses get back on their feet. Gerri and Bob worked with fellow CERT members to manage the operations of the Vaccination Clinic.

Bob, a graduate of the University of Colorado before serving two years in the U.S. Army, received his MBA from Boston University. He spent his entire 33-year career with GE Financial Services ultimately running one of the GE businesses for GE Capital. At the time of his retirement, he was President of GE Structured Finance, a global investor and lender in infrastructure projects and also a Vice President of GE.

Gerri, a graduate of the University of Connecticut, has spent her career as a freelance journalist, mostly writing about Ridgefield happenings. She currently writes for 068 Magazine. She is also the author of the Deadly Deadlines Mystery series about an obituary writer who solves murder in her hometown of Ridgefield, Connecticut. The second book in her series, Grave Words, was published in June.

#### Joyce Flanagan

If any teacher left a strong legacy in the Ridgefield School System, it was Joyce Flanagan. She was an absolute dynamo who brought Ridgefield to new heights in music. People who had never heard of Ridgefield before heard of it now because of Joyce. So many accomplished musicians and singers were making a name for themselves due to her training.

Joyce was born in the Bronx and brought up in Westchester County, where she excelled as a musician and a superior athlete in field hockey, basketball, and softball. She went on to graduate from WCSU in 1978, where she was also a three-star athlete. Meeting her teacher, husband, Steve, at WCSU was another plus for Joyce, along with bringing up her beloved son, Kevin.



Joyce's teaching career started at the North Branford Middle School. However, after only one year, Joyce came to Ridgefield, first as the ERMS choral director and then the department head of music and instructor in all choral work, the orchestra, musical theater, and anything else music-related.

For her 36 years as the musical director for the Ridgefield School System, Joyce continually collected great accolades for the performances of her students. Whether her students were performing classical or pop renditions of music, they were outstanding. Respect for Joyce's

performances gave her students the chance to travel all up and down the Eastern seaboard and even to Disney World. As her recognition grew, she was also asked to perform with her students in Carnegie Hall, as well as in Canada, Ireland, England, Germany, Italy, and Austria. Her students became world travelers participating in festivals all over Europe.

The greatest passion for Joyce, however, was conducting and producing yearly major musicals for over 30 years. Everyone put them on their calendar immediately when one of her shows would open. The auditorium would always be packed, and there would be standing ovations. Joyce had the ability to spot talent in a student and nurture it. She built self-confidence in so many of her musicians and singers. Joyce was still working on a musical production when she passed, much too early.

When Joyce retired, she was not inactive. She was a good golfer, started an adult a cappella group called the Noteworthy, and gave concerts at the Greek Orthodox Church in Danbury.

Over the years, no one called Joyce by her real name. She was "Flan" to everyone. Her drive, her charisma, her energy, her knowledge base, and her work ethic was far beyond what was expected of a Ridgefield teacher. "Flan" was one of a kind and will be talked about for years to come because of all the students that she inspired. •

#### **Kelly Stackpole**

Kelly Stackpole's first contact with horses was at age five and it was love at first sight. From the time she was a young girl Kelly has devoted her entire life to helping people and horses come together in community. Educating people about the treatment of animals and treatment of others is what Kelly is all about.

After graduating from Ridgefield High School in 1986, Kelly entered Western Connecticut State University as a pre-law major. Her interest in law wavered, however, and she went on instead to train horses and riders for competitions. Her first stable, Moonlight Farms, was in Redding, Connecticut.

After working in the competitive side of horse shows, and competitions, Kelly decided that was not the route she wanted to take. Instead, she began to take one horse at a time from New Holland, a slaughterhouse for retired horses. Kelly was now taking her life's mission from



competition to compassion. She knew in her heart that these were valuable horses who could still lead a comfortable life and bring healing to humans. Whether a person was special needs, had mental issues, or just loved horses, Kelly was able to put the two together effectively.

Kelly started with a handful of horses but today has over 30 rescue horses and a few other horses. Her new stable is on the Wilton/Ridgefield town line (previously the Firestone Estate) and is

known as Rising Starr Farms. This title is so appropriate as Kelly works with neglected, abused, and horses in adverse conditions, along with almost seventy volunteers to give these rescue animals a wonderful loving extended life. Horses stay with Kelly until the end of their lives.


The volunteers at Rising Starr help in so many ways. Some "in name only" adopt a horse and are there regularly to feed, groom and exercise the horse. Just sitting by a newly acquired horse and giving him/herself confidence to start a new life is meaningful. Kelly also uses volunteers in organizing fund raisers, serving as accountants, taking care of maintenance, and of course, mucking the stalls. Special volunteer programs for students and scouts are reading to horses, winter, spring and Halloween programs with a variety of activities related to horses, and internships.

For her outstanding contributions to the world of animal rescue, Kelly has received numerous awards, but that is not her goal. Her goal is to be able to save more horses. Just this year Kelly has added several new components to her ever-growing programs. She has purchased 154 acres in Virginia to bring veterans, first responders, and other military personnel support through linkage to her horses. This military link is very important to her. Kelly is now also taking retired racehorses from the Caribbean and Puerto Rico for rehabilitation and an attempt at a new life.

The Ridgefield Thrift Shop was the first organization in town to believe in Kelly and begin to help fund her program. She is so thankful for their support and hopes that other people will visit her Wilton/Ridgefield establishment on 93 Silver Spring Road to become friendly with her horses and see how well they are treated. She then hopes that this visit will show visitors the importance of her work and maybe help them to decide to possibly volunteer and/or donate. There are never too many volunteers when you are as civic minded as Kelly.



#### Lee Johnson

RHS Class of 1973

Born with his mother's competitive spirit and his father's humble nature, Lee Johnson excelled in three sports while at RHS – baseball, basketball and football – while maintaining good grades and helping to lead his teams. He was the Scholar-Athlete of his class in 1973. He did all of this with a remarkable sense of humility.

Lee enjoyed sports from a young age, playing on the St. Mary's boys' basketball team in the late 1960's, as well as playing on Ridgefield Little League teams (a proud member of his Pamby's majors team). He also enjoyed playing on basketball teams with the Ridgefield Boys Club. Lee's kind nature and dedication endeared him to his classmates, teammates and coaches.

Picked by RHS Coaches in 1973 as one of the "Top Five RHS Athletes" - a recognition shared with classmates/teammates Tom Cesca, Craig Borders, Paul Natale and Chip Dean – the Ridgefield Press stated "Lee was always a symbol of leadership, good sportsmanship and ability to the underclassmen. He was one of the most respected students in school, both as an athlete and as a person."

"The class of 1973," this article continued, "survived a change that no other class had yet faced. In their sophomore year, RHS was still in the Western CT Conference, but all sports switched to the Fairfield County Conference (FCIAC) by their junior year. These athletes helped Ridgefield get on its feet in the FCIAC as RHS made a name for itself in the league."

Lee was the only member of his RHS 1973 class that started his freshman year in three sports – football, basketball and baseball. He competed in each all four years of high school. During his four years at RHS, Lee played many athletic positions including fullback, halfback and quarterback in football; second baseman and third baseman in baseball; and guard in basketball highlighting his versatility as an athlete and competitor.

In 1973 Lee was named to the Danbury News-Times All-Fairfield Team in baseball and honorable mention on the FCIAC All-Star team, leading the Tigers in hitting. He was also the Knights of Columbus Athlete Awardee.

He graduated from Nichols College in 1977 and was a member of the Bison football team. He was an RHS Tiger fan all of his life and came to hundreds of games of all types of sport to support his nieces and nephews. In December 2023, Lee died at the age of 68 losing a battle to pancreatic cancer.

Lee's family thanks ROTA for honoring his life and legacy today.

SPECIAL AWARD

#### Heidi Howkins Lockwood

Heidi Howkins Lockwood is a Ridgefield native and member of the RHS Class of 1985. Her parents, Nan and Stu Howkins, were lured away from University of Chicago research positions by an offer from Schlumberger Doll Research in 1970. They moved first to Aspen Ledges Road in Ridgebury, and then, after the impromptu preschool that Nan started was too large for the house, they moved it to the site of "My" Nursery School, the red house on Farrar Lane, in 1976.

The 1970s-era Ridgefield Old Timers may remember Stu jogging to work, from Ridgebury to the center of town cycling, in an era when cars still stopped him to ask what was wrong and who he was running from. He completed the Boston Marathon in 1976.

The 1980s-era Ridgefield Old Timers may remember Stu cycling 20 miles to work in Brookfield, in all weather, with a car battery connected to 20 lights mounted on his bicycle in all directions. A Ridgefield Press article from that era called him a "Christmas tree on wheels" and urged drivers on Pope's corner in Ridgebury to "believe their eyes" if they encountered him en route home after dark. He qualified for and then completed the Ironman Triathlon in Hawaii in 1988.

The 1980s- and 1990s-era Ridgefield Old Timers will remember Nan rescuing the Town after the YMCA pulled out of Barlow Mountain. She assumed an enormous personal financial risk and took over the lease for one-half (10,000 square feet) of the building for a childcare center she called "The Children's Corner." Between 1970 and 2015, Nan provided childcare for more than 8,000 Ridgefield families. She wrote a book in 1994 on the art of offering flexible childcare to families with "New York City schedules." There was a 3-year wait list for her preschool in the 1990s.

After studying at Wellesley College (1985-89) and MIT (1989-91), Heidi returned to Ridgefield to raise her family in 1998. She matriculated as a PhD student in Philosophy at Yale in 2003. She defended her dissertation in 2009 and is now a Professor of Philosophy at Southern Connecticut State University, specializing in the ethics of technology and AI. She has also been actively involved in the Title IX movement and serves as the Graduate Coordinator for the Women's & Gender Studies Program at Southern.

Heidi spent the ten-year hiatus between MIT and Yale climbing in the Himalayas as a professional high-altitude climber with support from the National Geographic Expeditions Council. Her achievements during this period included leading alpine-style expeditions to Everest and K2 (on both the south side, in Pakistan, and the north side, in the Xinjiang

province of China); the publication of a book, K2 One Woman's Quest for the Summit (2001, National Geographic Books/Simon & Schuster); filming and climbing for documentaries aired on NBC, CNBC/National Geographic Explorer, and the National Geographic Channel; and completion of an international lecture and multimedia show tour for the Everest IMAX movie. Various outdoor equipment companies also sponsored her during this period, including Mountain Hardware, Leki, Gregory, Bolle, and PowerBar.

After a pandemic job transfer, Heidi and her husband Bill are raising their youngest child (age 14) in Norwich, Vermont. Heidi continues to serve as a professor at SCSU in New Haven and continues to think of Ridgefield as her hometown.

#### James Fayette

James Fayette has the distinction of being Ridgefield's first male ballet dancer who has worked professional for his entire career with practically all the major dance companies in the United State. Not only being a principal dancer, but James is also a choreographer, coach, union organizer for the arts, company manager, and staging director. There is no aspect of the dance that James has not been involved in throughout his illustrious career.

Starting at age five with the well-known Patrica Schuster School of Ballet, James went on to graduate from Ridgefield High School 1n1988 and St. Mary's College in California. James then received a full scholarship as a student at the American School for Ballet. Following that James became an apprentice for the Royal Dutch Ballet in Holland and later worked with ballet companies in Italy. James even performed for Mikhail Gorbocher in Russia.

James is so proud to have worked with such ballet greats as Martha Graham, Susan Stroman, Taylor Corbet, Peter Meirs, the Alvin Alley Company, Marce Cunningham and so many others.



James went to St. Mary's for elementary school and then on to high school. He remembers that Bob Marks allowed him to substitute six days of ballet a week for a physical education credit, along with an independent study project. For his independent project he demonstrated the history of ballet and later took the program into the NYC public school.

Jame's mother was from Spain and his father owned James of Ridgefield Hair Design on Main Street. Most of

Jame's family live today in Spain. James lives in North Carolina with his wife, principal dancer, Jennifer Ringer, and has two very talented children.

In 2005 James officially retired from the NY City Ballet as a principal dancer but has continued with his career at the college level, with various PBS TV specials and with consulting with those who look to him as a role model.

Ridgefield should be so proud to recognize James and his contribution to the arts that started in town at age 5. His accolades are so long I am not going to attempt to list any of them. James was certainly one of a kind that broke the glass ceiling for so many others.



#### Jacque (Jorgensen) Lang

#### From Ridgefield to Nationals

Growing up in Ridgefield, Jacque's life has been a testament to dedication, community spirit, and a passion for both athletic and philanthropic pursuits. Her parents, Sandra and Erik, moved the family to Ridgefield in 1964, she and her two sisters, Jennifer and Janel, were raised in a family deeply rooted in the town. She attended Branchville Elementary, East Ridge Middle School, and graduated from Ridgefield High School (RHS) in 1985. While there was no RHS swim team during her time, her love for the water was already making waves.

Her swimming journey began at age six at the Wilton YMCA, leading to a decade-long career with the renowned Wilton Wahoos from 1975 to 1985. As a standout swimmer, she was a Junior Olympics qualifier and captained the team in her final year. Her time with the Wahoos was marked by numerous triumphs, including being part of numerous relays that set national records. The team's collective strength was evident in their back-to-back victories at the YMCA National Championships, where they were crowned Overall Team Champions in 1984 and Women's Champions in both 1983 and 1984.



This success continued at Brown University, where she competed on the women's swim team from 1985 to 1989. As a sprint freestyler, she helped the team secure Eastern Championships titles in 1986 and 1987 and was a key part of their Ivy League Championship wins in the same years. She capped off her collegiate career as a co-captain and a qualifier for the 1987 NCAA Championships.

Years later, she returned to the sport at the Masters YMCA Nationals

in 2008 and 2009, competing with her former Wahoo teammates. The reunion proved to be as successful as their youth careers, with them setting new national records in several relays and her individually winning two national championships.

After graduating from Brown, she embarked on a successful career in marketing, working for a marketing agency before moving on to Citibank and Nestle Waters. She is currently the Co-President of the Ridgefield A Better Chance board and has been a member of the Twin Ridge Homeowners Association board since 2007.

She has also served the Ridgefield school community as an academic advisor and was president of the RHS Booster Golf Club. During the COVID-19 pandemic, she was an integral part of the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT), helping local residents register for their vaccinations. Her volunteer work extends to delivering meals for Meals on Wheels, a small but important way she gives back to her community.

Beyond her impressive athletic and volunteer careers, she embraces a wide range of personal interests that reflect a life of balance and passion. An avid triathlete, she has competed in several Ridgefield Triathlons and completed a Half Ironman in 2024. Her love for the outdoors is complemented by creative pursuits like painting and Nantucket basket weaving.

Her life story—from her athletic achievements and professional career to her unwavering dedication to her community and diverse personal interests—is a remarkable example of a Ridgefield resident who has truly made a difference.



#### **Craig Hall**

Craig is a 1983 Ridgefield High School graduate who is remembered for his all-around athletic ability. Voted Best Athlete by his classmates Craig earned seven varsity letters; three in lacrosse, three in football and one in track and field. Teammates and coaches important in Craig's athletic career were coach Ed Coviello in lacrosse and football, coach Medve in track and teammates Martin Carbone and Jim Ringers who played both lacrosse and football with Craig from juniors through high school. Craig's most impactful and influential mentor however was his brother Jed, a 1979 graduate. Jed was an incredible athlete and they competed in every single sport imaginable.



Craig captained both lacrosse and football his Senior season and was named to the North South High School Lacrosse All Star game. His lacrosse midfield line which included Carbone and Ringers was titled "the fastest line in the state" by then Wilton High School lacrosse coach. Craig was a member of the 4x100 relay team his Senior year that finished third in the state.

Beyond the fields Craig relished his time growing up competing on the swim teams and tennis teams at both Lakeside Field Club in North Salem, NY and Silver Spring

Country Club in Ridgefield, CT. The Ridgefield Boys Club was a sanctuary for Craig after school where he learned ping pong, paddle tennis, floor hockey, basketball and so much more about life. Two memorable athletic events Craig and his friends still talk about today are winning the town Softball title for Ridgefield Mobil and winning a town wide basketball tournament under the name "Junior Express.

After high school Craig went on to play lacrosse at Division Three powerhouse Ohio Wesleyan. Craig played in the National Championship game his Senior year and captained the team. He was named North Coast Athletic All Star his Sophomore and Junior seasons. In 2024 his 1987 team was honored on campus for being one of only four Ohio Wesleyan lacrosse teams in history to have made the national championship game. Craig and three college teammates were selected to play in Melbourne, Australia within the Australian lacrosse League.

Craig has had a rewarding career in fundraising and for the last eleven years has worked as Chief Advancement Officer at Blair Academy in New Jersey. Craig and his wife Trish reside in Mendham, New Jersey where they raised four children. Craig enjoyed coaching all of his children in youth sports. He continues to be competitive in all he does.



## John MacDonald

Inspired "Gym Rats"

John MacDonald Jr. "Mac" is the third of Pat & Jack MacDonald's (former honoree) seven children and the oldest of five brothers a role John takes great pride in.

John was a member of the RHS basketball teams of '77, '78 & 1979 and Co-captain in his senior year. John also played Freshmen football and varsity baseball through his Junior year as a pitcher. When John was a Jr. and Sr. the Ridgefield basketball was in the process of rebuilding after player and coaching differences in '78 and multiple team injuries in '79. This made it difficult for John and 6'5" senior and co-captain Ed Moir to succeed as a team. John was still able to excel and achieve All-FCIAC Eastern Division First Team honors. John was also named to the Danbury News Times All-Area First team and the Bridgeport Posts Class AA All-Star team.

Perhaps John's most coveted award was the "Three D" award he received from RHS and the coaching staff. This award is given to a player that demonstrated "Desire, Determination and Dedication" within their sport.



He averaged 24.8 PPG on 51% shooting, 11 rebounds and 8 assists per game in his senior year. John was the second player from RHS to earn a full 4-year basketball scholarship with Tom Cesca (former honoree) being the first.

John takes great pride that the next full basketball scholarship recipient at RHS was his younger brother Tommy (former honoree & division 1 player) 10yrs later in '89. Brother Timmy, a member of the '89 RHS team, played 4 years at St Michael's College and was Captain in his Senior year. Brother Michael was captain his senior year in '84 and has coached college basketball in the Buffalo area for the past 37yrs across all three NCAA divisions, racking up 489 victories over 28 seasons as head coach.

In the 2024-25 season his team was ranked #1 in the country Division two and the only remaining undefeated college team, at any level, in the country at 28-0. This earned Michael Division 2 National Coach of the year honors. Brother Chris (Maco) attended Western Maryland College as well as a RHS football and basketball player. You can see why John takes such pride being the oldest brother of these RHS graduates and hopes he inspired them and maybe others in some small way. John went on to play 4 years at Dowling College in the Big Apple Conference and participated in the D2 National Championship Tournament in Kansas City.

John loved growing up in Ridgefield and considers himself a "Boys Clubber" and "GYM RAT". Being blessed with younger brothers he was able to play with them at the club over multiple generations fostering many friendships over the years from the mid 70s to the 90s. Saturday morning runs at the club were legendary and grew from hoping to get 10 players to play in the late 70s to 4-6 rotating teams in the late 80s! This growth in "Gym Rats" lead to RHS basketball finally regaining total respect in the FCIAC while Winning the East FCIAC for the first time in 1988 and a CT class LL State Tournament berth for his twin brother's RHS team in 1989.

John's athletic work ethic continued into his professional career after college as John and wife Laura worked very hard to become the youngest McDonald's owner/operators in the country at the time. After their McDonald's career, John and Laura went into insurance and have owned a local insurance agency for the past 20years. John has been married to Laura for over 40yrs and have two children Lauren and AJ.




## **Ridgefield Old Timers Association:**

Honoring Ridgefielders since 1992

About 30 years ago, a group of friends got together with the idea of forming an old timers group for Ridgefield. Paul Baker, Julie Petrini, John Tulipani, and Joe Brunetti met at a dinner and decided to model the new organization after old timers groups in Danbury and Norwalk, which had honored several Ridgefield athletes over the years.

The original purpose of the new organization was to honor great athletes who were unable to continue their education past their school days, and set up a scholarship to assist current athletes. The organizers held several meetings and drew in 18 other supporters. They elected a board of officers with Paul Baker as the first chairman. Walt Evans was elected treasurer, and Julie Petrini, the first secretary.

The Ridgefield Old Timers Association began to have awards banquets in October 1992. Seven Ridgefielders were selected to be the honorees and the first Special Award went to Richard E. Venus. The first scholarship recipient was Thomas B. Gareau. He had been accepted at the University of Virginia.

The guest speaker at the first banquet was Spec Shea, a pitcher for the New York Yankees. The advertisement book for that first gathering was only 20 pages, cover to cover. The event was a success and money was put into a scholarship fund.

The first award of the scholarship to a female Ridgefield High School graduate occurred in 1996. Janine Murphy was involved in three sports and many civic endeavors. A year later, it was decided to annually award scholarships to both male and female recipients, and the winners in 1997 were

Charles Bliss and Kerry Bennett. The amount of the scholarships has grown over the years as a result of the advertising placed in this book, as well as other fundraising efforts — especially the annual golf outing and pig roast, which took place in June at the Ridgefield Golf Course.

In the association's second year, it introduced the Civic Award, and the first recipient was Bob Tulipani. The next year, Beth Yanity became the first female recipient of the Civic Award. In 1999, Sandy Pierandri Warner became the first female member of the board of directors; she was also the association's third secretary.

The motivational guest speakers, once thought necessary for a good event, began to make the banquets stretch late into the evening. Members and guests wished to hear more from the award winners. After the event ran until 11:10 p.m. in 1999, the association decided to drop the guest speakers and to feature the honorees, as well as the emcee, often founder Paul Baker, who had a long career as a radio and television broadcaster. In many later years, Tom Belote was emcee.



The Ridgefield Old Timers
Association has continued to meet
annually in October to honor
athletes and others, and to award
scholarship. In 2006, the bylaws
were updated to allow Ridgefield
residents who have lived here at
least 25 years to become members.


