

When the Ridgefield Press honored Jeanne as one of the prominent figures in Ridgefield's history it noted that she was, "a modest woman who eschews publicity about her extensive community service."

Jeanne joined the Ridgefield Symphony Board of Directors in 1973. For many years she held fund raisers, most notably "Derby Night", for the Symphony's benefit at her home. As president and as a board member she devoted thousands of hours to the orchestra and helped lead its growth from a small symphony to an orchestra.

Jeanne is an advocate of volunteerism and, in fact, the Ridgefield Press wrote that she was a "model volunteer." In addition to serving as RSO president from 1991 to 2000 she was one of the four founders of the Ridgefield

"Jeanne Cook is one of Ridgefield's trea- Playhouse and still serves on its advisory board. She has served on the board of the Ridgefield Visiting Nurses Association and is on the advisory boards of the Ridgefield Historical Society and the Community Center. Jeanne was a member of the Board of Directors of the Village Bank and was active in the Chamber of Commerce, Mid-Fairfield County Hospice, the Housatonic Valley Tourism Commission, the Ridgefield 1976 Bicentennial Celebration and many of the town's Fourth of July fireworks programs. Jeanne still serves as a trustee for the Ridgefield Orchestra Foundation. Her daughter Suzanne resides in Oregon and her son Steven resides in Montana.

Jeanne's unanimous selection as our 2009 Civic honoree needs no further elaboration. She has been and continues to be a town treasure.







Exemplary contributions to youth

Vinnie Pannozzo is a native of Ridgefield who graduated from RHS in 1969. During high school he played varsity football for four years and was a member of the undefeated Tiger football team. Vinnie received his bachelor of arts degree in psychology in 1973 from Franklin College in Indiana. During college he was a member of the sport parachute team. He returned to his home town after college and resides here with his wife, Lucretia, and son, VJ. Vin is the owner of Wilridge Distributing.

The Old Timers unanimously voted to honor Vinnie with its special award because of his exemplary contributions to the youth of Ridgefield. It is no wonder why he is so deserving of this award. His activities in town include: coaching Pop Warner football from 1974 to 1977; from 1994 to 2002 he was a Pop Warner coach and also served on its board of directors, including service as the board's vice president and president; from 1993 to 2000 Vinnie coached Ridgefield Youth Lacrosse and was a coach for the RBA between 1993 and 2000; from 2001 to 2004 he served as the co-developer and lead administrator for the Ridgefield High School summer fitness program and now serves as a coach for Ridgefield High's varsity football.

Most significantly, between the period of 1998 and 2008, Vinnie served as an



Ed Zandri, Class of 1954, came from a Ridgefield family of athletes.


He played four years of varsity football at RHS and three years of baseball and basketball.

Bob Leary, Sports Award

Football, in leather helmet days

Bob Leary graduated from Ridgefield High School in 1957 with 36 other classmates. An all around athlete, he played basketball 4 years, baseball 4 years (maintained a batting average of .425) and played center on the football team for 2 years. He distinctly remembers playing football the last year in which the team wore leather helmets.

Bob states the reason for his athletic abilities is because he grew up in the Titicus section of Ridgefield where he learned from his neighbors', the toughest and best ball players in Ridgefield. He cites the likes of past honorees Fibber Biagiotti, Fred Romeo and Jack Coffey to name a few who taught him the game. Growing up in Ridgefield in the 1950's meant that you were never in the house, always outdoors playing ball, swimming, hunting, trapping or fishing. In the winter months, it was ice skating on Mamanasco Lake. In those days if you stayed indoors your Mother would put you to work.

Bob was raised by his widowed Mom, but had a lot of mentors during his formative years, Jack Jones, former honoree and State

Policeman, attended every baseball game Bob played in Ridgefield, many times watching from his police cruiser. Ralph Crouchley, director of the Boys Club coached him in 7th & 8th grade with basketball and baseball. He praises High School coaches, Bill Allen, Paul Fako and Melvin Makowicki for their guidance.

After High School Bob joined the Army and served two years the DMZ over in Korea. Returning home he stayed active in sports by

playing in the Ridgefield Townies Softball league. He has enjoyed a career as journeyman photoengraver. His work included doing all the color photoengraving for publications such as: Life Magazine, National Geographic, Sports Illustrated to name a few. Bob and his wife Kathy, are spending their retired life in sunny Palm Coast, FL. He is looking forward to the Old Times Dinner where he hopes to see a lot of his old fellow classman and teammates.

Dr. Richard Scala, Sports Award

Father of three greats

Dr. Richard Scala, Class of 1950, follows his brothers, Mario and Carl Scala, and his brother-in-law, Tony Del Biondo, as a Ridgefield Old Timer honoree.

Although he says his greatest contribution to Ridgefield athletics was being the father of three of RHS's great hockey players, David, Tom and Greg, his modesty belies the significant contributions he has made to the town. Dick Scala, as he is known by old timers, played three years of RHS varsity football. In his senior year the high school played only three games. That shortened season, however, was because his junior year six-man football squad was so successful that RHS couldn't find enough teams willing to play Ridgefield.

Dick was a member of the Student Council, the RHS band, the Glee Club, the orchestra and the Opera Guild. His classmates noted in the yearbook that "he said little, but to the purpose."

After graduation from RHS, Dick attended the University of Connecticut but was drafted into the Army during the Korean conflict. After his return from military service Dick attended St. Louis University and then Georgetown University School of Dentistry. He returned to his home town and established a dental practice in Branchville, where his wife, Lucy Del Biondo, grew up.

Dick served on the Ridgefield Board of



Rick played guard on the RHS basketball team and was a centerfielder for the baseball team. In his senior year he was voted All-Conference in football.

Following his graduation from RHS, Rick attended Norwich University and graduated from the University of South Florida with a Bachelor of Arts degree in English.


Rick received his Juris Doctorate from North Carolina Central University and has been a practicing attorney since 1975. In

Her senior class voted Pat Ligos the "best athlete" of 1954 (along with Ed Zandri who we honor posthumously tonight).

She was also voted "best personality," "most admired senior," and along with her classmate, Bob Scala, the "best dancer."

She was also voted the senior who had done the most for Ridgefield High.

During her high school years Pat was captain of the Orange and Black cheerleading squad and Vice President of the Athletic Committee.

while maintaining a stellar academic average, she was the class secretary, co-editor of the yearbook, a member of the Opera Guild, the Thespians, the dramatics club, "A Cappella", the glee club, the RHS band and the Hilltop Dispatch.


After RHS Pat attended St. Joseph's College in West Hartford, Connecticut on an academic scholarship where she received a bachelors degree in nursing.




Peter Santini, Sports Award

Peter Santini, Class of 1970 and a native of Ridgefield, comes from a family known for its athletic prowess. Peter's aunt, Gloria Sharkany was the first woman to be honored by the Ridgefield Old Timers with a sports award. Peter's oldest brother, Julius "Bugsy" Santini was honored by this organization in 1998 and another brother, Tom Santini, was honored in 2005.

Peter played three years of varsity football at RHS and was a starter each year. He played fullback and defensive tight end. He was All-Conference and All-Area in foot-

After RHS Peter attended Trinidad Junior College where he started on the school's football team as a running back. He was then recruited by Colorado State University. Peter was known for his strength.

The ROTA Scholarship Winners

When the Ridgefield Old Timers the H.O.M.E. Mission; Safe Rides; National Association was organized in 1992 one of its primary goals was to honor athletes, scholars and notable Ridgefielders of the past by establishing a scholarship endowment for RHS graduates of the future. One year after our first Old Timers' banquet at the Italian American Club Thomas Gareau was awarded the first ROTA stipend for college study.

In 1997 the association began awarding two stipends, one to a senior girl and another to a senior boy. Since then a number of deserving RHS graduating seniors received the association's annual scholarship awards.

In awarding our stipends to Heather Devane and Michael Pierandri, the Old Timers continue their tradition in honoring scholar athletes who are deserving and have contributed greatly to our community.

Heather Devane is one of our two 2009 scholarship recipients. A Ridgefield native, Heather was unanimously selected because of her excellence in academic and athletics and her outstanding extra-curricular activi-

At the time of her selection as a scholarship recipient, Heather had a 4.6 weighted grade point average and had been selected as the RHS 2009 senior scholar athlete.

Heather was a member of the RHS Ski team from grade 9 to 12. She was the team captain in her senior year. Her team won the Class L Division Championships in 2007 and 2008 and the State Championship in 2008. Heather was also a member of the RHS volleyball team from her freshman year through her senior year and was manager of the Boys' volleyball team in her sophomore year.

In addition to sports, her extracurricular

Charity League 9, grades 7 to 12 (she became president of the organization in her senior year); Young Life, grades 9-12; Saint Elizabeth Seton Church Alter server, grades 4 to 12; and she was a member of Hot Shoes Dance Studio Senior Company.

Heather is equally adept in both the arts and sciences, as demonstrated by A+ grades in calculus, physics, English, history and foreign languages. Jean Gaumer, Chairman of Ridgefield High's English Department described Heather as an outstanding student in many ways saying, "She is decidedly intelligent, inquisitive and creative. She is articulate and confident...patient and fair minded. She is grounded but whimsical... Teachers and students, alike, find her reliable, trustworthy and honest."

After receiving notice of her award, Heather told the Old Timers that, as a Ridgefield native, it has always been important to her to be involved in athletics and organizations in town and that she would take her experiences and what she learned in Ridgefield with her as she commences her University studies.

Heather is in her freshman year at Northwestern University in the Medill School of Journalism.

Michael Pierandri is a Ridgefield Native and the son of Mary and John Pierandri. Michael attended Farmingville School and participated in youth soccer, football and lacrosse. He was a running back and linebacker on the Junior Midget and Midget Football Teams that won the Candlewood Valley League and Connecticut State Championships. 
"Mickie" Principi, Class of 1971, is a native of Ridgefield and still resides in his hometown on Bobby's Court.

He played three years of RHS football both as a safety and corner back. In his senior year he was team captain and All-Conference.


Mickie also played guard during three years of Tiger basketball and was centerfielder and a second baseman during his four years on the RHS baseball team.

Honoring Ridgefielders since 1992

More than 15 years ago, a group of and female recipients, and the winners in friends got together with the idea of forming an old timers group for Ridgefield. Paul Banker, Julie Petrini, John Tulipani, and Joe Brunetti met at a dinner. They decided to model the new organization after old timers groups in Danbury and Norwalk, which had already honored several Ridgefield athletes over the years.

The original purpose of the new organization was to honor great athletes who were ent was Bob Tulipani, who is a very active

unable to continue their education past their school days, and set up a scholarship to assist current athletes. The organizers held several meetings and drew in 18 other supporters. They elected a board of officers with Paul Baker as the first chairman. Walt Evans was elected treasurer, a position he still holds and Julie Petrini was the first secretary.

The Ridgefield Old Timers Association began to have awards banquets in October 1992.

Seven Ridgefielders were selected to be the honorees and the first Richard E. Venus. The first banquet scholarship recipient was

The guest speaker at the first banquet was Spec Shea, a pitcher for the New York Yankees.

The advertisement book for that first gathering was only 20 pages, cover to cover. The event was a success and money was put into a scholarship fund. 
In the association's second year, it introduced the Civic Award, and the first recipi-



The three high schools



In 1882 governor Phineas C. Lounsbury donated the land and money to building a new Bailey Avenue grammar school (top). Soon, the premises became inadequate and Dr. William H. Allee donated land for the East Ridge School, opened in 1915. One year later the town voted to establish a Hamilton High School in the old ing on Bailey Avenue. The school had no gym; town hall was used for basketball. The growth of the secondary enrollment made it necessary to move the high school to the East Ridge

School in 1926. The school was remodeled in 1925 and 1939 and additions built in 1957 and 1968. In 1952 the Veteran Park School was built as an elementary school. Grades K-3 were moved to there and later, and later schools meant all elementary grades could move out of East Ridge. By the late 1960s, East Ridge was overcrowded again and the current RHS (bottom) was opened in 1972.—T.B.
