

Charles 'Chuck' Camp, Lifetime Achievement

Award-winning journalist

in their lives after gradufrom Ridgefield High. Last year we voted to rectify that problem and voted to honor deserving Ridgefield alumni with Life Time Achievement Awards. Native Ridgefielder, Chuck Camp, was unanimously selected as our first such honoree.

Chuck grew up on South Olmstead Road in the small pre-Revolutionary home that is now the home of former ROTA honoree and Ridgefield Press executive editor Jack Sanders and his wife Sally. In his high school year book Chuck said his ambition was to become a journalist. True to his ambition Chuck became

a nationally renowned reporter and editor.

In fact, Chuck started his career in journalism in Ridgefield. As a youngster Chuck published a neighborhood paper that included the goings-on in the Olmstead area including the neighborhood box car racing results. In high school Chuck furthered his ambition by writing for the Hilltop Dispatch and editing the 1960 Caudatowan Yearbook. Chuck excelled in academics at RHS. He was a member of the National Honor Society and was the school's National Merit Scholar. Chuck was also a member of the Student Council and served as Vice-President of his class.

In addition to his intellectual and social successes, Chuck was an athlete. He played four years of varsity football at RHS on both

Chuck attributes the fact that RHS's developing eleven-man football program was short in the win column to the fact that he, like other team mates, had to play both offense and defense and by half time they were exhausted. ("I was so worn out from playing every minute of offense and defense that second halves inevitably were disasters. We either

needed more kids or 30minute games. If you count first halves only, we won a lot of the time.") Chuck takes some consolation in the fact that his squad did beat Wilton 8-6.

After graduation Chuck attended Syracuse University on scholarship. Chuck decided to forego NCAA college football and directed his attention to scholarship and his ambition. He graduated from Syracuse in 1964-Magna Cum Laude and Phi Beta Kappa!

Following Syracuse, Chuck began a 44year career as a reporter and editor. He retired in 2006 after having served the Wall Street Journal as a reporter, bureau chief and several editing positions including Senior Editor, Acting National News Editor, and he was the WSJ's Page One Staff Editor. Chuck worked for the journal in New York, the offense and defensive teams. (Chuck's Cleveland, Detroit and Houston. In addi-

tion to the Wall Street Journal Chuck was also employed as a reporter, editor and business editor at the Dallas Morning News. His career before the Wall Street Journal also included work at the Syracuse Post-

Standard, the Buffalo Courier Express and

the Lexington, Kentucky Herald Leader.

Chuck was an honoree at the UCLA Anderson School of Management, Gerald Loeb Awards. The Loeb Awards honor journalists who make significant contributions to the understanding of business, finance and the economy. Recognizing Chuck's work at the Wall Street Journal, the committee also recognized his work for the Lexington Herald Leader where he investigated the systematic failures behind Appalachian Kentucky's worsening prescription drug abuse problem. In 2003 the Herald-Leader published its prize-winning

series, "Prescription for Pain." That reporting also led Chuck to outline the corporate sales strategy that helped make the narcotic OxyContin so abundant in rural Kentucky that it became known as "Hillbilly Heroin."

Chuck's thoughts about growing up in Ridgefield: "Being a kid in Ridgefield in the 1950's was an almost magical experience. My friends and I grew up feeling secure, carefree and confident. Not just our friends and families but the entire community encouraged us to stretch to the limits of our abilities. Most important, we were schooled by remarkable educators, who sent us out into the world with an understanding that knowing the right answer is often less important than asking the right question."

Chuck lives in Georgetown, Kentucky with his wife June. The Camps have three children: Donna, Bill and Debbie.

After college Abe was also very active in town matters,



Tom also enjoyed every game against New Milford and found that these teams seemed to be evenly matched and always competitive. While to RHS Tom was his class Vice-President served on the student council; was a member of the Opera Guild and Glee Club (an interest he must have acquired from his father "Carusso") and played gold for the school team.

The 'winningest' coach





Pro-hockey player from RHS


Chris Winnes, a native Ridgefielder, played ice hockey for RHS from his freshman year to senior year. He was 1st Team All State from an unbeaten RHS hockey team. Chris also played on the RHS baseball, football, and soccer teams. Following his graduation from RHS Chris attended Northwood Prep School in Lake Placid, NY where he was selected by the Boston Bruins in the 1987 entry draft (9th choice, 161 overall).

Chris played four year Chris Winnes, RHS 1986 (1987-1991) at the University

to lead his team in scoring, resulting in his nomination to the Hockey East All-Freshman team.

At the conclusion of his senior year with the Wildcats in 1990-91 Chris joined the Maine Mariners of the American Hockey League before making his NHL debut with the Bruins during the 1991 playoffs. He spent most of the 1991-92 season with the Mariners, but would go on to play 24 games with the Bruins that season and later competed at the World

of New Hampshire. During the 1987-88 Championships as a member of the 1992 season, he became the first freshman ever U.S. National team. After playing NHL

Chris retired from hockey following the

1999-2000 seasons, ending a career which saw him play 34 NHL games, tallying one goal and six assists for seven points.

Following his retirement from pro hockey Chris became a firefighter in Warwick, Rhode Island. Chris lives in Bristol, Rhode Island, with his wife Elizabeth. The Winnes' have five children Zack, Lexi, Josh, Bella and Noah.

Janel Jorgensen, Sports Award

Olympic medalist swimmer

Janel Jorgensen rose to national prominence while still in high school when she won two gold medals at the Pan American Games. That momentum catapulted her to qualify the next year for the US Olympic team that traveled to Seoul, South Korea in 1988. The then 17 year old Jorgensen won a silver medal in the women's 400 medley relay and finished 5th overall in the 100 Butterfly. Jorgensen then went home to Ridgefield, CT to begin her senior year in high school. Her swimming and academic success took her to Stanford University where she graduated in 1993 with a degree in Psychology. Jorgensen held four American records, was a 27 time All American, won 15 NCAA championship titles, and is currently a member of the Stanford Hall of Fame. Jorgensen parlayed her athletic and academic success into a fast rising 12 year career at Oracle where she worked in strategic development. After participating in and working as a volunteer and a board member of Swim Across America for 18 years, Jorgensen decided to dedicate her life to enduring the success of the program and growing SAA's impact on communities, families, individuals and cancer research.

In October 2005 she took over the Executive Director duties of SAA and through the efforts of hundreds of volunteers and a dedicated board of directors, oversaw a 2006 campaign that raised over \$2.2 million for cancer research, treatment and prevention. The 2007 campaign increased those results to \$2.5 million. Jorgensen travels the country raising charitable funding and corporate support. She delivers



Ridgefield High has had many spectacular baseball stars in its history. Most of them have been honored by the Old Timers for their great performances at RHS during the 1930's, 40's and 50's, as well as, during their many seasons with the Ridgefield Townies league and the inter-town municipal leagues of the 1930's and 40's. Tony was an ALL FCIAC player and FCIAC Player of the Year in his junior year at RHS. As a senior he was ALL STATE pitcher and was twice the captain of his RHS baseball team.

After RHS Tony went to Northeastern Oklahoma A & M, a junior college in Miami, Oklahoma, where he was a twotime all conference player and captain of

his team. He set the school record for home runs, extra base hits and RBI's. In his last year Tony was named the Northern Oklahoma college athlete of the year. From there Tony went to Texas Christian University to play his final two years of college baseball. He was a twoyear starter and was named captain in his senior year. Tony set the school single season record for total hits and extra base hits. These accomplishments were achieved when TCU was part

Richard Ligi, Posthumous Award

Both a chief and a coach

The Ridgefield Old Timers post humously honor former Police Chief Richard Ligi for his dedication to the Ridgefield Police Department and his work as a coach of many of Ridgefield's young Little Leaguers. Chief Ligi died on September 12, 2008.

"Rich" as he was affectionately known by his many friends was born at Danbury Hospital on December 10, 1947 to Ridea (Fuligni) Ligi of Ridgefield and the late Navio Ligi. He graduated from Ridgefield High School in the Class of 1965 where he was a member of its golf team and Post University of Waterbury. He was a Little League Baseball coach as well as a coach of the Ridgefield Summer League Nighthawks Baseball Tem.

He enjoyed the outdoors; most especially hunting with Tom Belote and another of our posthumous awardees, Richard Serfilippi. He also enjoyed owning and driving his Corvette and Thunderbird.

A member of the Italian American Mutual Aid Society, he was also a member of St. Mary's Church.

Chief Ligi joined the Ridgefield Police Department in 1967 as a clerk. In 1968, he became a "supernumerary," a person trained in police procedures who had the power to make arrests. He became a full-time officer in 1969 and ranked first in his class of 30 at the Connecticut Police Academy. He was promoted to sergeant in 1977, lieutenant in 1980, captain in 1990, major in 1996 and chief in 1999.

In 1969 and 1970, the Officer Ligi received the department's exceptional service award and was named the department's officer of the year in 1977.

He was member of the Fairfield County, Connecticut and New England Police Chief's Association.

Chief Ligi was predeceased by a son, Rick Ligi in 1955

In addition to his wife, Dale Tulipani, of 39 years and mother, Chief Ligi is survived by his daughter and son in law, Rebecca and Case Braskamp of Westport, and an uncle, Dante Ligi and his wife Joyce of Ridgefield.

Richard T. McGlynn, Posthumous Award

Our first professional fire chief

Like Police Chief Richard Ligi, who we are honoring tonight, Fire Chief McGlynn was a native Ridgefielder. He grew up in the family home across Catoonah Street from the fire house. As a youngster and young man Dick McGlynn had an interest in stock cars and built them in the barn behind his family's house. The barn was the first Roman Catholic in town and now houses the Thrift Shop.

He joined the Ridgefield Volunteer Fire Department and began fighting fires while a high school student at RHS, before he joined the US Navy during the WWII and served in the Pacific abroad the USS Hugh Purvis. Upon his return, Chief McGlynn joined the force, as well as assisting his father in the operation of the family plumbing business. A member of the Ridgefield Volunteer Fire Department, in addition to being a member of the paid firefighters, he was elected chief of the volunteer department from 1964 to 1968. In 1973, he became the paid department's first chief, a post he held until his retirement in 1989.

He had early hobbies of fishing, hunting, and race car driving at the former Danbury Fair grounds. A member of the Connecticut and Fairfield County Fire Chiefs' Association, he was also a member of St. Mary's Church, Ridgefield.




Richard Serfilippi, Posthumous Award

The ROTA Scholarship Winners

When the Ridgefield Old Timers Association was organized in 1992 one of its primary goals was to honor athletes, scholars and notable Ridgefielders of the past by establishing a scholarship endowment for RHS graduates of the future. One year after our first Old Timer's banquet at the Italian American Club Thomas Gareau was awarded the first ROTA stipend for college study.

In 1997 the association began awarding two stipends, one to a senior girl and another to a senior boy. Since then a number of deserving RHS graduating seniors received the association's annual scholarship awards.

In 2008 we began awarding our new four-year-scholarships. This year recipients are Mary Shaw and Duncan Morrissey. In granting these scholarships the Old Timers continue their tradition in honoring scholar athletes who are deserving and have contributed to our community.

Mary Shaw

Mary Shaw was a member of the National Honor Society and received the high school's Excellency awards in Functions, U.S. History, geometry and Achievement awards in chemistry, english, trigonometry, algebra, geometry and social studies. She had a weighted GPA of 4.061 and an unweighted GPA of 3.915

Mary's school activities included Student Government (Secretary) in 9th grade and Student Government (Senator) in her sophomore, junior and senior years. She was a member of the Tigers Den during all four years of high school. She also competed in DECA.



He was also awarded the Junior Book Award and received Achievement awards in honor geometry, spanish, social studies and music technology.



The three high schools

In 1882 governor Phineas C. Lounsbury donated the land and money to building a new Bailey Avenue grammar school (top). Soon, the premises became inadequate and Dr. William H. Allee donated land for the East Ridge School, opened in 1915. One year later the town voted to establish a Hamilton High School in the old building on Bailey Avenue. The school had no gym; town hall was

used for basketball. The growth of the secondary enrollment made it necessary to move the high school to the East Ridge School in 1926. The school was remodeled in 1925 and 1939 and additions built in 1957 and 1968. In 1952 the Veteran Park School was built as an elementary school. Grades K-3 were moved to there and later, and later schools meant all elementary grades could move out of East Ridge. By the late 1960s, East Ridge was overcrowded again and the current RHS (bottom) was opened in 1972.—T.B.

The advertisement book for that first gathering was only 20 pages, cover to cover. The event was a success and money was put into a scholarship fund. The award of the scholarship to a female Ridgefield High School graduate occurred in 1996. Janine Murphy was involved in three sports and many civic endeavors. A year later, it was decided to annually award scholarships to both male bers."

More than 15 years ago, a group of and female recipients, and the winners in 1997 were Charles Bliss and Kerry Bennett. 


