

EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR: Bill Monti

A Great Influence

William Monti has had a great influence on many students and faculty members in Ridgefield over a period of

thirty one years. Having been in five different educational positions during his career, Mr. Monti never lost his true calling which was to inspire and motivate every person that he met.

Starting as a middle school social studies teacher at East Ridge Middle School in 1974. Mr. Monti went on to become the department head for social studies and then a house administrator. After thirteen vears at ERMS, he went on as the beloved principal of Ridgebury Elementary School for twelve years and then returned to his teaching

roots at Ridgefield High School, teaching freshman and sophomore World History and senior Government and Politics for twelve years.

In 2004, Mr. Monti was the Ridgefield Teacher of the Year and in 1989-90, he was named to Who's Who in Education. Always closely connected to the faculty, Mr. Monti still plays poker with former Ridgefield High School staff members and golfs every possible Wednesday with former ERMS teachers, Nat Recine and Herbert Romisher.

There are few people that can be equally as successful as a teacher and an administrator, but Mr. Monti had no trouble doing both well. He was always charismatic, sincere, honest, fun loving, hardworking and knowledgeable. Mr. Monti wanted to know his students and faculty individually and was willing to work with them on the tough issues.

When asked what he thought his legacy was in regard to the Ridgefield School System, Mr. Monti replied, "I think that I had a positive influence on the students, their parents, and the faculty when I was part of the Ridgefield School system."

Getting his BA undergraduate degree in history from Holy Cross College, Mr. Monti went on to get his MA in history from Central Connecticut State University and then his sixth year administrative degree from Southern Connecticut State University. Mr. Monti loved to learn and was a true "history buff."

Today when he listens to people talk about education he realizes that the "buzz words" may have changed but feels the substantive portions of any good teaching remain the same. To him certain methods and materials may have evolved, but not how you get rapport and respect, how you develop a motivational lesson or lead a discussion, or how you interact with faculty members to provide leadership.

Mr. Monti does not like to give advice unless someone asks and then he does it by example, not as a mandate. From time to time he "bumps" into former students at public functions, and warm greetings and stories are always exchanged. Mr. Monti particularly likes meeting up with students who he knew as kindergarteners and are now grown adults with families.

After twenty four years, Mr. Monti is still living in Woodbury with his wife, Barbara. They have three children all in their forties and 11 grandchildren that they love to take fishing, bowling, and on special trips.

As a retiree, Mr. Monti is still active in government, serving on the finance committee for his town. He also like to garden, travel to Europe and to Alabama to visit one of his sons, and is very close to his own siblings who love to golf together.

For Mr. Monti life is very good.

Jack Herr 'The Band Man'

Ridgefield is the only place in the United States, other than Washington D.C., that can boast of having a military band play at least once a year for 50 years. And to whom can we attribute this honor? To Ridgefield musician, Mr. Jack Herr, who started the tradition back in 1967 when he moved to Ridgefield and began to manage and own several NAPA, Automobile Parts Stores.

With a mother who gave piano lessons, Herr always loved music. He did not want to play the piano, however, as he loved reed instruments, especially the clarinet.

"I played in every type of band possible during junior high school, high school, college and after college," commented Herr. I just loved to play music, especially Dixieland, but I never considered music for a profession."

"In fact, after graduating from Ohio State in plant and nursery management, I decided to go into the Army and become a helicopter pilot, "Herr explained. "But while waiting for my helicopter training assignment, the Army discovered that I played multiple instruments and said we need you for the Army band."

"My parents were thrilled as this would make use of my education and musical talents and keep me in the United States. I would also be playing with the 72 member 101 Airborne Division Band, a very famous Army band at the time. I was also happy as it would take me off the farm and away from milking cows."

Herr played with the prestigious Airborne Band for two and half years, traveling throughout the United States. Along the way he developed fast friendships with band members, many who would go on to play with well-known symphony orchestras. He would also get the opportunity to play solo numbers all over the country and even conduct the West Point and Coast Guard Bands.

After settling in Ridgefield and becoming active in the American Legion in town, Herr decided to use his connections to bring just about every band the military organizes to come to town for free concerts two or three times a year. He was responsible for bringing over 140 concerts to Ridgefield over the last 50 years, Jack was known around town and nationally as "The Band Man." Getting the bands to Ridgefield and all the organization it entails, was not easy but Herr found it very rewarding when he saw the crowds that it drew and the joy that it brought to the people of the town.

Ridgefield owes so much to Herr for all of his volunteerism for the past half century, but Herr said he couldn't do it alone. He would like to thank George Besse, from the American Legion, Barbara Manners, and the two new men that will take over after him, Chuck Trado and John Willie.

Herr was proud of the fact that he was able to play for President Truman and bring joy to so many people over the years. He was also proud that due to his organizational skills and connections, the military bands chose to come to Ridgefield over other places. Being able to bring military music to some very small towns and being able to bring the distinguished Pershing's Own part of the Army band to Ridgefield three times, has also brought him satisfaction.

"Seeing tears come to the eyes of listeners from time to time, makes it all worthwhile," commented Herr.



<u>SPECIAL AWARD</u> Eugene F. Healy A Mentor of Ridgefield's Youth

If you or your children played Babe Ruth Baseball, Townies Basketball (girls and boys) or Girls Softball in Ridgefield during the seventies thru the early eighties, then you or your children played for or against a team coached by Eugene "Gene" Healy. For 15 years, Gene was a coach and mentor to more than 400 young men and women on more than 40 teams. Perhaps what is equally impressive is that 30+ of those teams did not have any of Gene's 5 children on them.

Gene was born in Brooklyn, NY on Christmas Eve 1933. Gene attended St Michael's High School and then St John's University graduating in 1955. That year proved to have 2 more highlights for Gene – the Dodgers won the World Series and more importantly Gene married his bride Josephine "Jo" Healy.

From 1952 thru 1957 Gene was in the Marine Corp Reserves at bases in Paris Island, SC, Quantico, VA and Cherry

Point, NC. As an interesting aside, it was in the Marine's in that Gene and Jo met and became lifelong friends with fellow Ridgefielder's Ann and Ray Hastings. While Gene and Jo miss Ann greatly, they get together with Ray weekly to talk about old times, their children and grandchildren, current events including Ray's golf game and next week's doctors appointments.

Gene and Jo have 5 children: Kathy (Immaculate HS 74), Kevin (RHS 75), Jeanne (RHS 76), Maureen (RHS 79) and Eileen (RHS 82).

Gene started his business career with the American Can Company in 1957. Along the way, the Healy Clan moved from Brooklyn, NY to Valley Stream, LI to Barrington, IL to Appleton, WI and finally Ridgefield, CT in 1968.

Gene's 1st coaching assignment in Ridgefield in the late sixties was a Little League Minor League team sponsored by Lelak's Delicatessen. The following year in 1970, Gene moved on to coach Babe Ruth Baseball with an expansion team sponsored by Czar Construction. Other Babe Ruth team sponsors (coaches) that year were Pamby Motors (Casey Darrah), Caboose (Chuck Dean), Walsh Realty (Tony Martinich), Keeler and Durant (Carl Kline), St. Mary's (Don Miner), Ridgefield Savings Bank (Charlie Coles) and VFW (Bob Scarlett). Also throughout the seventies, Gene and his friend and long-time Ridgefield volunteer Ray Altier managed the Townies Basketball League, expanding the league and teams and later in the seventies starting Townies Basketball for girls. Jo Healy remembers Gene's coaching years saying "we had a 2 car garage but never put any cars in as we had 40 basketballs, 80 baseball bats, 40 batting helmets, 15 bags of catchers gear and 20 boxes of uniforms".

Gene continued to coach thru the early 80's and also served as the Commissioner of Ridgefield Parks & Recreation from 1978 thru 1982. And from 1987 on, Gene has served as the President of "Friends of Ridgefield" at Parks & Recreation working closely with his friend Paul Roche.

Gene and Jo left Ridgefield in 2001 but didn't go far, moving to Lake Place in Danbury. Over the years, their family has expanded from 5 children to include 1 daughter-in-law, 3 son-in-laws, 10 grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren.

When told that ROTA was going to honor him, Gene humbly said "that is very nice and appreciated but not necessary and never expected. My volunteer activities provided me great personal satisfaction. Hopefully along the way I made a small difference in some young men's and women's lives".





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<u>SPORTS AWARD</u> Stan Engelhardt, '68 Three-Year All-WCC

In the summer of 1965 the Engelhardt family moved from West Hempsted, Long Island to Ridgefield, which had only one traffic light at the time. For Engelhardt, Squash's




News Store was the center of his activities and Grossfield's was the only store in town where he could buy clothes.

As a young boy Engelhardt discovered the Ridgefield Boy's Club and director, Ed Helminski. It was here that Engelhardt started to form real friendships along with playing basketball, ping pong and pool. In November of his sophomore year, Engelhardt made the **Ridgefield High School** Varsity basketball team as a starter since Senior Captain, Rudy Marconi, was out with mononucleosis. That 1965-66 basketball team was one of the best in the school's history.

Engelhardt's head coach during his sophomore and junior years was Harry Hyra, actress Meg Ryan's father. He made Engelhardt into a team player who knew how to play defense. Hyra made the team practice until their tongues were dragging on the court. Coach Hyra also taught his team about life in general. Englehardt believes that Coach Hyra was the reason that he made First Team All WCC Basketball for three years in a row.

Engelhardt's first love, however, was Varsity Baseball and playing short stop. For this sport Engelhardt was fortunate enough to be coached by the iconic Bill Allen, and again was named for three vears to the First Team ALL WCC, but this time for baseball. Also on both ALL WCC teams with Engelhardt were Steve Martin. John Stolle, Tom Santini, and Rudy Marconi. Since Coach Hyra was convinced that Englehardt's bony body would be broken in half in football, Engelhardt chose instead to run cross country for two years, usually coming in last place. Engelhardt also belonged to the

Varsity Club, was a sport's writer for the Ridgefield Press and worked on the RHS yearbook.

After graduating from Ridgefield High School in 1968, Engelhardt went on to the University of Pennsylvania where he played short stop on the Varsity Baseball Team and played in the Cape Cod Summer Baseball League. He had been recruited to play basketball for the University of Massachusetts and had he chosen to go to this university, he would have been a teammate of Julius Erving, Dr. J.

Engelhardt continued his university career at Wharton School of Business and has had a variety of sales and management positions in printing, publishing, software and flooring. For the last ten years he has been happily employed with PNC Bank in Pennsylvania.

Over the years Engelhardt has coached many youth sports; soccer, basketball and girls' softball, where he met his second wife who was coaching her daughter. Engelhardt believes in working to win but also believes that teamwork and sportsmanship are the key ingredients in athletics, along with respect for the opponent.



SPORTS AWARD Bob Phalen, '78 Decorated Track and Football Star

Bob Phalen, RHS class of 1978, was a fantastic high school athlete. Bob was a speed demon on the track and as a



football receiver caught every pass thrown in his direction. Bob is highly deserving of the Old Timers Athletic Award.

Bob is the son of the late Bob Phalen Sr. and Barbara Phalen. The Phalen's moved from Buffalo to Ridgefield in 1972. Bob is the second of three Phalen boys. His older brother Mike and his younger brother Dan were also track stars at RHS.

Bob honed his athletic skills early in life by participating in several Ridgefield youth sports activities. In little league baseball, Bob played three years for Community Center. Community Center, coached at that time by the legendary Jack Darlington, won the town championship all three years

Bob was on the team.

Bob also played three years of Pop Warner football in Ridgefield. Those teams also registered town championships each year.


Finally, Bob played several years of Townie basketball. I have seen Bob play basketball and I don't think he led those teams to championships!!!

In high school football Bob was a three year starter at wide receiver. Bob had terrific hands and an uncanny ability to locate the soft spots in the defense. He was an extraordinary receiver and won many awards for his stellar play. In his sophomore year Bob caught over 20 passes and was named to the first team All-Area football team.

In his prolific junior year, Bob had over 50 receptions and was named first team All-FCIAC, first team All-Area and first team All-State. Simply put, in his junior year Bob was the best high school wide receiver in the state of Connecticut!

In his senior year, Bob battled injuries but still managed to catch over 40 passes and was named first team All-FCIAC and first team All-Area. Bob served as a captain of the football team his senior year.

For all three years when Bob played receiver for RHS, the quarterback throwing him those passes was Paul "Willie" Bossidy, a previous Old **Timers Athletic** Award honoree. Paul was not a particularly gifted quarterback and many of those passes to Bob were off the mark. But


Several colleges took note of Bob's immense talent on the football field. The University of Connecticut awarded him a full four year football scholarship. Bob graduated from UCONN in 1983 with a B.S. in Marketing.

SPORTS AWARD Mike Bossidy, '87 Three Sport Standout

Mike Bossidy, RHS class of 1987, was an outstanding high school athlete. Mike excelled in football, basketball and baseball at RHS. Incredibly, over his high school career Mike earned all-FCIAC recognition in all three sports. No one is more deserving of the Old Timers Athletic Award than Mike Bossidy.

Mike is the son of Larry and Nancy Bossidy, who moved their family to Ridgefield in 1970. Mike is the eighth of nine children and his two older brothers (Larry Jr. and Paul) are previous honorees. As the youngest of three boys, Mike was introduced to sports early in his life. In fact he began serving as the bat boy for Larry Jr's summer baseball teams at six years old!

Mike loved baseball, basketball and football from the beginning. He developed his athletic skills participating in Townie basketball, Ridgefield Little League baseball, Pony/Colt baseball and various travel basketball teams.

Mike attributes some of his athletic success to the superb coaching he received early in his sports career. Specifically, Mike wants tonight to recognize Jack McDonald. Ray Altier. Dick Bellagamba, Jim Baker, Scott Mason and Mike "Buddha" Bedini and Ed Helminski from the Ridgefield Boys Club.

In high school, Mike threw for over 2,000 yards as a three year starting quarterback for the Tiger football team. His single season passing record of 1,221 yards (which he rudely snatched from his brother Paul) stood for over 20 years. Though Mike was from a family not known for foot speed, he had the ability to occasionally tuck the football away and leg out some nice gains on the ground. Mike served as a captain of the football team his senior year.

In basketball, Mike scored over 400 points as a two year starter at guard for the Tigers. Mike was a

superb ball handler, shooter and passer in hoop.

And finally as a two year starter at third base for the Tiger baseball team, Mike collected over 50 base hits and again served as a captain in his senior season.

Mike's athletic success in high school did not come at the expense of academics....despite being busy with sports all year, Mike maintained a solid B+ average throughout high school.

Mike continued to benefit from great coaching in high school and tonight wants to recognize Coach Maiolo, Coach Forcelli, Coach Lancaster and Coach Caginello.

After high school Mike played a year of baseball at the University of New Hampshire before transferring and graduating from Boston College. He later earned an MBA degree from Johns Hopkins University.

Mike has lived in New Canaan CT since 1999. He has been married to his amazing wife Julie for 25 years and they have four children: Michael Jr (24), Teddy (22), Madeleine (20) and Josie (18). mother was a linguist proficient in six languages. She had only one brother who studied philosophy and art history and now works in the antiques business.

At age seven, Lena started playing soccer, originally on a boy's house league team. Her coach for her early travel soccer team was Joe Colanari in the fall and spring. Lena also played indoor soccer in the winter under Mr. Colanari's direction. Her most memorable tournaments include going to Columbia, Maryland, and Lake Placid, New York.



While a student at Ridgefield High School, Lena played varsity soccer for three years. She was a starter on the varsity for the last three years and played on Ridgefield High School's FCIAC Champion Girls' Soccer Team for 1987. She also played on the Connecticut State Soccer Team, was All-FCIAC in her senior year, and was named Outstanding Senior Athlete for the year.



Mia Heissan, a proud 1985 Ridgefield High School graduate, put her mark on sports early on in life. She was not only the first girl to play



soccer for SCOR along with Elizabeth Hughes, but she was also the first girl (along with Bridget Stearns) to play ice hockey in the Ridgefield Youth Hockey Program.

Although Mia was not able to try out for the RHS ice hockey program, she went on to play with what is now known as the Connecticut Women's All Stars. After playing with the All Stars, Mia was offered a full hockey scholarship to Colgate, but chose to go to her dad's university, Cornell, instead. At Cornell Mia play Division I ice hockey under Randy

May, NCAA Coach of the Year.

In addition to being an outstanding ice hockey player, Mia also played varsity soccer, was captain of the team, and was named three times to All FCIAC and two times to the All-Star Team. When not playing soccer or hockey, Mia was captain of the RHS ski team, named number 3 in the states and was a New England qualifier, and played varsity softball. In her year book Mia was named the female most likely to go to the Olympics.




<u>SPORTS AWARD</u> Mike Enright, '80 A Passion for Basketball


available to Mike basketball became his passion. He carried his passion for basketball to Ridgefield High School and on to college at Villanova University.

<u>SPORTS AWARD</u> Pat Enright, '83 'No Better Town'



guard, earning All FCIAC status during his junior year. During his senior year Pat made the All FCIAC, second team.



Ridgefield Old Timers Association: *Honoring Ridgefielders since 1992*

About 27 years ago, a group of friends got together with the idea of forming an old timers group for Ridgefield. Paul Baker, Julie Petrini, John Tulipani, and Joe Brunetti met at a dinner and decided to model the new organization after old timers groups in Danbury and Norwalk, which had honored several Ridgefield athletes over the years.

The original purpose of the new organization was to honor great athletes who were unable to continue their education past their school days, and set up a scholarship to assist current athletes. The organizers held several meetings and drew in 18 other supporters. They elected a board of officers with Paul Baker as the first chairman. Walt Evans was elected treasurer, and Julie Petrini, the first secretary.

The Ridgefield Old Timers Association began to have awards banquets in October 1992. Seven Ridgefielders were selected to be the honorees and the first Special Award went to Richard E. Venus.



The first scholarship recipient was Thomas B. Gareau. He had been accepted at the University of Virginia. The guest speaker at the first banquet was Spec Shea, a pitcher for the New York Yankees. The advertisement book for that first gathering was only 20 pages, cover to cover. The event was a success and money was put into a scholarship fund.

The first award of the scholarship to a female Ridgefield High School graduate occurred in 1996. Janine Murphy was involved in three sports and many civic endeavors. A year later, it was decided to

annually award scholarships to both male and female recipients, and the winners in 1997 were Charles Bliss and Kerry Bennett. The amount of the scholarships has grown over the years as a result of the advertising placed in this book, as well as other fundraising efforts — especially the annual golf outing and pig roast, which took place in June at the Ridgefield Golf Course.

In the association's second year, it introduced the Civic Award, and the first recipient was Bob Tulipani. The next year, Beth Yanity became the first female recipient of the Civic Award. In 1999, Sandy Pierandri Warner became the first female member of the board of directors; she was also the association's third secretary.

The motivational guest

speakers, once thought necessary for a good event, began to make the banquets stretch late into the evening. Members and guests wished to hear more from the award winners. After the event ran until 11:10 p.m. in 1999, the association decided to drop the guest speakers and to feature the honorees, as well as the emcee, often founder Paul Baker, who had a long career as a radio and television broadcaster. In many later years, Tom Belote was emcee.

The Ridgefield Old Timers Association has continued to meet annually in October to honor athletes and others, and to award scholarship. In 2006, the bylaws were updated to allow Ridgefield residents who have lived here at least 25 years to become members. Before this, members had to be natives and/or graduates of Ridgefield High School. And to paraphrase the United States Marine Corps, "we are always looking for a few, very good, hard-working new members."

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






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
