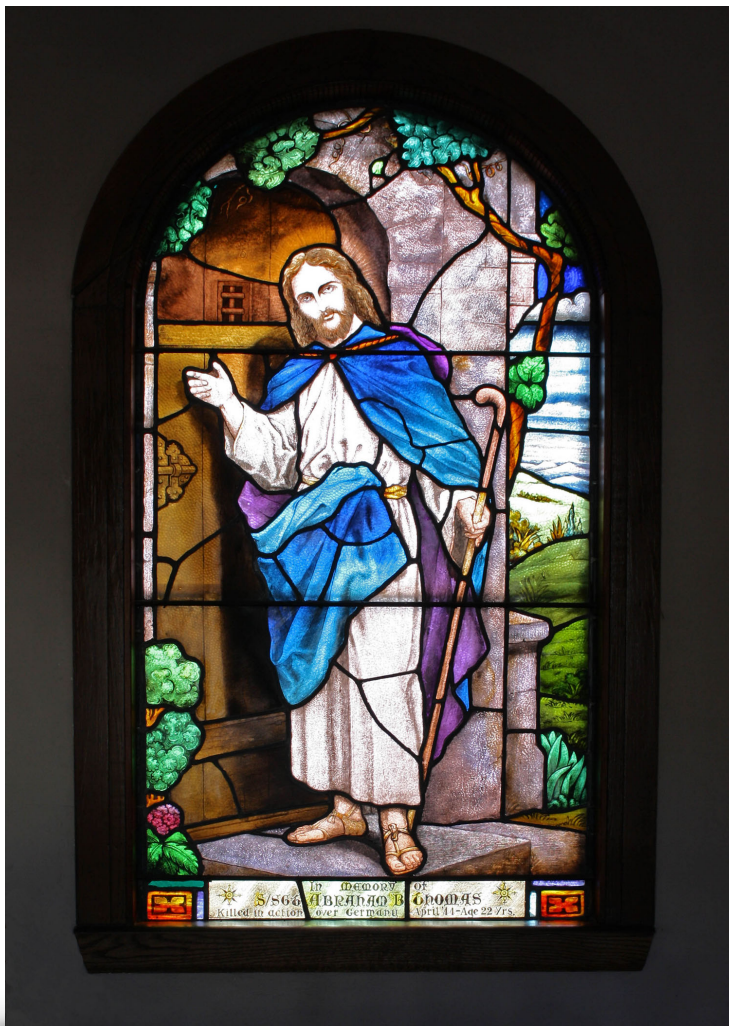

Our History

Humble Beginnings

This is a brief record of the tremendous effort of the Reverend W. J. Day and the group of dedicated Christians who together organized our church and shepherded it through the early years of our existence.

The modest beginning of our congregation began in May of 1876 when the committee representing surrounding communities approached the Reverend William J. Day, pastor of the Coalville (Ashley) Presbyterian Church to assist them in organizing a Presbyterian Sunday School in the Mountain Top area.

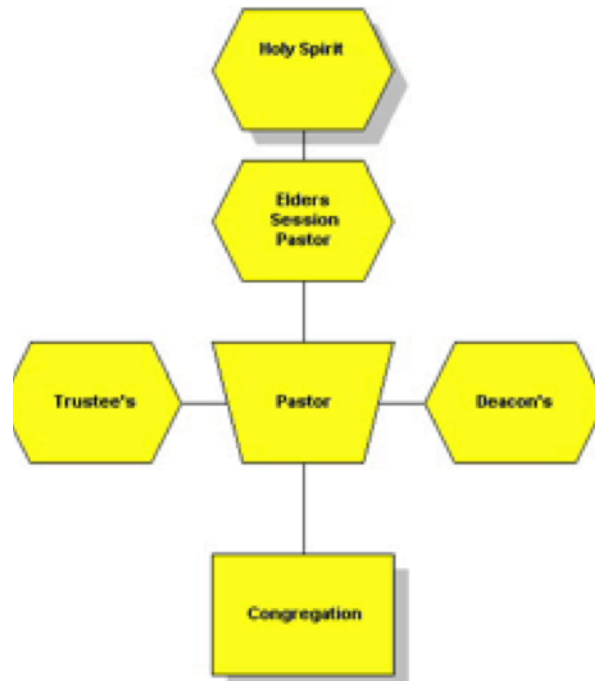
In June of 1879, the trustees resolved to purchase land for a church structure. The Lehigh Coal and Navigation Company donated a lot 100' X 190' on the Penobscot, White Haven Road. The deed was dated August 26, 1879. A building committee hired a contractor, Samuel Dutt and ground was broken in September 1879. The building was completed in early 1880. The building was dedicated on February 20, 1880.

The church remained a branch of the Ashley Presbyterian Church until 1887, with Rev. Day providing the pastoral care for both churches until 1887. In April of that year, Rev. Day, at a meeting of the Lackawanna Presbytery, presented a request that the Mountain Top Church be separated from the Ashley Church and be reorganized as The Presbyterian Church of Mountain Top. The request to separate the Ashley Church and the Presbyterian Church of Mountain Top was granted and the decision was entered in the Session minutes of May 22, 1887.

By 1926 the church had outgrown the original location. Under the direction of the Reverend Andrew Scott, a plan was presented to and approved by the Presbytery to secure a location for a new and larger building. In 1927 the present land was purchased. Early in May of 1928, ground was broken and on July 15, 1928, at 3:00 P.M. Mrs. Emma Johnson was given the honor of laying the Corner Stone. Work on erecting the building started immediately with masonry contractor H. O. Roth under the supervision of D. R. Koons, general contractor.

On November 11, 1928, at the 11:00 AM service our present brick building was dedicated.

The Pastor

Reverend Lory D. Ryan:

Pastor Ryan came to us after we had spent over 2 years of searching for a pastor. We wanted to be sure that we had the right person for fill the shoes of our former pastor. We were thrilled to to have him join us in November of 2022. Here is his bio:

I grew up in Ewing Township, New Jersey in a Presbyterian family. My call story begins at age 16 after preaching my first sermon at Vincentown Baptist Church in Vincentown, New Jersey, where my grandfather was a member. A graduate from Susquehanna University in 1985 with a BA in Economics, I was inducted into the Pi Gamma Mu Honor Society for Social Sciences. After college, I began a career as a commercial insurance professional, working 28 years advancing to manager level positions in underwriting, sales, and marketing. God's call on my life includes using my commercial insurance experience to assist the Presbytery and individual churches, and I am open to the Holy Spirit to use my life and my secular vocation experiences in ministry.

A graduate of New Brunswick Theological Seminary, I attended seminary part-time while working full time in my insurance career. I completed my Master of Divinity degree graduating Cum Laude in May 2009, and completed an extended unit of Clinical Pastoral Education at the JFK Medical Center in Edison, New Jersey. Working in collaboration with the Office of Pastoral Care at JFK Medical Center and the Metuchen Clergy Association, I authored the first multi-faith Prayer Book for the JFK Medical Center Pastoral Care Department in August 2009.

My transition to full time ministry began in February 2015 when I was Ordained as a Minister of Word and Sacrament in the PC(USA), and installed as Pastor in my current call in Marlton, New Jersey. I joined with clergy of all faiths in Marlton to participate in the Evesham Township Police Department's Police Chaplain Program, completing the required training and was sworn in as a member of the Evesham Township Police Department in July 2015. In October 2017 I became the Police Chaplain Coordinator, responsible for 13 police chaplain volunteers, and I continue in this volunteer role responding to calls in the community, and as a resource for 98 sworn in officers.

An avid outdoorsman I am both a "mountain" and a "beach person," and enjoy camping, hiking, and fishing. I am an Eagle Scout, and Life Member of the National Eagle Scout Association, and registered BSA Assistant Scoutmaster. My wife Cindy and I enjoy hiking trails together, and we recently did a challenging trail in Montreat, NC to the top of Lookout Mountain during our vacation in April 2022. Cindy and I currently reside in Marlton, New Jersey and are "empty nesters" and first time grandparents!

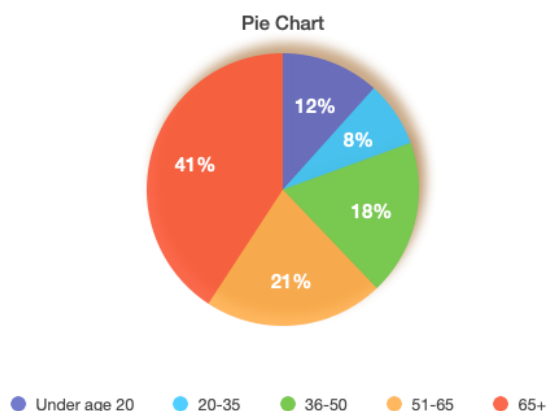

The Congregation

Our active member count is 104¹, which includes new members by Profession of Faith and Certificate of Transfer. This also takes into account the loss of 2 members by their death. The overall church family includes Active Members, the Spouses and Children of Active Members, the Grandchildren of Active Members and Regular Attenders. On a typical Sunday we number 40-50 people in attendance. Our online presence includes “live worship” and “recorded worship” on Facebook. This effort draws upwards of 100 people who log in to watch both the “live worship” or the “recorded worship”. We have upgraded our technology to be able to provide this service after restrictions are no longer necessary.

We include a wide spread of ages which reflects the age makeup of the community as a whole. Though our congregation is considered to be rather homogeneous in ethnicity the greater area that we live in is somewhat more diverse with the ethnicity spread predominately White being about 73%. Black and Hispanic/Latino population is about equal at about 13% and 11% respectively

The Sanctuary

A view into the sanctuary and chancel displays prominently The Cross. The chancel here is set up for the Lenten season. The choir sits to the left of the pulpit in this view and our music director sits at the organ to the right near the pulpit.

Our Sanctuary is set up with a sound system and head sets for the hearing impaired. All sermons are recorded. Anyone who wishes to obtain a sermon on occasion or on a weekly basis need only let a Deacon or Elder know. Members of our CD Ministry will be sure that a CD is made and distributed to the person or people in need. Moving into a more technological world we have members who have taken on the task of keep our church up to date. We are thankful for their ministry.

Groups and Events

Sunday School: Sunday School is held every Sunday from 9:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. for all ages from autumn to spring. Adult Sunday School is held in the sanctuary and Children's Sunday School is held in the classrooms downstairs. Sunday School classes are led by our dedicated Sunday School teachers. The curriculum, kidssundayschoolplace.com is an excellent resource for all our different age groups, and includes music, craft ideas, games, and Bible object lessons for children's talks.

Children's Message: I think it is safe to say that most of the adults in the congregation gain as much from the Children's Message as the children do. The Children's Message is delivered by any one who volunteers to perform this service to the children. The message is tightly tied to the scripture and the sermon of that Sunday. The teachers must be creative to not only grab the attention of the children but keep it during the Children's Message. Since our children remain in worship for the duration of the sermon, the Children's Message helps them to understand more of what worship is all about.



Annual Youth Car Wash

Youth Group: The Youth Group meets once or twice a month on Sunday evening throughout the winter months. During these meetings they discuss plans for events that come up throughout the year, such as **Christmas Caroling at Senior Centers**, **Souper Bowl Sunday** where money is collected for those in need in the community, and a **Rock-a-thon** where participants gather to spend hours rocking (on rocking chairs) to raise money to donate to the Mountain Top Food Bank. Our young people provide significant help with Vacation Bible School every summer. They help the Worship Committee by gathering Communion cups for count on Communion Sundays. They are active participants in the worship service and serve as greeters and ushers throughout the year. These youngsters are actively teaching the youngest children how to assist in worship. We at the Presbyterian Church of Mountain Top believe that our youth are the life of our church.

Confirmation Classes: Pastor led classes to prepare our older youth in confirming their commitment to the church and to God. The youths that take the class begin their journey by committing to attend worship and classes. Their participation in both is expected and required. Parents are generally expected to support their children by attending worship, as well. Session members individually volunteer to support a student during their classes.

This year classes were accelerated so that our out going Pastor can perform this special service to these children that he has observed, nurtured and cared for since their infancy. This will be his last duty for the nurturing of our church. Our last Confirmation Sunday was designated for April 28, 2019.

Children's Choir:

As with many churches, we are striving to rebuild our children's Choir. We still see great interest among those youngsters who are in high school now during special seasons.

Throughout the year the children will sing as a choir or perform a presentation depicting the sermon. Typically, this happens at Christmas and Easter or on other significant Christian events. Our Christian Education Staff work with these beautiful little souls to bring us the word of God.



Kids Summer Program: Thanks to the dedication of a few wonderful folks in our congregation we conduct have been able to continue with a summer program with our youth and the wider community. Each year we have a theme.

Choir:

For being a small church, we have an amazing choir. Led by an amazing musician, William Blannett. There are approximately, 16 members both men and women, who sing anthems and lead us in hymns. Typically, they bring the joy of music to us from September to June.

Presbyterian Women: The **Presbyterian Women** support the church especially during the holidays. They meet on the first Wednesday of the month. This is a time for the women to get together to pray, study, and discover new ways that they can support the church and the community at large. Some organizations that the Women's Group supports are Ruth's Place/VOA, the American Legion, and Brandon's Forever Home. The Presbyterian Women, also, support our own church through donations to the Trustees. In 2018 they donated \$1000 to the Trustees.

Adult Bible Study: Bible studies led by the pastor are held on Wednesday evening during the month. Women's Bible Study, which is led by a member of the group meet on the first Monday of the month. The meeting rotates through the homes of the women who participate. Our church offer special opportunities for Bible study are during the Lenten Season and Advent.

Life Groups:

Small Group experience to share, explore and reaffirm our faith along with other participants in the group. The Life Groups are themed and based upon the writings of Christian authors such as Max Lucado and Rick Warren. Small Groups are organized twice a year.



Our Financial Status

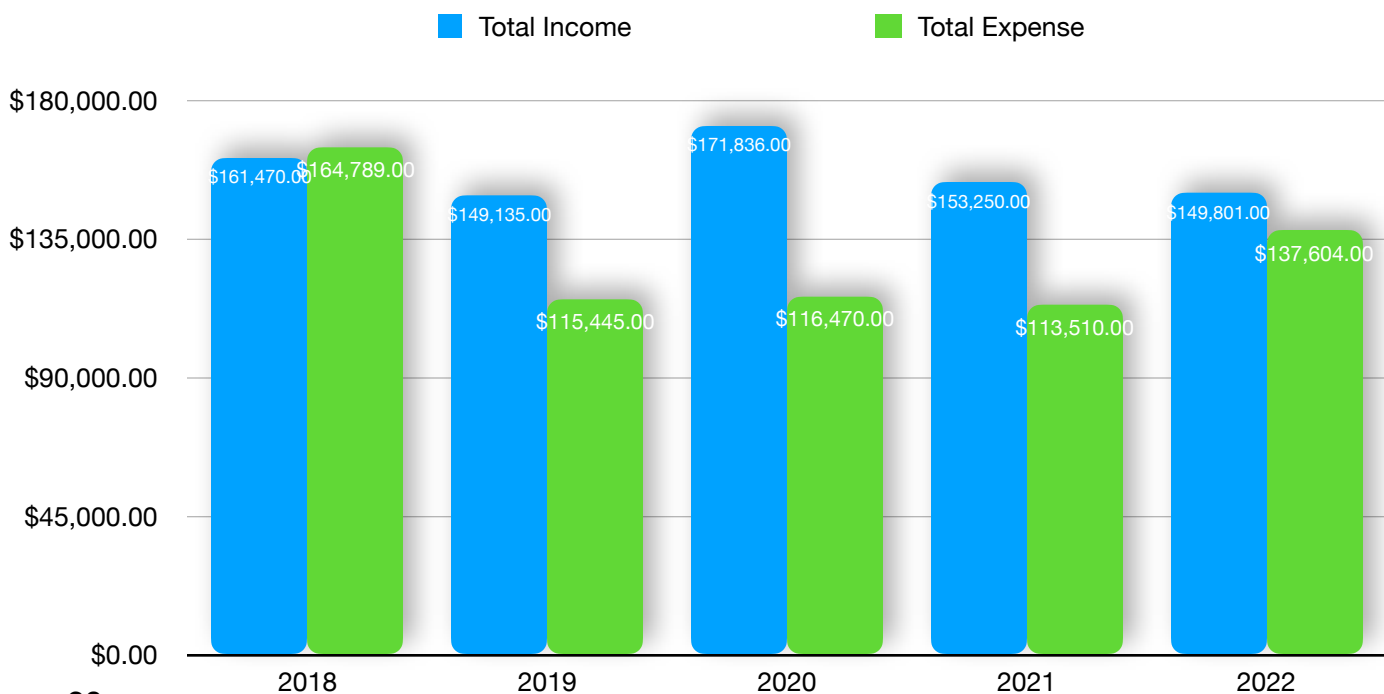
Over the years our financial status has been consistent and stable. Certainly, we have had our ups and downs, but always the Lord has provided us with exactly what we needed when we needed it. The following chart and graph give a general idea of what our financial situation has been over the last five years.

Fluctuations in income are a result of the world in which we live in the 21 Century. People come and go. Folks are more likely to move from one location to another today than 20 or 30 years ago. Job opportunities, family obligations, and just the desire to go to a different location because of climate or economy are the motivating reasons that people move on, this in turn affects our financial picture.

As rising costs in basic utilities increases and our other financial obligations continue to rise, we feel the strain as most other churches do. Though these increases in cost are always considered during our budget planning there are always the unexpected occurrences that will happen. Through this diligent planning we work hard to remain solvent. In addition to our monthly income there are other financial accounts to consider.

Memorial Fund: The Memorial Funds are designated contributions given in memory of a church member who has gone to be with the Lord. Some of the money is designated for a specific purpose which must be spent for that purpose, such as, for education or music. The rest of the money is undesignated and can be use for a legitimate purpose for the benefit of the church such as having a new Church Directory printed. Of course, any use of undesignated or designated funds must be approved by Session. Currently, the Memorial Fund is balanced at \$14,084.84.

Benevolence Fund: Outreach into community and globally is our strongest point. Our charitable work is due to a sense of contribution by the congregation and managed by the Deacons and the Benevolence Fund.

Benevolence Fund is money that is set aside from our weekly collection based upon a formula that provides us with a minimum balance each year. Throughout 2018 the Benevolence Fund disbursed money in the amount of \$14,831.00 to a variety of organizations, some of which are:

We are blessed to be able to work for God's purpose in helping those that need our help in our church, community and beyond. We began 2018 with a balance of \$901.00 with a balance of \$14084.84 by the end of 2018. By the end of the year we were able to do all this good work through the generosity of our church members.

One Great Hour of Sharing

Each year we participate as a congregation in the One Great Hour of Sharing program to provide for those in need. Our goal typically is representative to the year in dollars. This year our goal is \$2019.00. We usually meet our goal and are still getting offerings toward this end for 2019.

Our Community/Region

NEPA, as we locals affectionally refer to our region, is an area of beautiful mountains, rivers and streams, clean air and four seasons. There is something nurturing about living in the mountains and the valleys of the area. Driving along Interstate 81 you can see far and wide the landscape that is open to all types of wildlife. There are numerous hiking opportunities that will take you to mountaintops to have a peek at God's wonderful work in this area.

Mountain Top is a community of 11,001² people. It is an unincorporated community know as a CDP or Census Designated Place. Nearby townships are Fairview, Wright, Dorrance and Rice³. There is no "downtown," per se, but along the main road, route 309, you will encounter businesses that have everything a person or family might need. Carone's is a family owned food market that has been something of an anchor store for 25 years. Along the way, driving north on 309 one will see a collection of small businesses both privately owned, like the Carone's and The Chalet Restaurant, and chain stores such as Weis Super Market and Rite Aid. One might think that there is nothing much more to this town but venturing off the main road will take you to the homes where the population of Mountain Top live in newer sub divisions. Also, off of route 309 you will find the founding community of homes and our church. According to Zillow the Mountain Top housing market is healthy. Home pricing in 18707 zip code is \$100,000 to \$500,000 with an average price range of about \$180,000. There are about 60 on the market⁴.

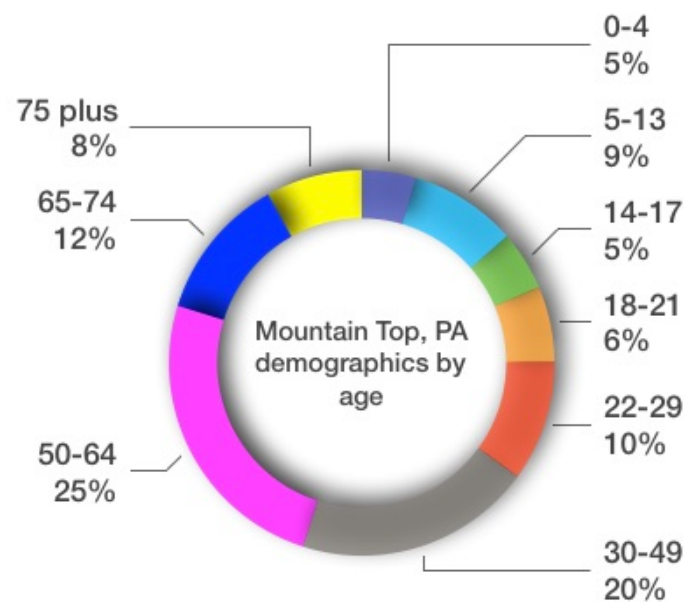
Mountain Top is located in the Crestwood Area School District, which covers over 110 square miles (280 km²). This area includes [Dennison Township](#), [Dorrance Township](#), [Fairview Township](#), [Nuangola Borough](#), [Rice Township](#), [Slocum Township](#), [White Haven Borough](#), [Wright Township](#), and [Penn Lake Borough](#). The Crestwood School District has four schools, Crestwood High School, Crestwood Middle School, Fairview Elementary School and Rice Elementary School. There are two private schools as well, St Jude's and Wyoming Valley SDA Elementary School. All our schools boast a low student to teacher ration of less that 20:1. Crestwood School district supports schools that rank well above the mean for Pennsylvania and the country. It is ranked at 218 out of 586 schools in Pennsylvania with a graduation rate of 96%. Crestwood High School offers a wide array of extra curricular activities. Find more details at Crestwood School District (Pennsylvania) on Wikipedia.com

Locally, we can offer a small town life style with urban amenities within a 15 minute drive to Wilkes Barre or 30 minutes to Scranton PA.

Wilkes Barre, the county seat of Luzerne County, being our closest urban neighbor has a population of 41,782. The age mix is virtually the same as Mountain Top. While Mountain Top is considered a statistically very homogeneous population, Wilkes Barre is, statistically, a moderately diverse community.

Our Community/Region

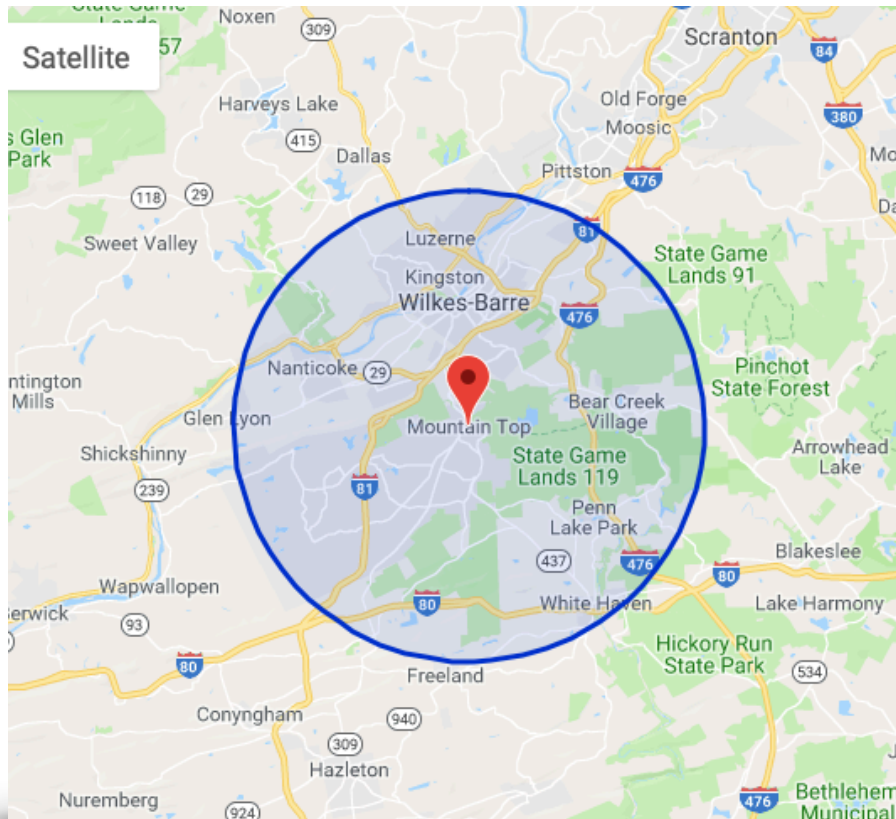


Wilkes Barre is the home of Wilkes University, Kings College, and a Penn State Wilkes Barre campus. Within a 15 mile radius you will find Luzerne Community College, Misericordia University, the Fortis Institute Forty Fort, and Marywood University.

Healthcare in the area is well provided. Mountain Top is facilitated by an urgent care location for the Geisinger Health Network and a similar facility for supporting Wilkes Barre General Hospital an affiliate of the Commonwealth Health Network. Both networks have main hospital campuses in the near by city of Wilkes Barre. You will also find a VA hospital in Wilkes Barre. The Lehigh Valley Health Network is represented in Hazleton, another larger community nearby.

Mountain Top is situated at the intersection of two major Interstate Freeways, I 80 and I 81. Nearby we find access to the Northeast Extension of the Pennsylvania Turnpike I 476. This strategic location gives us access to the amenities and metropolitan benefits of New York City, and Philadelphia. The state capital, Harrisburg, is an easy 1.5 hours away off of I 81. The cities of Allentown, and Bethlehem are within an hour's drive providing with additional shopping, entertainment and healthcare services.

Both Wilkes Barre and Scranton boast many year round activities and attractions of the region such as the St. Patrick's Day celebration annually held in nearby Scranton, and The Mohegan Sun Arena hosting concerts or other events all year long. In Wilkes Barre a person will find extensive shopping opportunities, a mall, restaurant chains and private enterprises.

The Susquehanna River defines the northwestern border of Wilkes Barre. The Susquehanna is a source of recreation, fishing and boating. Kingston and Edwinstown lie to the north of the river.

The Market Street Bridge was built in 1926-1929 as part of the New Deal project during the Great Depression. The bridge spans the Susquehanna River and connects Wilkes Barre and Kingston, PA. It was intended as a Memorial to WWI. In 1988 the bridge was listed on the National Register of Historic Places

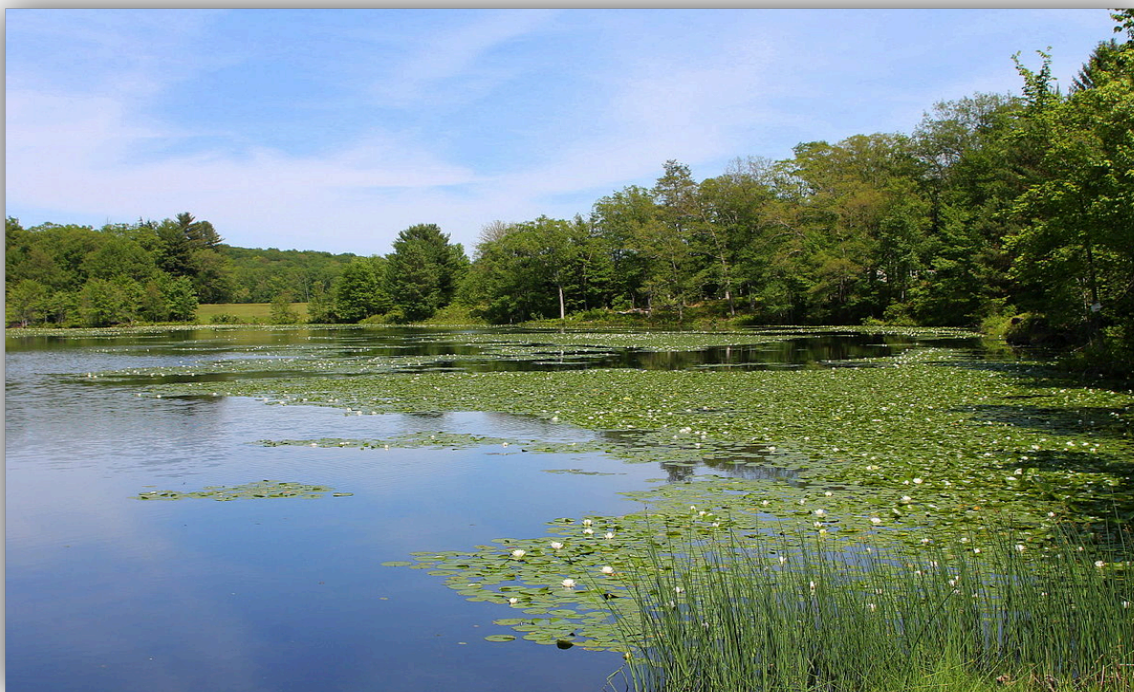
