Yes, we are all looking forward to our Heavenly Destination, but we're far from just sitting waiting for the "Grim Reaper". We read God's Word. We fellowship. We sing praises to God. We eat together. And, by God, we're happy! Any infirmities we may have right now, will all be made whole in Eternity.

NO-DEFINITELY NOT:

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A Week at the Races.

For some years I worked with a mission named The Open Air Mission it was a mission that preached the Gospel in the open air. When I first worked with them I was working as an Evangelist in the City Mission in Chester. Every year a group of the Open Air Mission would come to Chester in their mobile homes and stay at Kingsdown Chapel. Every Bank Holiday Monday in May we held a welcome service for the men of the Mission who came to the races at Chester. At the welcome service the men who came gave a report on what they had done since the previous year, then we would devote ourselves to a time of prayer for the work of the Open Air Mission.

On the Tuesday morning we would meet for prayer then have some lunch together, then we would walk down to the race course on the "Roo-Dee"- an area of Chester where the old Roman harbour used to be; over the years the river has changed course on several occasions and over the time it has silted up and sometime in the 19th century a race course was built on the area and it was named the Roo-Dee. We would all meet on the course and set up a place to stand, then we would start to preach, we would take it in turns to stand on the box between the races, and when the race was on we would pray.

We would leave the races before the last race and we would move up the town to the Cross in the centre and we would preach again as the people came out of the races and they would sometimes stop and listen. One evening after the last race I spoke to a young man from Manches-

ter, he took a Gospel of John from me and I spoke to him about salvation, and he went on his way.

A couple of years went by until I met with the same young man. He came to me at the cross and he told me he had read the Gospel I had given him and he had become a Christian when he was on the train going home. The men and women we met were all given a Gospel or a Christian tract, but that young man was the only one who I met at race week in Chester who came back and told me he had come to Christ

through my giving him a portion of God's Word.

When I joined the Open Air Mission our second visit to a race course was in June when we went to the very busy race course

at Epsom Downs. We would stay in the van at Epsom Baptist Church. The two races we went there for were the Oaks, and the Derby. We started by walking down through the coaches and the buses giving out a Christian newspaper. On the Oaks day we would stand by the bar and preach. You always had to be careful because people would throw things at you, usually cans of beer. On the Saturday we would preach outside a pub on the racecourse, and we would do personal work in the market on the Derby day morning. I also went to Epsom to the Derby with London City Mission and we would also preach on the Downs.

Another race meeting we went to was Royal Ascot. We would do personal work in the morning when many of the wealthy persons had picnics with tables, chairs and candle sticks, and they were not happy if we interrupted them. After the Queen had driven up the course we would set up opposite the stands and preach between the races. In the morning we would speak to many very rich people who believed they were alright. Their wealth was their god and they didn't believe they were sinners in need of salvation.

The St Ledger at Doncaster was a long drive from London to Yorkshire, as was the one to Liverpool to Aintree for The Grand National, but at all of the visits to the races we saw peoples' lives changed.

It was worth going to these various race courses and preaching the Gospel to the many thousands of people who would never go to church. Every one of the weeks we spent at Racecourses we would be bombarded with beer cans or soggy buns or sandwiches, but we kept on preaching God's Word.

I do not know if the Open Air Mission are still preaching, but I know I enjoyed my time with them, and seeing peoples' lives changed was really wonderful.


Throughout the day, Bridge Books had a lovely display of Christian literature etc, for sale

Somehow, the menial decisions about weekend activities, romantic interests, social status, all briefly seemed irrelevant, even disrespectful, to our departed chum.

The closeness of eternity furnished questions of much greater significance. Since that moment, there have been many bereavements, each a little easier to deal with than the previous. But, still "the elephant is in the room"! My Christian faith had given me the foundation for recognising that death is not the end, and that we all have the blessed Hope of Eternal Life with Christ Jesus.

God is receiving more and more of our number into His glorious abode. We fear not, for we too will one day cross the Valley of that Shadow. May we all be ready.

Psalm 23 v 4 "Even when walking through the dark valley of death I will not be afraid, for You are close beside me, guarding, guiding all the way".

This, my friends, is The Church!
