It's a Two-Way Communication

Mankind, worldwide, has been striving to get back in communication with their Maker.

Fortunately we have that special Key to our loving Heavenly Father; it's in **John's Gospel 14 v 6** "Jesus said, 'I am the Way, the Truth and the Life. No-one comes to the Father, except through Me'." Contrary to popular opinion, Jesus Christ is the only way by which we may truly know God and communicate with Him.

We considered different reasons that we might want to resort to praying to God. Some were more appropriate than others, but all were used by us at one time or another. As we assessed our motives for speaking to Him, we recognised and realised that, whatever the reason, and however desperate we may be, "In everything, we should give thanks, for this is God's will for you in

Christ Jesus." 1Thessalonians 5 v 18. So we discovered that God is not a Father Christmas, or a Fairy Godmother figure. And He is certainly not a "yesman" in answering everything in the positive. Just as our human dads would care for us, so God, our heavenly Father knows what is good for us, too.

We need not fear to ask God for anything, because, in His great wisdom, "In times when we don't even know how to pray or for what to pray, the Holy Spirit intercedes for us in accordance

intercedes for us in accordance with God's perfect will." Romans $8\ v\ 26$

We have also been learning the joy of praising God, and the pleasure of quietly waiting on Him. When the experience is God-centred, rather than mecentred, then the lines of communication open up to a two-way conversation.

Sure, we still don't have all the answers. We are still learning. But, "We do know that Jesus, the Son of God, has come and has given us understanding, so that we may grasp the will of Him, Who is Truth." 1 John 5 v 20.

PASSING THROUGH THE WATERS OF BAPTISM

Sunday morning the 20th May 2018 at 10.45am was to be the first Service of Adult Baptism for The Good Shepherd Fellowship. On a Friday in late March, and then again in late April, we gathered in Beacon Heath (Steph's home) For Bible studies explaining the significance of Baptism for Christians.

Many years ago, after the passing of my father, Alan Charters, mum (Joan Charters) had purchased a mobile baptistery in his memory. It has been used by other Churches, but as yet, not within our Fellowship. It was with a great sense of joy that the Unit was retrieved from storage, assembled in Cornerstone, and, at 4am Sunday morning, commenced the 5hr task of filling it with water.

By 10.30am the Hall was packed with friends and family of the three Candidates, plus a video camera to record the occasion. A joyful service was enjoyed by all. Then, first Adam, then Steph, and finally Shane, passed through the waters in obedience to the Lord's command "Make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Matthew 28 v 19. Hallelujah!

The Homeless Shelter

When we work for the Lord, we have to learn to deal with difficulty. One of these difficulties is working with homeless people, my first time working with homeless began in Chester when I began serving God there as an Evangelist.

Starting on the Monday my superintendent took me to the homeless shelter that the Mission ran in Cuppin Street in Chester. The shelter had been an old Bus Garage that the Crossville Bus Company had owned for years, where they garaged the coaches and single-decker buses.

About two years previously they had moved out of the garage and it had stood empty for some time, when a voluntary organisation approached the Mission to use it as a Night Shelter for the homeless men in Chester. When I joined the Mission it had run the Night Shelter for about three years, so I knew when I joined the mission that I would be going to the Night Shelter, and I already new the difficulties that we had in running it.

My first visit was an introduction to Ron and to Ted, both of these men were homeless but

they had stopped drinking so they looked after the Shelter. They swept up and cleaned the toilets, they lived in what had been the old office on the first floor of the building. On the ground floor were twelve bed-spaces that each had an old hospital bed in, with a mattress on each bedframe. We changed the mattresses every month as the men who slept on them didn't always take off their boots! They also had a habit of wetting the bed. So you can see a difficulty

straight away—wet beds smell and create a foul odour which, if the mattress is left on the bed, can create a fowl smell in the whole of the Shelter This in turn attracts mice and rats that would eat anything the men dropped on the floor. When you



entered the Shelter for the first time, the smell could be quite overpowering, but you eventually get used to it.

Some of the men had good education; one man

was a civil engineer who had worked in Abadan in the Persian Gulf; another was an aircraft technician who had done twenty years in the RAF. Generally, though, the majority of the men were exservicemen who had a drink problem.

One of these was Paddy who had been in the Irish Guards; one day I had a phone-call from the local police because he had assaulted a female model outside a chip-shop. We had two brothers, their names were James and Michael Dooly, both big lads, who, when I stopped them lighting fires in the Shelter, put a curse on me!

Whilst the work had its unpleasant side—clearing wet beds and blankets, it also had its good side, and that was when one of the men would stop drinking, and ask Jesus into their lives. It didn't happen often, but when it did, and you had the privilege of baptising the man, it was wonderful to know that we had guided them to new life in Christ and a home in heaven with our Lord and Saviour.

Issues of personal beliefs and faith are now forming, and being worked through in the young mind. Thought processes and life values are argued within peer-groups. And so, this teenager exudes this freedom in expressing publicly what had before remained private.

This year we have seen three individuals professing their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ before relatives and friends. They have boldly declared their intention to follow Christ. Do we have that same boldness and desire to be ambassadors for Christ, and witnesses to His love?

1 Timothy 6 v 12 "Fight the good fight of faith. Take hold of the eternal life to which you were called when you made your public confession before the assembly of witnesses, and in the sight of God."

This, my friends, is The Church!
