
thought into the preparation and exercise needed for the event because we wrongly assumed that Adam would hardly break into a trot


A Warm Welcome to All

The Good Shepherd Fellowship meets every Sunday from I I am—I I-45am with tea/coffee & biscuits to follow.

The first Sunday of every month we invite a guest speaker to come and share with us.

On the second Sunday of each month (changed from the last Sunday of the month), we celebrate Holy Communion together. The Rev Adrian Magor serves us for these services.

We are a non-denominational Fellowship which welcomes those who seek to worship God through praise, prayer and the reading and study of His Word— the Holy Bible. Our service format includes forms of worship from all aspects of the Christian traditions. All who love the Lord Jesus are welcome to participate in our Holy Communion service. Contributions to our services are always welcome—a favourite Psalm, Hymn, Poem or Solo, for the encouragement of the Fellowship. Just pass suggestions to Graham beforehand.
