Thanks to an anonymous loan when we first acquired our minibus from the Exmouth Disability Fellowship, a cou-

ple of years ago, we have been able to enjoy the benefits of a comfortable, reliable, and lendable vehicle. As you read this, the loan should just about be paid off and, thanks to the sacrificial giving of those in our Fellowship, all ours!

Each month we have had to put aside £100 from the Minibus Fund to cover the repayments, and, thank God, we have not defaulted once on issuing our cheques. We would never have been able

to buy the bus outright and would probably have forfeited the opportunity without this financial benefactor. However, by the Autumn we will have cleared our debt of £3,000 in 30

months.

Apart from this amount, the bus does not run itself, and the increases in

Formed in January this year, the SMF held it's inaugural service on Sunday evening the 7th January at 5pm. The small Chapel can accommodate, at a squeeze, 18 folk. Each 1st Sunday of the month, Graham plus a car-load from the GSF, drive down to Paignton to conduct the service.

Each month the service theme varies according to the season. In February we had a liturgical even-song; in March was a Lenten service; in April we planted a tree, and Rev Adrian celebrated Holy Communion with us; in May we enjoyed a "Songs of Praise" service with Doug Walters from Exeter Salvation Army; in June was Trinity Sunday worship; and in July we had our liturgical even-song service.



Our program of monthly services will develop throughout the year, when we will celebrate Harvest Festival, welcome The Gideon's, and have Carols by Candle-light. We always retire to the Communal Lounge at 5-45pm for refreshments.

The feedback from Jenny (Scheme Manager) from the St Michael's folk has been very positive in these first 6 months. They all look forward each time to the next month's service.

The 1st Sunday of every month we invite a guest speaker to come and share.

On the 2nd Sunday of each month we celebrate Holy Communion together. The Rev Adrian Magor serves us for these services.

The GSF & SMF, are nondenominational Fellowships which welcome those who seek to worship God through praise, prayer and the reading and study of His Word— the Holy Bible. Our service formats include forms of worship from all aspects of the Christian traditions. All who love the Lord Jesus are welcome to participate in our Holy Communion service.

Transport can be arranged for any who need help. We have our Minibus, and some of our members drive in with spare seats in their cars.

At the age of five a child is ready to face the world (often needing the discipline and love of it's parents). It develops relationships and discovers abilities, and fits into the social community. The time for just "taking" has moved into an interactive phase of support for, and by, friends.
