Although not yet dead, our faithful LDV was coming to the end of it's service. We would keep her on through the summer to honour the Devon Christian Youth Camp's bookings, but

then she would be sold on to a group of ecological hippies from a Somerset commune!

Arriving at Halesowen, we were astonished at the size of the minicoach before us. We'd never seen a bus like it, and borrowers have said it's "one of a kind". The S reg Peuguet



Boxer conversion had spent her days with the Age Concern, Halesowen & Kidderminster. For £1,250 she was ours. The hippies gave us £1,750 for the LDV, so we were able to invest some money into getting the new mini-

coach into serviceable condition. There have been, and still are, various maintenance issues with the bus, but slowly she's being sorted. A major problem is the pneumatic suspension which operates to lower the vehicle for disabled access. It tends to "deflate whenever the engine is turned off, due to various leaking joints. We have learned not to load on board until she's had 5 minutes to pump herself up!

Apart from the regular "borrowings" throughout the year, and gifts etc, we have also been awarded £100 from the Express & Echo's £1,000 Giveaway. We're still waiting on the DCC to award us with a grant this year.

"Haven of Hope" — God Bless the Children

In August, Graham, Aura Marina & Adam, were able to go over to Romania to take our fund-raising moneys to the "Haven of Hope" Orphanage at Lipova. Money had been raised by Raffles, Private Gifts, the School Run kids, Bring 'n' Buy sale, and, of course, Graham & Mark's 5 hour sponsored Squash Marathon.

"We set off to Budapest, in Hungary, for a weeks sight-seeing holiday, before catching the train for a 5 hour journey, across the border, into Romania, where we were met by Pastor Moise and family, in Arad, and driven 30 km to the Village of Lipova. We had no idea what to expect. Lipova

could have been anywhere, and any type of town. In fact, it is a very historic, small, rural community. The Betleem Mission, is probably the largest activity in the area. On-site is the "Haven of Hope" Church, with the orphanage adjacent. The compound is about the size of two football pitches.

Our plan was to help with the redecoration program, but it quickly became apparent that the best use of our funds was in the purchasing and fitting of new uPVC windows in all the bedrooms. So, while the

kids were away at a Camp, all the helpers got to replacing the windows and returning the bedrooms to readiness.

There are up to a dozen children at the Orphanage, from all sorts of difficult backgrounds and home-life's. They live in an extended-family style Christian community, with Pastor Moise and his wife Nutzi as adoptive parents.

A great experience—and Adam learned to ride a bike!"
