

## **Easter Holy Communion - 12/04/26**

One week after Easter Sunday, we met for an Easter-tide Holy Communion service. We were reminded how that the disciples on the road to Emmaus recognised Jesus when He broke the bread and passed it to them. We, also, should recognise the risen Lord Jesus when we take the Emblems of Bread & Wine.

Afterwards we joined in a Lenten Supper of soup and bread & cheese.

## **Harvest Festival - 28/09/25**

Once again, as in previous years, our Harvest Table was full to over-flowing with items from toiletries to stationery to knitted blankets etc. all donated in aid of the Haven of Hope orphanage in Lipova, Romania. We watched a video of the children playing, singing and generally being kids. We also read a letter from Matthew Jackson (currently in Moldova) sending greetings from all in Lipova, to us. We have sent £250 in Romanian Lei which we save (£30/mth) from our funds.

The Harvest Festival has previously been held in October, but this year we decided to beat the Churches Harvest rush! Therefore, although still in September, this was officially our October service.

On November 8<sup>th</sup>, which is actually a Saturday, we will have our annual "Joan's Joanna!" soirée in Gittisham (nr Honiton) at the home of Ian & Helen and of Joan Charters, who will celebrate her 92<sup>nd</sup> birthday. We will incorporate a time of Remembrance at the start of the program.

## **Songs of Praise - 07/09/25**

It is always a joy to dedicate a service to singing hymns of praise to the Lord. We have, over the past couple of years, been singing the songs from the Sankey's Hymnal. These are old hymns which go back centuries, but still remain true to the Gospel message. This Sunday we sang the songs written for children. These lyrics reminded us of our own Sunday-School days.

## **Christening Service - 06/04/25**

We remembered all those who were unable to join us, for various reasons – often frailty, illness or immobility. We hope they will join with us again on other occasions.

The theme of the service was based from **1 Corinthians 12 v 12 – 27**. We are compared to a body of many parts. The writer, Paul, tells us that we are the Body of Christ, made up of many members, and that each member is just as important and significant as any other part of the body.

When asked which might be the best item on the Harvest Table, we compared a banana, a can of peaches, a tin of baked beans, and a bar of soap. Of course, there is no 'best' item. Each has its purpose. But each is only best at what they are designed to do. **Philippians 4 v 13** tells us that we can "do (get through) all these things, by the strength Christ gives me." And the Lord says, in **2 Corinthians 12 v 9** "My grace is sufficient for you, for My power is made perfect in your weakness." And Paul confirms in **v 10** that, "when I am weak, then I am strong."

We acknowledge that many of us have suffered in various ways these past months: our physical and mental health, emotionally, financially, and socially, but that we recognise that the Lord is a faithful God, Who has not forsaken us.

We all look forward to meeting again on Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> November for a service of Holy Communion.
