# **June Board Meeting Notes**

The board met on Tues, June 1 with Mark S., Mark G., Jan, Eric and Garry in attendance. Here's what was discussed:

#### St. Joseph Business Profiles - Eric

- Proposal: Add a profile of business members to the SJHNA monthly newsletters to highlight local businesses and help inform neighbors about what services are available in the neighborhood
- A good way to reach out to non-member businesses to join
- Businesses can provide a written statement as well as logo, photos and website URL for their profile

#### Surplus Street Repair Funds - St. Joseph St. - Mindy/Mark

- About \$121k was allocated to a few near west and northwest neighborhoods in District 17 due to the city refinancing debt at a lower interest rate which allowed for the additional allocation.
- Three neighborhoods, Lockerbie, St. Joseph and Cole-Noble, responded to Councilman Adamson's request to identify priority repairs within that budget from a list of options compiled by DPW, stating the age and cost to repair for each stretch.
- A meeting with the three neighborhoods yielded the 200- or 300-block of St. Joseph St and a stretch of Park Ave as the priorities for the \$121k budget utilization.
- Timing for the resurfacing is unknown at this time but all signs point to
   either the 200- or 300-block of St. Joseph getting that work done later
   this year or sometime next year. Some pothole repair was recently
   completed so we hope those patches survive until the new work gets
   scheduled. Whichever block doesn't get completed will stay on the DPW
   consideration list for next year's funding. Both stretches of road are
   around 40 years old.

#### **DPW Neighborhood matching grant update** - *Mindy*

- Most recent communication with DPW is that they are working with the engineering team to gather timelines and more details about the sidewalk and median projects.
- We recently learned that Lockerbie neighborhood was awarded the same grant two years ago and that work is scheduled for 2022, with DPW not requesting the matching funds until this year, so based on that experience, it could be a long process.

#### Membership update - Jan/Mark G.

- We now have about 44 individual members and 8 business members the most members Jan can recall in recent history.
- As a thank you for hosting board and neighborhood meetings at no cost in previous years, the board agreed to extend complimentary business memberships to both The Point on Penn and Indianapolis Public Library.

#### **Beautification Committee** - Ric/Jan

A cleanup of the triangle median was organized at the end of May. The
Hannon and Good households donated money for plants, dirt, and
mulch. The median has been planted with native plants that will require
less watering. However, they must transport about 8g of water to the
median on weeks it doesn't rain. (Have help, ideas or suggestions to
share on this watering task?? Just reply to this email!)

#### **Hospitality Committee** - Mark S.

- The ice cream social was a success with nearly 30 people in attendance! At the event, suggestions were offered for future events ranging from book clubs to outdoor concerts/movies to wine tasting.
- Thanks to those who ventured to the Good household on Sunday.
   Several people were in attendance despite the afternoon rain showers!
- Next porch party will be hosted by the Hannons on June 26, 4-6pm

#### North Split Report - Mark G./Garry

- These details were provided at the recent North Split meeting held by HTNB on behalf of INDOT.
- Reports of severe vibrations have been made in northern Chatham Arch and all are encouraged to report that issue and any others to <a href="https://www.INDOT4U.com">www.INDOT4U.com</a> which is monitored daily.
- Neighborhoods will be invited to meet over the summer to give input on the landscaping plans and sculpted berms. The latter will affect ONS and Chatham Arch.
- The Alabama St underpass will get new lighting and sidewalk pavers, as well as signage incorporating our logo.
- The Monon Loop detour to College is complete and will be permanent.
   INDOT will maintain landscape work for the first year and KIB will be contracted for years 2 and 3 maintenance.
- Rethink has incorporated as a 501(c)3 in order to receive and administer planning and other grant funds as well as engage in organized activity on behalf of the 65/70 redesign planning efforts. It comes too late for the northsplit but will be helpful in east and south segments of 65/70.

#### Miscellaneous

- Weeds growing through bricks in west part of 200 block on E 10th St need attention - Mark will file a report and also notify Fabio.
- St. Joe Flats Assoc 134 E. St. Joseph needs some attention. Mark will check and email IHPC with any details
- Garry suggested that St. Joseph should have a conversation with Ernest
  Malone, Chief of IFD. He recalls an agreement around the time of the
  relocation of IFD that St. Joseph Street would only rarely be used
  because it is narrow with street parking and two-way traffic. The
  neighborhood will collect some emergency vehicle utilization and then
  reach out to Chief Malone to discuss.

#### What are your favorite local spots?


