Montessori Lesson Plans Based on Emma's Holiday in Paris

Lesson 1: Exploring Emotions through Music

Estimated Time: 30 minutes

Objective: Students will express their emotions through music and movement, developing an understanding of how music can evoke feelings.

Preparation:

• Materials Needed:

- A speaker or piano to play Debussy's Children's Corner pieces
- Space for dancing (classroom cleared of furniture)
- Simple props for movement (scarves, ribbons, or soft toys)

Directions for Teacher:

1. Set Up:

- Clear a large area in the classroom for movement activities.
- Prepare a playlist with the selected pieces from Debussy's Children's Corner:
 "Doctor Gradus ad Parnassus," "Jimbo's Lullaby," "Serenade for the Doll," "The Sow is Dancing," "The Little Shepherd," and "The Golliwog's Cakewalk."

2. Introduction (5 minutes):

- Briefly introduce Debussy and his music.
- Explain that music can make us feel different emotions and that they will explore this through movement.

3. Listening Activity (10 minutes):

- Play "Doctor Gradus ad Parnassus" and ask students how it makes them feel.
- Prompt them to express their feelings using facial expressions or body language.
- Repeat with "Jimbo's Lullaby," discussing empathy for Jimbo and how the music feels soft and calming.

4. Movement Activity (10 minutes):

- Play "The Sow is Dancing" and encourage students to move like they are watching a snowstorm. Use scarves as props to mimic snowflakes.
- Transition to "The Golliwog's Cakewalk" and invite them to dance freely, imagining they are in a celebration.

5. Reflection (5 minutes):

 Gather students and ask them to share their experiences of how each piece of music made them feel.

Lesson 2: Artistic Expression through Drawing

Estimated Time: 45 minutes

Objective: Students will create artwork inspired by the music of Debussy, enhancing their fine motor skills and creativity.

Preparation:

• Materials Needed:

- Drawing paper
- Crayons, colored pencils, or watercolors
- Copies of images related to the pieces (e.g., elephants for "Jimbo's Lullaby," dolls for "Serenade for the Doll")

Directions for Teacher:

1. Set Up:

- Arrange tables with drawing materials for each student.
- Display images around the room related to the pieces they will draw.

2. Introduction (5 minutes):

• Explain that they will listen to music and create pictures inspired by what they hear.

3. Listening and Drawing (30 minutes):

- Play "Serenade for the Doll," and instruct students to draw what they imagine
 when they hear the music. Encourage them to think about colors and shapes
 that represent the doll.
- Switch to "The Little Shepherd" and invite them to illustrate the shepherd and the sounds they hear in the music. Discuss what they envision while listening.

4. Sharing Art (10 minutes):

• Allow students to present their drawings to the class, describing the music that inspired them and their artistic choices.

Lesson 3: Storytelling through Movement and Music

Estimated Time: 40 minutes

Objective: Students will create a simple story or scenario using music and movement, enhancing their narrative skills and teamwork.

Preparation:

Materials Needed:

- A speaker to play Debussy's Children's Corner pieces
- Props for storytelling (hats, stuffed animals, etc.)

Directions for Teacher:

1. Set Up:

- Arrange the classroom to create a space for storytelling and movement.
- Prepare a selection of props that can be used in storytelling.

2. Introduction (5 minutes):

• Explain that they will create a story inspired by the music and that they can use props to help tell their story.

3. Group Activity (20 minutes):

- Divide students into small groups and assign each group a piece of music from Debussy's Children's Corner.
- Allow them to listen to their assigned piece and brainstorm a short story they can act out.
- Encourage them to think about characters, settings, and emotions.

4. Performance (10 minutes):

- Each group presents their story to the class while the music plays in the background.
- Encourage them to use props and movement to enhance their storytelling.

5. Discussion (5 minutes):

• After all performances, have a brief discussion about how music helped them convey their stories and emotions.

These lessons aim to engage first-grade students in music, art, and storytelling, fostering independence and creative expression in a manner consistent with Montessori principles.
