

SPARK Lesson Plan: Mozart's The Magic Flute

Situation (Real-World Connection & Objectives)

Learning Objectives:

- **Understand the elements of opera:** Students will learn about the components that make up an opera, including music, story, characters, and stage design.

Aspirations (Student-Centered Goals & Action Plan)

Goals:

- **Design:** Students will design a modern set and costumes that reflect their adaptations.
- **Performance:** Students will create a short performance or presentation of their adaptation to share with the class.
