WHO/WHAT: For more than 50 years, the late music impresario **Ralph Mercado** had been the most important figure in staging Latin music events worldwide as well as in building a record label, publishing company, a video and film production arm, and a catalog of award-winning international hits that transformed the Latin music industry.

Mercado helped shape and elevate the careers of some of the most renowned Latin artists—many of whom are now honored with streets across New York City. From *Tito Puente Way* to *Machito Square*, Celia Cruz Way, Charlie Palmieri Way, Yomo Toro Way and many more, these streets stand as living tributes to Latin music's enduring global influence. For 50 years, Ralph Mercado stood at the helm of this movement. His journey began in his teens, when he organized local dances in a cellar near his Pacific Street home. From those modest basement parties in the mid-1950s he rose to a second floor above a car wash nearby and called it the *Three in One Club*, where his legendary SalSoul nights once paired a young Eddie Palmieri with James Brown, artists whom he managed, promoted and booked. The *Hotel St George* on Henry Street were for more formal dances. The entrepreneurial promoter expanded into producing dances throughout the boroughs making his way into Manhattan. Via Ralph Mercado Presents, he took on the New York Salsa Festival, making it annual event for 32 years. He produced many of the Fania All Stars concerts, helping to give rise to their popularity worldwide. He showcased many talented artists and the vibrant Latin sounds of Salsa, Merengue, Reggaeton, Pop and Jazz on world renowned stages such as Madison Square Garden, Radio City Music Hall, and Carnegie Hall. Ralph Mercado Management had a plethora of great artists, launching in the early 1970s with Eddie Palmieri and Ray Barretto — adding more legends such as Tito Puente and Celia Cruz. He discovered and developed talent and recorded original music of artists such as Marc Anthony, La India and many others through RMM Records & Video, a major independent record label during the 1980s and 90s.
