What is a Medical ID?

A medical ID is a wearable accessory or ID card that contains or allows access to the user's critical personal and medical information. This medical ID is recognized by first responders and the medical community which helps identify individuals who have an important medical condition that may require special treatment. In an emergency situation, when a person can not speak for themselves, it's imperative that this information about a person's medical history is easily accessible. A medical ID helps to prevent misdiagnosis, unwanted drug reactions, and treatments that could pose serious risk.
