St. Nicholas Around the World

- Japan's holiday gift-giver is a fat Buddhist monk with eyes in the back of his head. Some say he travels with a red-nosed reindeer and some say he works alone, but he doesn't arrive on Christmas in either hybrid Christian-Buddhist tale. Christmas in Japan is spent with family doing charity work. But on New Year's Eve, the real action begins: the house is cleaned and decorated, then family members throw beans for good luck and await their gifts from the benevolent monk.
- In Italy, you'll either get your presents on the Epiphany or on Christmas, but they'll likely be brought to you by La Befana, the friendly holiday witch who leaves candies, figs, and goodies in good kids' socks and coal or dark candy in bad kids'. If Santa has a cookie addiction, La Befana is something of a wino, so parents leave out a glass of wine for the witchto enjoy after traveling across the sky on her broomstick.
- In Russia, Ded Moroz, or Grandfather Frost, dresses in a fairly Santa fashion, carrying with him an added magical staff and never going anywhere without his granddaughter Sengurochka, Snow Girl. Together, the two plan New Year's Eve parties for kids, where they hand out gifts without the secrecy attributed to some St. Nicholas figures. Depending on where you're from, Ded Moroz either lives in Veliky Ustug or Belavezhskaya Pushcha, arriving from either of them by troika of white horses.
- In Roman Catholic areas of southern Germany, *Sankt Nikolaus* still comes as a bishop with flowing beard and a <u>bishop's miter</u> and staff. Houses are thoroughly cleaned and children clean and polish their shoes or boots in preparation for the <u>saint's</u> visit. On the evening before <u>St. Nicholas Day</u>, children put letters to the good saint along with carrots or other food for his white horse or donkey on a plate or in their shoes. These are left outside, under the bed, beside a radiator, or on a windowsill in hopes of finding goodies from St. Nicholas the next morning. During the night Sankt Nikolaus goes from house to house carrying a book in which all the children's deeds are written. If they have been good, he fills their plate, shoe or boot with delicious fruits, nuts and candies. If not, they may find potatoes, coal, or twigs.
- In France, Pere Noel is one of the most famous versions of St. Nicholas. He resembles Santa Claus in appearance, but instead of using reindeer he rides a single donkey called Gui, which means Mistletoe in French. Like many other countries, some regions of France also celebrate St. Nicholas' day on December Fifth. For this holiday, along with the traditional St. Nick figure, the French also have a character called La Pere Fouettard (The Whipping Father) who is a figure who is supposed to be feared by naughty kids; it is said that in the 1100s La Pere Fouettard and his wife kidnapped and murdered three young men and then cooked them into a stew. After the victims were discovered and brought back to life by the benevolent St. Nicholas, La Pere Fouettard repented his evil deeds and vowed to serve as his helper. Pere Noel places small gifts and candy in shoes left next to the fireplace. La Pere Fouettard, meanwhile, is a little less cheerful. He carries rusty chains and switches, and doles out floggings to children who misbehave. In some versions of the story, he gets even more brutal, and is said to cut out the tongues of kids who've been caught lying.
- Sinter Klaas in the Netherlands. He is much thinner than the American Santa Claus. He rides a white horse and gets help from numerous Zwarte Pieten (Black Petes) handing out gifts and candy. He arrives the first Saturday in November by Boat. In the evenings, Dutch Children sing songs in front of the fire place or in the living room and leave their shoe with a present (drawing for Sinterklaas and Zwarte Piet or a Carrot for Amerigo Sinterklaas' horse) In the mornings they will find their shoe filled with candy and small presents. On the 5th of December Dutch households have a "Pakjesavond" (Presents night) and exchange presents.
