In retrospect, a house of almost 100 years has taken on a new life, several individuals have learned construction trade skills, many collaborations have been formed and strong relationships have been built. Looking ahead, we

see the sale and presentation of a new home to a first-time homebuyer, and new neighbors for a new family. The Do School will continue to identify program candidates who will once the program is completed, seek sustainable employment with incomes capable of building value for their families. From the graduation of our first DO SCHOOL training class to the near culmination of the renovation of our first "learning lab/home," our Board of Directors and staff are discovering new, innovative approaches in each of the systems that guide this pilot.

In a very short timeframe since it's launch a year ago, one young trainee has been hired at Sutton Brothers, a plumbing company that has been a partner with DO SCHOOL from its inception. With this success and proof of the viability of collaborative partnerships in building economic equity, we invite the participation of other community resources in expanding the vision to address a critical disparity in our community.

Sutton Brothers Heating, Cooling and Plumbing, located in Kernersville, was honored to be part of the initial learning lab project on Underwood Avenue! The transformation of this house from uninhabitable to fully restored and ready for ownership was very



fulfilling for our company! We provided two of our experienced plumbers, who then guided the Do School students through the various plumbing tasks needed for a "rough in." These tasks included setting the drainage, establishing water lines and installing the water heater. An added task for this project also included re-digging the outside water main. This was "hands on" training for these students and gave them a real-life experience in the skills needed for a career in plumbing. One of the Do School students was subsequently hired by Sutton Brothers as a plumbing apprentice. Chandler has a very bright future with us!

Sutton Brothers is a locally owned heating/cooling and plumbing company owned by Jim and Jack Sutton. The company works with a number of national builders and provides its services for new home construction. It also provides heating/cooling and plumbing services to individual home owners in the Triad area.

Jim and Jack both have a very strong commitment to community involvement and support! Their *Sutton Cares* program has donated thousands of dollars to local nonprofits over the years! Working with the Do School on the Underwood Avenue project had several positive community contributions! It allowed students to have a hands-on experience that began to develop plumbing skills, it will provide a first-time homeowner the chance to own a fully refurbished house, and it resulted in the hiring of a student! A win/win/ win situation for all involved.

Sutton Brothers looks forward to future opportunities to partner with the **Do School** as it continues to refurbish homes, train its students and provide first -time home ownership.

On Saturday, August 6th, we celebrated the culmination of the program for **Abdul Derios, Chandler Miller** and **Malik Thomas**, the second group of trainees. Also in attendance was **Kodjo Thon**, first gradate of the Do School's program. Jerry Anderson, founder and executive director, and John Lenham, board chair, kicked off the program.



Claude Sales, project superintendent at Frank L Blum, told the graduates to take advantage of *every* opportunity and work hard *every day* ...and it will pay off, changing their lives and their family's.

Kevin Miller, executive director of the Ezrah Charitable Trust Foundation, spoke briefly to those in attendance from the topic "This Wondrous Journey, that is the Do School." He asked the group to ponder the three questions he often asks himself. 1) Ask not just what am I doing for the Do School, but what is the Do School doing in me? 2) What am I learning in the lab (not just what the four of you have learned, but what am I learning)? And finally, 3) What is the way forward? His thought-provoking message prompted reflection, self-assessment and action.

The reception was well attended by our community partners. We heard comments from Jim Sutton of Sutton Brothers, Joey Millikan of Superior Mechanical, Inc. as well as Clay Fielding, a life coach who facilitates in the program's life-skills series. Our graduates received Certificates of Completion and watches.
