Virginia's Reproductive Freedom Amendment

Voting As An Act of Redemption

The abortion narrative has profoundly influenced public perception. Terms such as “bodily autonomy” and “routine healthcare” frame abortion within a broader cultural story that obscures its realities. Over time, this language takes root in the hearts and minds of people, shaping assumptions and influencing how society perceives and responds to abortion.

This cultural influence is evident in Virginia's proposed Reproductive Freedom Amendment. In November, Virginians will vote on a measure that places abortion alongside prenatal care and miscarriage management while removing current protections for women, unborn babies, and minors.

What's missing is just as important as what is included. There is no acknowledgment that abortion ends a child's life. And no space is given to the women who increasingly report abortion as the expected response to an unplanned pregnancy. What might their experiences reveal?

Research highlights concerning outcomes following abortion, including serious adverse events from medication abortion and increased mental health challenges for post-abortive women (Ethics & Public Policy Center; National Institutes of Health). Interpretations of evidence regarding physical and psychological harm are influenced by the abortion narrative one embraces.

The question, then, is not only policy but perception: how is truth discerned in a culture shaped by powerful narratives and competing claims?

Paul warned Timothy that people would one day turn from truth and seek voices that affirm what they want to hear (2 Timothy 4:3–4). Because truth is often uncomfortable, discernment is essential where language, culture, and policy intersect.

In light of this, followers of Jesus are called to respond with wisdom, not reaction.

Friends, this is our moment and we are called to a redemptive response shaped by truth, compassion, and courage. In November, that includes engaging civically to affirm the value of every human life, to protect the well-being and dignity of women, and safeguard the rights of parents.

A vote against Virginia's Reproductive Freedom Amendment is a stand for the most vulnerable and a challenge to prevailing assumptions about abortion. It is a faithful witness that is grounded in Scripture and shaped by Christ's love for women and unborn children.

It is a responsibility entrusted by God to His people in this moment of history bearing witness to the redemptive love of Christ in both word and deed.
