


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


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Tourism in LeClaire

Debbie Mulvania, president of the LeClaire Tourism Board, is proud of the town she helps represent.

“LeClaire is a great place to live. The downtown area is very vibrant. It’s a great place to visit and to live.”

The Tourism Board is a committee of the City of LeClaire, she says. “Our Tourism Board is made up of members representing the LeClaire Chamber,

lodging, attractions, retail, restaurants, events, and nonprofits. Cindy Bruhn is our Tourism Manager and she does an amazing job of overseeing our tourism efforts for LeClaire. She also manages our Information Center, which is overseen by the Tourism Board, with the help of 30 volunteers. We have just moved into our new space for the Information Center, located at 117 S. Cody Road.”

“The LeClaire Tourism Board works together with the Quad Cities Convention & Visitors Bureau and Travel Iowa to promote the city and its many attractions. It takes all entities to make LeClaire a great, successful small town we can take pride in,” says Ms. Mulvania. “We have lots of new development and new businesses are being added throughout town, not just in downtown.” The board offers a detailed brochure on their website that not only shows the locations for attractions, restaurants and services around town, but also shows the

locations of historical, private homes. The Buffalo Bill Museum has an exhibit on the River Pilots, who took settlers’ boats through dangerous rapids near the town in the 19th century, and three of their homes are still standing, although not open to the public for tours.

There’s enough to do in LeClaire that one day isn’t enough time to do it all and spend time enjoying the gorgeous views of the Mississippi River available from nearly everywhere you look. “We want to attract guests to spend the day, the weekend, or their vacations with us. We want to encourage out of towners to fill our many hotels and guest houses.” Accommodations range from hotels and bed & breakfasts to condominiums and lofts, perfect for any size entourage and close to everything.

The Tourism Board is also responsible for scheduling many of the events taking place in town throughout the year. Whether it’s a First Friday celebration all through town, live outdoor music at a number of venues, or car shows on the levee, there’s always something fun going on.

The LeClaire Tourism Board isn’t just a resource for tourists. The group also attracts families to live in LeClaire and helps promote growth in the area. The tourism brochure available on their website not only shows visitor friendly stops like restaurants and attractions, but also has locations for services new residents need, like doctors’ offices and churches.

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

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LeClaire History

LeClaire is situated on a rather unique point on the Mississippi River. Instead of flowing north and south, like it does for the rest of its length, the river makes a sharp westerly turn and runs southwest for 15 miles. The high rocks and narrow channel made the passage dangerous to navigate. In 1832, Antoine LeClaire received a section of the upper rapids in a treaty with local Indians and the city was chartered in 1834. Iowa became the 29th state in 1846 and Buffalo Bill Cody was born the same year, two miles northwest of town.

Antoine LeClaire owned a sandstone quarry that provided stone used in the construction of several local landmarks, including the Clock Tower at the Rock Island Arsenal, Augustana College in nearby Rock Island, IL and abutments on the Government Bridge at the Arsenal. The quarry was located where the antique mall stands today. The town was home to several river pilots who made their living navigating the hazardous river rapids.

Today the city is known for its historical and river tourism. The downtown features a variety of shops

and restaurants, all with breathtaking views of the Mississippi River. Birdwatchers can spend an entire day enjoying the gulls, herons, pelicans, Canada geese, and other birds that frequent the area.

It's also known for hosting Tug Fest every summer with Port Byron, IL, directly across the river. Teams compete in tug of war competitions across the Mississippi River using a 2,700 foot long rope for bragging rights and an alabaster statue of an eagle in flight. Carnival rides, food, and live music add to the festive atmosphere, and the fireworks show over the river is not to be missed.



The Green Tree



The famous Green Tree elm was located along the banks of the Mississippi River in LeClaire. It was known as a landmark among people who lived in LeClaire or to people who had visited LeClaire. In 1920 it was placed on the register of the American Forestry Association's famous trees. In 1964 it contracted Dutch Elm disease and had to be cut down. One section of the famous tree can be viewed at the Buffalo Bill Museum in downtown LeClaire.


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Twilight Cruises



It's one thing to stand on the banks of the Mississippi River and watch the river go by. It's an entirely different experience to be out on the water, seeing sunlight reflecting on the waves and watching birds you might not normally see fly by. Thanks to the Riverboat Twilight, you don't need to make friends with a boat owner to experience this.

"We are a small family owned and operated company," says co-owner Carrie Stier. "Captain Kevin and I began working in the business in our late teens/early twenties. We grew up on the river with its history and stories an ever-constant thread woven into our history and so have our children. We took over the company from Captain Dennis Trone, who designed and built the Twilight, as well as other notable riverboats. We strive to keep the history and romance of riverboat travel alive and well for many more generations."

The Twilight celebrates her 30th anniversary this year. "We began by offering two-day overnight cruises between LeClaire and Galena. Trips included a stay at the Chestnut Mountain Ski Resort and time spent in downtown Galena. In 2005, the Twilight continued on upriver to make her overnight stay at the Grand Harbor Resort in Dubuque. Included in

the tour is complimentary shuttle service the second morning to various Port of Dubuque attractions, including the award winning National Mississippi River Museum."

The cruises have something to offer everyone, but they're more about relaxation than action. "While the onboard narration and entertainment is family friendly, there aren't any activities designed specifically for children. The Twilight has three decks with plenty of indoor and outdoor seating to relax and enjoy the peacefulness of the river and to view the various birds and other wildlife. There is not any activity space for games or other outdoor activities children may need over two days. Parents and grandparents might want to take into consideration the activity and interest level of their children before booking."

The cruises are full of experiences you won't find anywhere else. "We typically see 20-40 or more eagles on every cruise. We also see pelicans, cormorants, egrets, herons, and the occasional swimming deer. We lock through at Lock and Dam 12 and 13, which is something not many people get to experience from the river side."



Cruisers rave about the experience. One wrote, "I highly recommend the Twilight to anyone who loves to relax and enjoy nature. Sitting on the deck watching eagles, pelicans, and other wildlife as you lazily make your way up and back down the Mississippi is a perfect way to spend a couple of days with family and friends. The crew and staff are excellent -- so friendly and accommodating. Both LeClaire and Dubuque were wonderful places to visit, each providing their own piece of history. This was a first class trip from beginning to end."

Another said, "My husband and I have taken the two day trip three times. We have thought it was the most relaxing thing we have ever done. The food is terrific and you learn a lot on the way too. We love it, there is nothing like it!"

For those worried about motion sickness, relax. "The river is much calmer than people realize, and the fact that you can see both shores the entire time helps. Over the last 30 years, I cannot remember more than a handful of reports of people becoming seasick."

"Due to popular demand, we have added some 1 ½ hour sightseeing cruises to our calendar. This allows people who don't have time for a longer cruise to experience the Twilight. These cruises offer the perfect opportunity for parents and grandparents to bring young children aboard." These cruises will depart from the dock in LeClaire every third Saturday through October. Departure times are 11 a.m., 1 p.m., and 3 p.m. The cost is \$16 per adult, \$8 for children 14 and under and free for children 3 years and younger but they must have a ticket. It is recommended to purchase tickets on their website in advance. Tickets will be available for purchase the day of cruises, assuming they have not sold out, at the dock in LeClaire.

Cruisers are in for a relaxing afternoon on the river with these trips, without worrying about loading and unloading a boat of their own. "The Twilight


travels north and takes in the sights of the Mississippi River, its wildlife, and the river towns of Port Byron and Cordova, IL, and Princeton, IA. The Captain gives a brief history of the area and facts about the river and it's commerce. There's plenty of time to relax, enjoy a complimentary glass of iced tea or lemonade or to purchase a beverage at the full service bar on the third deck. Our gift shop is located on the bottom deck and offers a variety of Twilight souvenir items. No food service is provided, however, passengers are welcome to bring a sack lunch or small picnic basket with them." Coolers and alcoholic beverages are prohibited on board.

Autumn is, understandably, a busy time for the company. "Fall is a very popular time for our color cruises. There is a short window of time to catch the fall colors, so those trips do sell out quite far in advance."

These cruises are truly a trip back in time, says Ms. Stier. "I dare you to listen to the calliope play and not imagine yourself back in 1860. You are dressed in your Sunday best waiting for a steamboat to take you out for an evening dance cruise, the decks filled with of all your friends and neighbors. Or perhaps you are sitting underneath the famous Green Tree in LeClaire, listening to the roustabouts singing as they load and unload the many boats parked there. It is truly an authentic American experience."

Buffalo Bill Museum



It's hard to miss the Buffalo Bill Museum in downtown LeClaire, with its bright red paddlewheel on one side and the large buffalo statue in front, next to the museum's sign. The low brick building perched on the riverfront looks more like a post office than a museum, but inside is a wealth of curiosities that are found nowhere else.

There's something for everyone at the museum, says Bob Schiffke, executive director of the Buffalo Bill Museum. "It's not all just about Buffalo Bill, he's only about one fifth of the exhibits. He was born in LeClaire, so that's why people stop. But we're actually a regional history museum." Exhibits include Iron Eyes Cody's teepee, women's fashions from the early 1900s, and a 1939 Chris Craft speedboat. Other exhibits explain how clams were turned into buttons, and let children play with a pilot's wheel, or go on a "find and seek" hunt.

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The Buffalo Bill Museum marks its 60th year in 2017 and features a wide variety of exhibits that showcase other notable residents besides the Wild West showman. Prof. James Ryan II graduated from LeClaire High School in 1920 and went on to test automotive safety equipment, as well as invent the Ryan Flight Recorder, better known as the “black box” used in airplanes to record communications and other data. He also invented seat belts and a copy of his office from the University of Minnesota is at the museum. Another local resident, James Eads, lived in town during his youth and grew up to design the Eads Bridge in St. Louis. This was the first bridge of significant size to use steel as a primary material and the first road and rail bridge to cross the Mississippi River.

Since the museum is only a short distance from the Mississippi River, it makes sense that there’s an exhibit with a boat. “We have a Lone Star Steamboat, the last remaining wooden hulled paddlewheel steamboat in the United States that’s still intact. The motor is

visible, too,” says Mr. Schiffke. “In the summer we have a World War 2 Model-T fire engine on display. We keep it in storage at the fire department during the winter.”

Mr. Schiffke is eager to mention an exhibit about a group of daredevil river pilots. “Many people didn’t want to take their boats through the dangerous rapids by LeClaire, so they’d hire the River Rapids Pilots to do it for them. The Pilots would take boats through the rapids, and then people would continue the journey on their own. There were about 20 of them who lived in LeClaire, so that’s why the town was so important to the river’s business.”

The museum is working in conjunction with 11 other local museums as part of a treasure hunt, or geocache. Participating museums offer wooden nickels for visitors to collect. Green Tree Brewery



Denise Day, co-owner of Green Tree Brewery with her husband, Dr. Richard Day, says he's the real reason they're in the business. "He had been home brewing for over 25 years when we got the idea to open a microbrewery. It took about two years from the day we decided to follow our dream to the day we opened, which was the first week in August 2015." The brewery offers 15 beers on tap, all made locally and with fresh ingredients. "We grind our own grains for every batch of beer that we brew and use the freshest other ingredients available. We are a small tap room but people can actually watch them brew if it's a brew day. We are a small microbrewery that has a brew master and an assistant brew master who pour their hearts into every beer they brew. I am incredibly impressed with these two and their drive to do their best. They want to keep it a craft. They have no desire to go national. They don't want unknown people brewing our beers at a production facility. They want to be hands-on with every batch they brew." This company has no desire for the big time. "We want to stay in our little area of LeClaire and the Quad Cities and make fresh, delicious beer for our community. They love when other bars and restaurants want to serve their beers."

"All of our beer recipes are my husband's, with some input from his friends and colleagues. It was very different going from 5-gallon batches to almost 500-gallon batches! The different flavors, such as our Mintery Knight, which is a Mint Chocolate Coffee Stout, came together after working with Coffee Hound, a local coffee company in Bettendorf, and several friends. We blended natural fruit flavors along with other delicious beers to come up with our Berry Barely Blonde. It's blended with blueberries, blackberries, and black raspberries and our Doc's Blonde beer. We had no idea that the beer would come out green! It is very GREEN! It's very unique and will be at this year's John Deere Classic PGA tournament." The

golf tournament isn't the only local sporting venue that serves Green Tree's brews. "We have our own craft beer lounge at the iWireless Center in Moline. We have four beers on tap there and they are available during all of the events, except ones that don't allow the sale of alcohol."

Beers with names like Buffalo Spit and PB & J(ava) just beg to be ordered, if only to see how they taste. "The credit for the names of the beers goes to several people. My husband, who is a dentist and brew master, came up with several names with my help. We have had family, friends, and our beer slayers come up with some of the names. We even had a Facebook contest to come up with our beer named Mango Me Hoppy."

"The Brewer's Choice right now is a beer called Quiet Contender, which is his newest one and his favorite one to date. It is an American Pale Ale (APA). The Mango Me Hoppy is a mango infused IPA (India Pale Ale). We have had several seasonal beers. Our Berry Barely Blonde usually goes off in the fall and comes back on St. Paddy's Day; that way we don't have to dye a beer green. In the fall, we put on a stout called Canadian Breakfast. Most breweries do a pumpkin beer, but we choose not to. The Canadian Breakfast is a Maple Pecan Coffee Stout."

There's more to do than just sip a cold one while watching the river go by at Green Tree. "We host a euchre tournament once a month on a Tuesday for the Quad City Mallards Booster Club which benefits different things for the team. Dr. Day is the team dentist for the Quad City Mallards hockey team."

We usually have bands performing inside on our patio most Friday evenings and every Saturday night."

If the fresh air and good beer leave you feeling peckish, Green Tree has menus from several local restaurants that are more than happy to deliver. You can bring in food from any restaurant or your own snacks, too.





Wine & Spirits



Imagine enjoying an afternoon soaking up the sun on the riverbank, browsing a few shops, enjoying a great meal, and then a night of good music and excellent wine. This experience is waiting for you in LeClaire and at Wide River Winery. Even better, when you're ready for a break you don't have to remember where you parked the car; you just wander up a short flight of stairs to a cozy apartment with a full kitchen at the Wide River Winery Inn.

"In 2005, Wide River Winery started growing grapes, making and sharing wine in Clinton, which is about 30 miles north of LeClaire, where it overlooks the widest point of the Mississippi River," says Liz Quinn, Director of Sales & Marketing and Wine-Maker in Training. "In 2011, we decided to expand our wine tasting experience to LeClaire, which was attracting increased tourist traffic, new shops, and had a supportive city council willing to invest to upgrade the downtown area. We initially opened in the basement where the LeClaire Olive Oil Company is today. We even hosted a few small acoustic music performances in the basement wine tasting room. Our experience was so positive in LeClaire that Wide River decided to invest in the historic building next door at 106 N. Cody Road. It's a building that was originally built in 1842 and was used as an Underground Railroad hideout during the Civil War. We completely renovated it as a bright, fun, welcoming wine tasting room with an adjoining courtyard, perfect for listening to live music with friends and sipping on wine. It even had an apartment that we could offer as an inn. Our grand opening was in April 2013."

Part of the fun of making your own wine is naming it, and the winemakers at Wide River get to poke fun at their day jobs when it comes to naming the different wines. "The owner, viticulturist and wine-maker for Wide River Winery, Dorothy O'Brien, is also a practicing attorney. Her husband, Charlie Pelton, was a district court judge for 40 years, and two children in the family are attorneys. The family's knowledge and passion for the law are the inspiration behind many of the wine names on the list such as Felony Red, Ms. D'Meanor White, White Collar Crime, Pursuit of Happiness, and Sweet Justice. We've also been known to ask our customers to vote on new wine names."

Ms. O'Brien is a pioneer in the Iowa wine business and has the awards to show for her hard work. "Dorothy has been making wine in the young Iowa wine industry for more than 10 years, and her wines have won a number of awards at the Mid-America wine competition and the Iowa State Fair. Our wine list has 14-16 wines and fortified wines, including both red and white wines, ranging from dry to fruity sweet and in-between. We also offer a delicious wine slushie. We often hear from customers that they have trouble choosing which wines to bring home because they're all so good."

Ms. Quinn says the winery remains committed to making sure people have a good time when they visit. "In addition to sharing award-winning local wine with people visiting LeClaire, we aim to provide a friendly, fun experience in our tasting room that makes people happy. We're an advocate for talented musicians, and excited to provide a venue to entertain customers while they enjoy wine and tasty small bites. Every Friday, from the Friday before Memorial Day to the end of September, a live band performs in our courtyard from 5-8 p.m. Our live music schedule for all three of our locations can be found at wideriverwinery.com/events. THE PLEASANT VALLEY COMMUNITY SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Pleasant Valley Community School District is a premier, innovative district located along the beautiful Mississippi River. Named among top schools in the state and ranked nationally by U.S. News and World Report, Pleasant Valley prepares students to succeed in a diverse, global society. The district's goal is to have the finest academic and extra-curricular programs in the state... not in some things but in everything; not for some students but for every student.

In the last five years, the district has seen rapid growth in enrollment. Nearly 700 more students attended PV in the 2016-17 school year than did in the 2011-12 school year. To accommodate the growth, the district built and opened Hopewell Elementary in Bettendorf in 2011 and, in 2016 and 2017, finished additions to Bridgeview and Cody Elementaries in LeClaire. Each building features a state-of-the-art media center, along with new classrooms and other amenities to support teaching and learning. The Junior High has a new wing that houses classrooms, along with an industrial technology lab for additional STEM training. Construction is currently underway on a large renovation and expansion of Pleasant Valley High School, adding cutting-edge laboratories, a gymnasium, additional space for music classes, and a remodeled entrance and main office (see insert).

Pleasant Valley prides itself on academics. In the 2016-17 school year, eight National Merit Finalists came from PVHS. The High School offers 14 AP courses, 26 dual enrollment courses, and nine career academies (which are college level courses that allow students to immerse themselves in topics like education, medicine, and computer science). The state of Iowa rated Pleasant Valley Junior High among the best in



the state in the 2016 Iowa School Report Card, giving PVJH an exceptional rating. 98% of 8th grade students are proficient in science, 93% in math, and 88% in reading on Iowa Assessments. PV's elementary students perform well, too. 94% of 4th grade students are proficient in science, 93% in math, and 88% in reading.

The fine arts departments at PV continue to grow. Pleasant Valley now has more than 800 students in the 6th grade to 12th grade Band program, more than 800 in the 4th to 12th grades participate in Choir, and nearly 400 participate in the 4th to 12th grade Orchestra program. PV's theater program will perform for the International Thespian Festival in the summer of 2017, and performs multiple shows throughout the year in professional-grade theatre and a unique black box venue. For visual arts, students have earned top prizes at QC Arts, the Figge Art Museum, and Festival of Trees. PV Fine Arts programs score highly in state-wide competitions and produce dozens of All-Staters every year.

PV's extra-curricular programs compete successfully at the conference and state level. From the Platinum Dance Team to Swimming and Diving to Tennis to Track, PV athletes qualify for and win state championships. PV's academic clubs, like robotics teams and History and Geography Bowl, also place at state and national championships.

In the 2016-17 school year, there are 331 certified teachers under contract in the district. 62.5% of the teachers have masters degrees. 86% of the teaching staff has taught five years or more.

- + Elementary and Secondary Technology Coaches whose focus is on technology supporting the curriculum to deepen learning



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
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
