
Past projects of our group include the installation of the Thornton Park fountain on Washington St, and the entrance sign at Robison Street and Mills Ave.





Where is Thornton Park?

The definition of Thornton Park has always been a bit fuzzy. There are actually three different, overlapping jurisdictions. The first is the "Thornton Park Neighborhood", a City of Orlando designated neighborhood shown below. It is bordered on the north by Robinson Street, the west by Summerlin Ave, the south by the 408 and the east by Brown Ave, but not including the area around Lake Lawsona (refer to the map—it's easier as a picture!).



Most of Thornton Park is part of the larger Lake Lawsona Historic District, which includes part of the Lawsona/Ferncreek Neighborhood.

There is also the Thornton Park District (TPD), set up by the National Historic Trust's Main Street program. This is a business district with paid membership, and includes the Washington Street and Summerlin Ave establishments, but also the businesses stretching west towards downtown along Central Ave and Eola Drive. We all work together for the benefit of the community, and are open to all!

LAKE LAWSONA HISTORIC DISTRICT

Depending on your address, you may be living in the Lake Lawsona Historic District, which carries special protections and rules, as provided by the City of Orlando (www.cityoforlando.net/city-planning/historic-preservation/districts/):

Background

"Encompassing the neighborhoods of Lawsona/Fern Creek and Thornton Park, the Lake Lawsona Historic District was established in 1994 as a local historic district. Platted and developed between 1911 and the 1950s, the district contains approximately 500 buildings and is illustrative of the growth patterns of the city in the first half of this century with its mix of residential, educational and commercial structures.

A variety of architectural styles and forms can be found in the district including bungalows, Craftsman, Minimal Traditional and Colonial, Mediterranean, Mission, Neoclassical, and Tudor revivals. Bungalows are the predominant contributing structures in the district.

Three sites within the Lake Lawsona Historic District have been recognized as local historic landmarks. They are H.H. Dickson Azalea Park (1935), the Washington Street Bridge (1926) and Orlando High School, now Howard Middle School (1927).

The Neoclassical Revival Orlando High School is located at 800 East Robinson Street. The last class graduated in 1952 when Boone and Edgewater high schools opened. Distinguished alumni include astronaut John Young, former Orlando mayor Carl T. Langford, actor Buddy Ebsen, and Nobel Prize winner for medicine, Dr. Marshall W. Nirenberg.

Permitting Requirements

Before you make certain exterior changes to your property, a Certificate of Appropriateness must first be issued by the Historic Preservation Board. Exterior changes that will minimally impact the appearance of a structure such as re-roofing, fences, paving, and repair with matching materials can be expedited by the Minor Review Committee of the Board in 2 to 10 days. Major modifications that would significantly impact a property in the district, such as alterations, additions, new construction, relocation, and demolition, require a hearing of the Board for approval. Expect approximately seven weeks from the closing date until the Certificate of Appropriateness is issued. The City charges a \$50 fee for a Certificate of Appropriateness

There are exceptions to these requirements. Approval does not have to be obtained for landscaping; any change to the exterior that is not subject to view from one or more public streets, parks or lakes; color; and emergency repair that will not change the exterior design. In addition, chain link fences may not be installed where they are visible from the street, parks or lakes.


Incentives

The City takes an active role in preserving the architectural heritage of the Lake Lawsona Historic District and offers a property tax exemption for contributing buildings in the district. The property tax exemption is to encourage property owners to substantially rehabilitate contributing structures in the district. This 10-year exemption applies to 100% of the City's portion of the property taxes attributed to the increase in property value due to rehabilitation. The exemption period remains intact with the sale of the property.

Historic Plaques

When the Lake Lawsona Historic District was first formed in 1994, Thornton Park plaques were purchased with help from the City of Orlando. As you may have noticed, not all houses have this plaque. We encourage you to help preserve and highlight the historic character of our Thornton Park neighborhood by ordering a plaque. The Thornton Park Neighborhood Association paid for the one-time pattern charge. Plaques cost about \$80.

THORNTON PARK MAIN STREET DISTRICT (TPD)


The Thornton Park Neighborhood is also home to one of Orlando's favorite Main Street Districts, the Thornton Park District, which is shared with the South Eola Neighborhood: The Thornton Park Neighborhood Association works closely with the Thornton Park District to coordinate events, neighborhood projects, communications, etc.



According to their website (www.thorntonparkdistrict.com), "Thornton Park has a very cosmopolitan feel, as it is the location of exclusive restaurants, high-end fashion boutiques, and The Sanctuary, which has some of the most expensive condo units in Orlando. Other luxury condominium buildings in that area include The Waverly and 101 Eola. It has also become one of the most desirable and expensive places to live in downtown, attracting young professionals and urban dwellers. As a result, the area has become a lively 24/7 neighborhood, with a diverse mix of people. Greenwood Cemetery, Orlando's oldest cemetery, is located just south of Thornton Park in the Lake Davis/Greenwood neighborhood. Designed and plotted in 1880, it is the final resting place for many of the city's founders.

The overall look of the neighborhood and creative reuse of existing structures serve as a reminder that this emerging community within walking distance of downtown is a reassured enclave. Styles of homes range from 1920s bungalows to Craftsman-style structures to Tudor Revivals, all of them lining renovated brick streets with pristine landscaping. Adaptive reuse is also a calling card of the community.

Foodies, fear not! Thornton Park offers numerous pet-friendly dining options. The Stubborn Mule has freshly prepared food and a selection of Mule Cocktails and craft beer. The outdoor patio is open and spacious and offers shaded seating if you're looking to stay out of the sun. Dexter's is another restaurant that has dog-friendly outdoor patio seating. The quiet location makes it the perfect place to relax with an adult beverage or two. The drink menu includes wines, champagne, ports, and sherry. Are you hungry, too? The menu features seasonal options including brunch, lunch, and dinner plates. Burton's Bar and Grill is a laid-back bar with an old jukebox and a wide selection of beer. This dive bar is a favorite with locals. Play darts, jam out to your favorite song, or chow down on some popcorn."

Lymmo


LYMMO is a free Downtown bus service that allows you to conveniently see, feel, and hear the heartbeat of the vibrant city of Orlando. In Thornton Park, the bus picks up on Central Blvd, across from Soco. And best of all, LYMMO is FREE! For the Orange Line, service runs every 7 minutes during peak, and 15 minutes off peak. The Grapefruit Line runs every 10 minutes during peak and 15 minutes off peak. Additionally, the buses kneel and have special boarding ramps, to make riding much easier for wheelchairs and passengers with disabilities. Hours of Operation are as follows: Monday – Thursday: 6:00 am to 10:00 pm, Friday: 6:00 am – Midnight, Saturday: 10:00 am to Midnight, Sunday: 10:00 am to 10:00 pm.



Bike Paths




Buses

Two Lynx bus routes go through Thornton Park, and several others are close by.

The **51** goes from Lynx Central Station to Colonial Plaza, and on to the VA Clinic and UCF (UCF students ride free!).




The **104** is an express line, picking up at the corner of Summerlin and Robinson, stopping at Fashion Square Mall and Valencia College East, and UCF.



WALKABILITY

According to Walkscore.com, Thornton Park has an average walkability score of 85, which is very walkable, and is the third most walkable neighborhood in Orlando. Within a ten-minute walk, we have access to numerous restaurants, bars, salons, shops, public transit stops, entertainment, and a grocery store. Orlando's overall Walk Score is only 42. Walkscore.com says that they "believe that walkable neighborhoods with access to public transit, better commutes, and proximity to the people and places you love are the key to a happier, healthier and more sustainable lifestyle".
