ONE PERSON ONE TREE PROGRAM LAUNCHED

The City of Orlando and Mayor Dyer have initiated a program to increase the tree canopy cover of Orlando. The program helps you decide and choose between trees for private property, along the street, for a neighborhood, or special dedication trees. The City website (http://www.cityoforlando.net/trees/) provides instructions on how to order trees, how to take care of them, and the benefits of a larger tree canopy.

For private property, residents can order one free tree per growing season (spring or fall). The City has partnered with the Arbor Day Foundation and OUC to provide energy saving trees, including Live Oaks, Nutall Oaks, and Tulip Poplars, which are all canopy trees, or Dahoon Holly or Chinese Pistache, which are understory trees. Trees for private property are shipped to your front door, and should be planted within the first few days of receiving it.

You can also request two "street trees" to be planted in the front right-of-way, or four trees for a corner lot. These choices include live oaks, nutall oaks, winged elms, magnolias, or tabebuia (pink trumpet trees). If you have a narrow parkway or overhead power lines, the following understory trees can be selected: Japanese blueberry, Eagleston holly, Yaupon holly, yellow tabebuia (trumpet tree), or crepe myrtle. Once requested, the tree will be planted on the right-of-way next to your property at no cost. In return, the homeowner must agree to be responsible for watering, fertilizing and caring for the tree.

A neighborhood group or association can also order larger trees at wholesale to plant on private property. At least 15 trees must be ordered.

The City also offers giveaways at many events held at different locations throughout the year, including Earth Day, the Wetlands Festival, National Public Lands Day, and Spring into Sustainability 2016.

Finally, the Dedicated Tree Program allows individuals to purchase a tree in honor of an individual, group or organization in a City park. The One Person One Tree program aims to increase Orlando's urban tree canopy to 40 percent. Benefits include:

Reduce Energy Cost - Trees planted in the right places around your home can reduce air conditioning needs by 30 percent.

Reduce Urban Heat - The net cooling effect of a young, healthy tree is equivalent to 10 roomsized air conditioners operating 20 hours a day.

Clean the Air - One acre of forest produces enough oxygen over a year for 18 people.

Property Value - A healthy, mature tree can add up to \$10,000 to your home's value.

Habitats for Wildlife - Trees provide shelter, food and places for wildlife to raise their young.

Reduce Driving Speed - A study in downtown Toronto showed that crashes declined 5-20 percent on streets with trees or planters along them.

NO FOAM ZONE

You may have seen signs around town for a "No Foam Zone". I was confused at first as to what this was—is someone against foam parties? No sea foam at the beach? Turns out there is a local movement in Orlando to ban polystyrene (Styrofoam) headed by Thornton Park's Soil & Water Conservation Supervisor for District 4, Eric Rollings. A petition has been started at nofoamzone.org to prohibit the use of single-use foam containers by restaurants, food vendors, and consumers. This would affect Thornton Park restaurants, coffee shops, and of course, consumers. According to the campaign, foam used for coffee cups, to-go containers and coolers is harmful to our health, the environment and wildlife. Foam products are petroleum based and never decompose; they just break into tiny pieces, which are extremely difficult to remove from our waterways, streets and parks. Many of these pieces resemble food sources for wildlife. Each year, thousands of animals die after ingesting pieces of discarded foam containers. There are many safer alternatives to foam containers that are readily available, and only cost a tiny bit more. Cities that have already made the ban include New York, Minneapolis, Miami Beach, Washington, DC, and most of California.
