COUNTY COMMISSION RUNOFF ELECTION







Emily Bonilla

Orange County Commission District 5 (which includes Thornton Park) has a stark choice in the run-off election between incumbent Ted Edwards and new-comer Emily Bonilla, Mr. Edwards has served since 2010, and had previously been involved with MetroPlan Orlando, was director of UCF's research park, has his own law office, and has been involved with the OC Arts & Cultural Tourism Council, Commission on Aging, Central Florida Fair, and Quest. Ms. Bonilla, who has a Bachelor's Degree in English from UCF and a Masters in Internet Marketing from Full Sail University, has lived in Orange County for 18 years. She has extensive private sector experience in film, photography, marketing and creative writing and has worked as a Career Advisor at Full Sail University. Seeing a need for the organization of residents to protect their rural environment. Emily created Save East Orlando in 2013, which she later transformed into East of the Econ™, LLC. She also served as a co-founder and acting Chairperson of Save Orange County. Bonilla contends that Commissioners have a responsibility to oppose developments that harm the environment and economy, and is opposed to urban sprawl. She launched her campaign in response to Edwards' unpopular support for a pair of mega-developments that would allow developers to build thousands of homes in rural Orange County, with tax breaks, east of the Econlockhatchee River.

DUPLEX DESIGN STANDARDS

Orlando residents, developers, and City officials have been engaged in an ongoing discussion about design standards for new duplex construction. The City has proposed the following standards:

- "Anti-monotony" standards to avoid mirror image duplexes and promote architecturally interesting buildings.
- Reduce the mass and scale by limiting the Floor Area Ratio (FAR) from 0.60 to 0.50 (measures the development intensity by comparing floor area to lot size)
- Increase the number of canopy trees planted and require at least one of the trees to be located in the front yard.
- Allow a duplex to be split into two separate units that can be bought and sold independent of each other.

According to a Bungalower report, most debate surrounds the FAR requirement. Some residents oppose the higher density, while developers believe the lower requirement could lead to lower lot values and strip property rights from owners. In Charging Parkeduples on the lower Historic District standards. Elizabeth Holler-Dang is leading the effort for the City, and she is planning to submit the updated standards at the Municipal Planning Board's December 20, 2016 meeting.

5 Historic Homeowner Mistakes (The following is taken with permission from neighbor Scott Sidler's "Craftsman Blog". Scott is owner of Austin Home Restorations.)



- Windows These are some of the first to go since the replacement window industry tells us daily how terrible original windows are. Learn what you can do to save them.
- Floors Covering up old wood floors or tearing them out to install cheaper
 options just because they are old is insanity. Old wood floors are some of
 the most resilient parts of your old house. They will last longer than most
 other parts with a little care.
- Siding Wood siding doesn't need to be covered up with vinyl or aluminum. It just needs to be painted on occasion and it will last indefinitely.
- 4. **Plaster** Plaster is often ripped out to make way for drywall and insulation, but it doesn't need to be. It is a far superior wall covering to drywall and can be repaired with relative ease.
- Details Every house has specific architectural details that may not seem important, but without them the character of the house would be lost. Don't make this mistake!
