HOWARD MIDDLE SCHOOL

Our Thornton Park Neighborhood includes residences, businesses, and a school—Howard Middle School, which was built in 1926 as Orlando High School. According to Wikipedia and the HMS website, prior to 1952, there were only two high schools in the City of Orlando: Orlando



High School and Jones High School, which was a Segregation-era, Black-only high school until integration was enforced. The gymnasium was added in the late 1930s. The cafeteria/band room was added in 1948 and the old OHS letters can still be seen on the southwest corner of the building. Some famous graduates of OHS include actor Buddy Ebsen and astronaut John Young. In 1952, Orlando High was split into what became Edgewater High School and William R. Boone High School, and the former Orlando High campus became Howard Middle School. The building was renamed for Mr. C.E. Howard, a school trustee of earlier years. The school colors of blue and red and the Ranger mascot were selected. In 2011, the Orange County School Board designated Howard as a Visual and Performing Arts Magnet school. Their goal is to lead students on a path toward creative and academic excellence and prepare them for successful high school and college careers. Today, HMS offers the widest selection of academic and elective courses of any middle school in Orange County Public Schools. As a magnet school for the Visual and Performing Arts, HMS provides a wide array of electives from which students may choose, including 24 visual and performing arts courses plus four enhanced elective courses. Students may also take several courses for high school credit, including Honors Earth Space Science. Many levels of Art, Band, Orchestra, Chorus, Dance and Drama are just some of the opportunities available for their students, both zoned and Magnet alike. In addition to the Magnet program, Howard is also an AVID National Demonstration School. The AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) program is an in-school academic support program for grades 4-12 that prepares academically aver-age students for college eligibility and success. AVID levels the playing field for minority, rural, low-income and other students without a college-going tradition in their families, but is for all students.

Emily Bonilla was recently elected to the Orange County Commission, representing our District 5. Emily ran on a campaign of responsible preservation and sustainable development. Ms. Bonilla was been an advocate and active member of the "East of the Econ" preservation movement, a civic organization dedicated to limiting urban sprawl in rural east Orange County (as an example, the Lake Pickett Developments), preserving the watershed, the vibrant wildlife corridor, traditional rural lifestyle and prevent additional traffic in an overly congested area. Bonilla contends the Commissioner's responsibility to oppose developments that harm the environment and economy is of great importance. GREASE FIGHTER

The City of Orlando has launched a new effort to recycle used cooking oil, by introducing an Orlando-esque mascot, "Grease Fighter". According to the City's website, pouring oil and grease down the drain is the leading cause of sewer backups, which can lead to the contamination of our many lakes. Types of oil/grease include animal grease from cooking animal fat (e.g. bacon grease), lard, and all vegetable oils. You can help Grease Fighter by saving your



used cooking oil in a shatterproof container and then bringing it to one of our community centers to be recycled. Our two nearest centers are Beardall Senior Center, 800 S Delaney Ave, and Dept of Families, Park and Recreation, 595 N. Primrose Dr. Grease Fighter jugs can also be picked up at these community centers. After being collected weekly, the oils are converted to a bio-diesel. CRAFTSMAN CORNER

American Foursquare (The following is taken with permission from neighbor Scott Sidler's "Craftsman Blog", Austin Home Restorations.)

The simple and easily adaptable Foursquare was the perfect house to fit the most space into the small city lots from the 1890s-1930s. It received its name from its perfectly square shape and massing of four



rooms per floor in most cases. These houses could be as plain or ornate as the owner wished and their skins were any range of components such as brick, stone, stucco, shingles, or clapboards. Like the American Craftsman of the same time, it was a return to simpler design in reaction to the Victorian styles that preceded it. A full front porch with either greek or craftsman inspired boxed columns, along with wood floors and plaster walls were typical.
