We believe migrants from all over the world deserve the right to feel safe, comfortable, and happy in the United States without the fear of deportation. Simple, everyday tasks are anxiety-inducing for many undocumented people here in America. In response, many isolate themselves from big cities and populated areas in order to survive. No one should live like this. No person should live in fear of being deported. No one is illegal.

CASA is happening today. We believe stories like these must be told to spread awareness of the issue. Immigration is a popular topic, but not everybody is spared from experiencing the depths and affects that detention centers, ICE, and police have in everyday Latinx households.
