Distinguished Leadership

Dr. Loui Olivas

Professor Emeritus, Management Department W. P. Carey School of Business, Arizona State University

Dr. Loui Olivas, a fourth-generation native Phoenician, joined Arizona State University (ASU) in 1979 as the assistant director of the Center for Executive Development and served as the director from 1982-86. Dr. Olivas served as the assistant vice president for academic affairs at ASU for 17 years until his appointment in 2006 to the position of assistant vice president for education partnerships. After 30 years of service, Dr. Olivas retired from ASU in 2009.

As a tenured professor in the W. P. Carey School of Business Department of Management, his teaching and research emphasis focused on entrepreneurship, small business management demographics-marketing and Hispanic perspectives. Published work by Dr. Olivas focuses on personnel, management, training and small business operations. Since 1999, Dr. Olivas has authored the annual DATOS Report, Arizona Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, and since 1991, he has published the Annual Survey of Hispanic Owned Businesses in Arizona. He is also the editor of the 81st Arizona Town Hall Report entitled Arizona Hispanics: The Evolution of Influence. As president of Olivas and Associates since 1989, Dr. Olivas has worked with Fortune 500 corporations as a consultant in Hispanic demographics and marketing.

Prior to coming to ASU, Dr. Olivas served as the director of executive development and education for Western Savings and Loan Association, director of employee development with the City of Phoenix, and as a consultant, instructor and developer of various other executive development programs for Fortune 500 companies.

In addition to the numerous national and local awards he has received for his work in business, education and the community, honors given to Dr. Olivas include the "Outstanding Teaching Award" by ASU undergraduate students and the "Teaching Excellence Award" for ASU Center for Executive Development. AZ LULAC also named him "Educator of the Year." The American Higher Education Association bestowed upon him their "Higher Education prestigious Leadership Award." The Be A Leader Foundation established an endowed scholarship in his name to honor his sustained efforts in mentoring business students. He is also the recipient of the Valle del Sol Hall of' Fame Award .

Dr. Olivas has provided leadership and service to numerous national and local boards and commissions, such as the founding dean of the National Hispanic Corporate Council Institute; the founding president of the American Association of Hispanics in Higher Education; secretarytreasurer for Project ChalleNGe Foundation; director of the U.S./Mexico Solidarity Foundation; member of the U.S. Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, Council of Economic Advisors; board member of Angelita's Amigos Inc.; board member of St. Joseph's Hospital Foundation; and a founding board member of Sonoran Bank, Arizona. He is also a founding director of Construct Net International and was a founding board member of QuePasa.com, a publicly traded company on NASDAQ. In addition, Dr. Olivas is a retired colonel from the Arizona Air National Guard, having served a distinguished 29-year military career. He greatly enjoys his family, the outdoors and the beauty and excitement of nature.

Dr. Nora Amavisca Reyes Senior Associate Vice President Mesa College: A Maricopa Community College

Nora Amavisca Reyes was born in Roll, Arizona, the youngest of seven children and the only one born in the United States after her family immigrated from Mexico. Nora graduated valedictorian from Antelope Union High School in Wellton, Arizona and continued her education at Arizona State University, completing a Bachelor of Arts degree in Elementary Education, a Master of Education degree in Multicultural/Bilingual Education, and a Doctor of Education degree in Curriculum and Instruction with a specialization in bilingual education.

Dr. Reyes began her teaching career as a bilingual second grade teacher in South Phoenix then shifted her focus to teacher education when she was hired at Mesa Community College (MCC) as Residential Education Faculty. As a native Spanish speaker and first-generation college student from an immigrant Mexican family, she strongly relates to the richness, challenges, and opportunities that emerge from the realities faced by our diverse population, ultimately leading her to serve in faculty and administrative roles within the Maricopa County Community College District (MCCCD), where she has engaged in numerous partnerships to connect with students, other educational agencies, and local as well as international institutions. These partnerships have focused on maximizing resources, maintaining quality, and providing equitable access to educational opportunities by:

- working with Title I schools that have a high percentage of students from low-income families to provide service-learning opportunities for college students as well as professional development for P-20 teachers and staff.
- establishing Memorandums of Understanding with universities focused on transfer programs in high need areas of the workforce and study abroad programs focused on increasing Spanish language proficiency as well as cultural awareness/ responsiveness; and
- administering multi-million dollar grant projects to support student success, professional development, and workforce needs, including two HSI grants.

She has served in numerous leadership roles, including Education Studies Department Chair, Chair of MCC's Department Chair Association, Education Instructional Council and Articulation Task Force Chair, Guanajuato and Xalapa Study Abroad Director, Teachers of Language Learners Learning Community (TL3C) Grant Project Administrator, Acting Dean of Innovative Learning and Academic Support, President of Arizona Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages (AZTESOL), Vice Provost for the MCC Red Mountain Campus, Senior Associate Vice President and College Academic Officer. She is currently completing an Innovation Internship Project focused on identifying and partnering with international institutions of higher education to increase international student enrollment, develop student teaching exchange programs, and increase opportunities for language learning in alignment with workforce needs.

One of the reasons Dr. Reyes initially chose and continues to work at the community college level for more than 25 years is to serve as a liaison between local educational agencies, university partners, and other community organizations to ensure high quality, equitable, and accessible educational opportunities for our youth, professionals, and community members. Beginning with her experiences as a bilingual elementary school teacher, throughout her tenure as a community college faculty member, and in her administrative roles, building community has been a central focus of her work, established through inclusive, collaborative efforts and Her leadership approach open communication. intentionally taps and builds upon available resources and addresses opportunity gaps with a goal of building upon the richness of our diverse communities to collectively create environments that both reflect and empower communities served. With deep passion for empowering individuals and communities through education, she enthusiastically welcomes opportunities to contribute to existing and evolving efforts that ensure high quality educational programs that build individual capacity and community cohesiveness.

Nora is happily married to her high school sweetheart, is the proud mother of three, and now also enjoys her most valued title of "nana" of three. Dr. Alfredo G. de los Santos, Jr. (1936 - 2020) Research Professor, Hispanic Research Center Arizona State University

Since January 2000, de los Santos has been a research professor at Arizona State University Main, Tempe, Arizona, with research and development responsibilities at the Hispanic Research Center in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. He also had an academic assignment with advising and teaching responsibilities in the Division of Leadership and Innovation in the Mary Lou Fulton Teachers College; but, for personal and professional reasons, he resigned effective November 2011.

From 1978 through October 1, 1999--more than twentyone years--de los Santos served as Vice Chancellor for Student and Educational Development at the Maricopa Community Colleges. In that capacity he was responsible for articulation, curriculum, faculty and student development, business and workforce development, international education, external institutional resource development, research, instructional technology development, and facilities planning and construction management.

During the decade of the 1990s, de los Santos was principal investigator for a number of grants funded by the National Science Foundation totaling more than \$25 million, including the Phoenix Urban Systemic Initiative (\$15 million) and the Maricopa Advanced Technology Education Center (\$5 million).

He is the founding president of El Paso Community College and served as a dean at Northampton County Community College (PA) and Florida Keys Junior College (FL), and as a librarian at Florida Keys Junior College and as assistant librarian and English faculty member at Laredo Community College (TX).

Over the years, he has serves as a member of numerous boards, commissions and councils, including the board of trustees of the Tomas Rivera Policy Institute; the Multicultural Education, Training and Advocacy, Inc.; Jobs for the Future, Inc.; and National Center for Public Policy and Higher Education.

As well, Dr. de los Santos served on the Board of Directors for the American Council on Education, the American Association of Community Colleges, the American Association of Hispanics in Higher Education, the American Association for Higher Education, the Council for Higher Education Accreditation, the United States Open University and the Partnership for Service-

Learning. He also was a member of the Board of Trustees for The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, Educational Testing Service, the College Board, and the American College Testing. In addition, he served as a member of the National Advisory Committee on Institutional Quality and Integrity and the Advisory Committee to the W.K. Kellogg Foundation's initiative with Hispanic Serving Institutions, ENLACE.

Dr. de los Santos has received numerous awards and recognitions for his work in higher education, including the 2005 Award for Outstanding Service to Community Colleges by the National Council of Administrators of the American Instructional Association of Community Colleges; the National Leadership Award from the American Association of Community Colleges in 2004; The Reginald Wilson Award from the American Council on Education in October 2001; the Harold W. McGraw, Jr. Prize in Education in September 1998; the Life-Long Dedication to Hispanic Education Award from the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU) in October 1998; the 1995 International Leadership Award from the National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development (NISOD), The University of Texas; Special Recognition Award for Scholarly Research in Bilingual Education from the National Association for Education in 1994, Bilingual and Education Achievement Award from the National Science Foundation in 1993. In 1993, he was named distinguished graduate of the Community College Leadership Program at The University of Texas at Austin.

Dr. de los Santos earned the Associate in Arts degree from Laredo Community College, Texas, and three degrees from The University of Texas at Austin: the bachelor's degree, a master of library science degree and the Ph.D.

Dr. Suzanne J. Desjardin Vice President of Student Affairs Pima Community College

Dr. Suzanne J. Desjardin is the Vice President of Student Affairs at Pima Community College (PCC), a Hispanic Serving Institution, where she has served for 27 years. She provides administrative oversight along with additional Student Affairs leadership of the following areas: Advising, Counseling, Virtual Student Services, Student Title IX, Student Conduct, First Year Experience, Student Life and Co-Curricular Engagement, Access and Disability Resources, serves as a Deputy Title IX Coordinator for students, and is administrative co-chair for the College Behavioral Assessment Team.

As a Student Affairs leader, she has co-led a multi-year redesign of assigned advising and counseling services at PCC to ensure each student is connected to a team for support services to facilitate student success.

Dr. Desjardin has also served in administration in past roles as an Acting Dean and Vice President of Student Development, as Dean of Social Sciences and Student Affairs, and as Dean of Students. She began teaching in 1999 at PCC as a Student Success faculty member and served as a department chair. Since 2019, she has taught graduate courses at the University of Arizona, College of Education, Educational Policy Studies Department in the area of Culturally Responsive Leadership and Policy.

She has also served at PCC as a faculty counselor, coordinator for advising and counseling services, and as an academic advisor. In her past roles, she was appointed as a PTK (Phi Theta Kappa) Advisor and a M.E.Ch.A (Movimiento Estudiantil Chicanos de Aztlan) Advisor to students, and as administrative liaison to the Student Senate.

Additionally, she holds the National Certified Counselor credential.

Dr. Desjardin was selected as a fellow in the American Association of Hispanics in Higher Education (AAHHE) Executive Leadership Academy at California State University-Berkeley, the National Community College Hispanic Council (NCCHC) Leadership Program at University of San Diego, and in the original Escaleras Leadership Program through the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA) at the University of Rhode Island.

Dr. Desjardin has served on dozens of PCC College committees including the 2018 Diversity Committee subgroup which authored the College's inaugural Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Plan. As Dean of Social Sciences and Student Affairs, she worked with faculty leadership to establish the EGTS: Ethnic, Gender, Transborder Studies and Sociology Department and the associated Degree Pathway to include the interdisciplinary cross listing of Mexican American Studies, American Indian Studies and Gender and Womens' Studies courses to expand enrollment offerings and transfer articulation options for students. She collaborated with the Social Services faculty to support partnerships with the PCC Foundation, ASU School of Social Work, and the Tucson Community Food Bank to establish the PCC West Campus Aztec Resource Center Food Pantry for students.

As part of her doctoral research on Latinx student transitions from high school to community college, she worked with 4 different local K12 school districts to conduct qualitative research examining effective educational leadership practices serving Latinx students. She was awarded the Outstanding Dissertation Award from the Arizona School Administrators Association for her dissertation titled, "Living Within and Outside the Margins and Borders: The Impact of School Leadership on Successful Bridge Programs and Latino/a Transitions to Community College and Beyond. She has presented her doctoral research at several national and regional conferences.

Dr. Desjardin has served in the community on the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce Education Committee, and the Dreamers Scholarship Committee. She is serving presently on the Board of Los Descendientes de Tucson as Secretary. Los Descendientes de Tucson has led the development of the newly established Mexican American Heritage and History Museum. Dr. Desjardin is proud to be a 5th generation Tucson native and bilingual Latina, committed to serving all students through the tenets of holistic student development, diversity, equity and inclusion, social justice, and servant leadership.

Dr. Desjardin holds a Ph.D. in Educational Leadership and Policy Studies from the University of Arizona with a minor in Teaching, Learning and Sociocultural Studies, a Master of Arts degree in Curriculum, Instruction and English as a Second Language from Arizona State University, a Master of Counseling degree in Community Counseling from the University of Phoenix, a Bachelor of Arts degree in Communication, with a minor in Spanish and Sociology from the University of Arizona, and an Associate of Arts degree in Speech Communication from Pima Community College.

Outstanding Support of Hispanic Issues in Higher Education

Edith Sayre Auslander Former Member, Arizona Board of Regents (1984 - 1992)

Edith Sayre Auslander is the consultant to Arizona Assurance at The University of Arizona Foundation. Her previous position for fi e years was as Vice President and Senior Associate to the President of the UA.

Auslander is a native Tucsonan who earned both her bachelor's and master's degrees from The University of Arizona. She had a long career in newspaper work as a reporter, copy editor and section editor for The Arizona Daily Star. She also has been an assistant professor of journalism at The University of Arizona and served as vice president of human resources for Tucson Newspapers for more than 15 years.

She left the UA faculty in 1984 when she was appointed by Gov. Bruce Babbitt to the Arizona Board Regents for an eight-year term. She was elected president of the Board of Regents for the 1989-90 academic year. During her term as president, she initiated the system-wide study on the status of women.

Auslander is one of 15 founders of the National Association of Hispanic Journalists. She has been listed three times in the Hispanic Business magazine as one of 100 influential U.S. Hispanics and in Replica magazine as one 25 Hispanic Women of the Year. She has been active in several national organizations, including the Editing Program for Minority Journalists and the Multicultural Management Program. She was elected to the board and served as president of the national Media Human Resources Association. She is a past president of the UA Hispanic Alumni Club and of the Hispanic Professional Action Committee.

Auslander has won many writing awards and has been active in a variety of organizations that focus on the needs of women and minorities. She was named Tucson's Woman of the Year in 1986, and received an honorary doctorate of laws from the University of Arizona in 1997. She was honored six times nationally for her human resources work, and she earned the certification of Senior Professional in Human Resources. She has been named to the halls of fame of the UA Student Media Foundation and the National Association of Hispanic Journalists. She has received the Women on the Move and the Iris Dewhirst awards from the Tucson YWCA.

Edith Sayre Auslander Outstanding Support of Hispanic Issues in Higher Education

Dr. Judy Marquez Kiyama Professor Center for the Study of Higher Education Department of Educational Policy Studies & Practice, University of Arizona

Dr. Judy Marquez Kiyama is a professor in the Center for the Study of Higher Education, Department of Educational Policy Studies and Practice, at the University of Arizona. Dr. Kiyama is a community-engaged scholar with nearly 25 years experience in research, practice, and administration. She works to interrogate systems power that perpetuate inequities for of minoritized communities and is committed to understanding the cultural and collective resources drawn upon to confront and (re)shape such systems. It is through this collective work that Dr. Kiyama believes we can affect equitable change at organizational, local, state, and national levels.

Working alongside Latinx/o/a families and communities are at the core of Dr. Kiyama's research efforts. Her research is organized in three interconnected areas: the role of parents and families; equity and power in educational research; and minoritized groups as collective networks of change. Dr. Kiyama's most recent administrative role as the Associate Vice Provost for Faculty Development within the Office of Faculty Affairs offered the opportunity to implement efforts that furthered the aims of the University of Arizona to excel in its Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI) designation. Dr. Kiyama served in this role from 2020-2023, and furthered efforts around equity-focused faculty recruitment, and hiring practices; and developing faculty capacity in research, teaching and curriculum, and service, including creating and overseeing the Culturally Responsive Curriculum Development Institute.

Prior to serving in this role, Dr. Kiyama was Chair of the Higher Education Department at the University of Denver's Morgridge College of Education. Additionally, she served as the College's Office of Diversity and Inclusion Faculty Fellow where she established a comprehensive plan for recruiting, hiring, and retaining faculty of color. Dr. Kiyama has been as a faculty member at both the University of Denver and the University of Rochester, where she partnered with organizations like RISE Colorado (Aurora, CO) the Ibero-American Action and League (Rochester, NY) to understand and ensure equitable educational opportunities for Latinx/o/a immigrant and refugee communities.

As a first-generation, Mexican American college student, she draws on her own experiences with her family to connect with the sources of support that first-generation, families of color offer their students in the transition to college. Her numerous publications focus on equity and inclusion efforts to better serve Latinx/a/o students, and their families and communities, including her 2017 book: *Funds of Knowledge in Higher Education: Honoring Students' Cultural Experiences and Resources as Strengths* (published by Routledge: Taylor & Francis Group).

Dr. Kiyama received the Outstanding Faculty Award in 2016 from the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators - Latino/a Knowledge Community, and the 2014 Association for the Study of Higher Education – Council on Ethnic Participation Mildred García Exemplary Scholarship Award. She is a three-time graduate of the University of Arizona, earning her bachelors, masters, and PhD from UArizona, and a proud former participant of both the New Start Summer Program and TRiO Student Support Services. Honored Award

Faculty Research

Dr. Eugene Garcia Professor Emeritus, College of Education, Arizona State University

Dr. Eugene García served as the Vice President for Education Partnerships at Arizona State University (ASU), from 2006-2011. From 2002-2006, he was the Dean of the Mary Lou Fulton College of Education on the Tempe campus of ASU. Before joining ASU, he served as Professor and Dean of the Graduate School of Education at the University of California, Berkeley from 1995-2001. He received his B.A. from the University of Utah in Psychology and his Ph.D. in Human Development from the University of Kansas. He has served as a Post-Doctoral Fellow in Human Development at Harvard University and as a National Research Council Fellow. He has been a recipient of a National Kellogg Leadership Fellowship and received numerous academic and public honors. He served as a faculty member at the University of Utah, the University of California, Santa Barbara, Arizona State University and the University of California, Santa Cruz. He has served previously as a national research center director, an academic department chair on two occasions, and as dean of the Social Sciences Division at University of California, Santa Cruz.

Dr. García is involved in various community activities and has served as an elected member of an urban school board. He has published extensively in the area of language teaching and bilingual development authoring and/or co-authoring over 150 articles and book chapters along with 14 books and monographs. He holds leadership positions in professional organizations and continues to serve in an editorial capacity for psychological, linguistic and educational journals and serves regularly as a proposal panel reviewer for federal, state and foundation agencies. He served as a Senior Officer in the U.S. Department of Education from 1993-1995. He is conducting research in the areas of effective schooling for linguistically and culturally diverse student populations funded by the National Science Foundation and has Chaired the National Task Force on Early Education for Hispanics funded by the Foundation for Child Development. His books include, Hispanic Education in the United States: Raíces y Alas, and, Student Cultural Diversity: Understanding and Meeting the Challenge, and, Teaching and Learning in two Languages.

Dr. Ramona N. Mellott Dean, College of Education and Professor of Educational Psychology

Northern Arizona University

Dr. Ramona Mellott's 32+ year tenure at Northern Arizona University (NAU) began as an Assistant Professor of Educational Psychology in the College of Education (COE) in 1991, shortly after completing her doctoral degree at the University of Southern Mississippi in Counseling Psychology. Prior to 1986, she resided in Mumbai, India where she earned a bachelor's degree in psychology in 1982 followed by a master's degree in educational psychology in 1984 at the University of Bombay (now renamed Univ. of Mumbai). After nine years as a faculty member at NAU, she moved into administration as the Chair of Educational Psychology from 2000 to 2007. She then became the first full-time dean of the Graduate College from 2007-2014 before moving into her current position as the Dean of the College of Education and for the past 9 years she has led the college in developing innovative solutions to many of the challenges facing education.

From Dr. Mellott's early days as an assistant professor in the NAU College of Education to her current role as Dean, she has been involved at all levels of P-20 education and worked through the various state level policy changes and challenges facing our state. Her research interests in education lie in examining psychological characteristics of pre-service teachers and in teacher retention which led to the establishment of Grow Your Own (GYO) partnerships that address many of the challenges facing the teaching profession including attracting racially and ethnically diverse individuals locally who represent the students they teach. GYO programs also address teacher shortages experienced by school districts in urban, rural, and Indian communities as well as certain specialty areas (e.g., STEM, Special Education).

When the Arizona Teachers Academy (ATA) program was first announced in 2017, Dr. Mellott worked diligently to establish this program from the ground up and with university funding, she successfully launched the initial ATA@NAU program to serve students in Arizona's rural and statewide programs. With generous state funding for the last four years, NAU now supports over 1,000 future teachers at NAU through ATA for over 7 million dollars. Dr. Mellott's passion for supporting students and providing access to education is also reflected in her work to raise money for student scholarships.

From 2015 – 2023, the total amount of scholarships awarded to students in COE almost tripled with significant increases in the number of students receiving awards.

More recently, Dr. Mellott worked closely with university and college partners to launch a high-quality Early Childhood Learning and Development Center for preschoolers to serve NAU students, employees, and community members. As the Principal Investigator for Arizona GEAR UP program, she supports a team in helping Arizona advance equity by helping middle and high school students prepare for post-secondary options and have access to higher education.

As Graduate Dean at NAU, Dr. Mellott was responsible for the development of Professional Science Master's programs and the accelerated bachelor's/master's programs (3+2/4+1). She also guided the efforts of the graduate student organization towards independence and creating the Graduate Student Government, assisted with a robust professional development program and awards for graduate assistants, and launched the Three-minute Research Program (3MRP).

Dr. Mellott has held many leadership roles on national associations and a school board. She is currently a member of the Governor's task force on Teacher Retention. She was recently elected to the Board of Directors for the Association of State and Provincial Psychology Boards. Since 2006, she has served and continues to serve in a governor appointed position on the Arizona Board of Psychologist Examiners that helps to regulate the profession of psychologists and behavior analysts. As Graduate Dean, she served in an elected position on the Governing Board of the Council of Graduate Schools in 2012 and in various capacities on the board for the Western Association of Graduate Schools (WAGS) and ultimately as President of WAGS in 2012-13. She also served on the National Professional Science Master's Association Governing Board. Dr. Mellott received the Distinguished Mentor Award by the Arizona Psychological Association in 2009, and in 2020 she was recognized as a Fellow by the Association of State and Provincial Psychology Boards for her work certification, and regulation in licensing, of psychologists in Arizona.

Professer Alberto "Tito" Rios

Regents Professor Arizona State University Arizona Poet Laureate

Alberto Álvaro Ríos, born in Nogales, Arizona, is the author of ten books and chapbooks of poetry, three collections of short stories, and a memoir about growing up on the border, called Capirotada. The memoir won the Latino Literary Hall of Fame Award and was selected as the OneBookArizona 2009 selection. After graduating from Nogales High School in 1970, he went to the University of Arizona, which recently honored him with the University of Arizona 2010 Outstanding Alumnus Award. Ríos began teaching at Arizona State University in 1982, where he is currently a Regents' Professor where he holds the further distinction of the Katharine C.

Turner Endowed Chair in English.

Ríos has been a finalist for the National Book Award, and is the recipient of the Walt Whitman Award, the most prestigious award for a first book of poetry in this country. Among his many accolades, he is also the recipient of the lifetime Western Literature Association Distinguished Achievement Award, the PEN/Beyond Margins Award, the Arizona Governor's Arts Award, fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation and the National Endowment for the Arts, the Western States Book Award for Fiction, six Pushcart Prizes in both poetry and fiction, and inclusion in The Norton Anthology of Modern Poetry, as well as over 300 other national and international literary anthologies. His work is regularly taught and translated, and has been adapted to dance and both classical and popular music. He has written the libretto for the Arizona

Centennial Song, called "Turquoise and Thunderstorm," and his public art poems can be seen across the valley, including "Words Over Water," a project surrounding the Tempe Town Lake, featured on PBS. He has been designated an "Arizona HistoryMaker" by the Arizona Historical League and an "Arizona Literary Treasure" by the Arizona Humanities Council.

Natalie Diaz was born and raised in Fort Mojave Indian Village in Needles, California, on the banks of the Colorado River. Diaz is Mojave and an enrolled member of the Gila River Indian Tribe. She is the author of When My Brother Was an Aztec (Copper Canyon Press), winner of the American Book Award, and Postcolonial Love Poem (Graywolf Press), winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Poetry and finalist for the national Book Award and Forward Prize. Diaz has been awarded a MacArthur Foundation Fellowship, Lannan Foundation Literary Fellowship,

Native Arts and Culture Fellowship, and both Princeton University Holmes National Poetry Prize and Hodder Fellowship. She is Professor at Arizona State University where she Directs the Imagination Center for in the Borderlands and is the Maxine and Jonathan Marshal Chari in the Modern and Contemporary Poetry. She is the youngest ever elected Chancellor of the Academy of American Poets, a member of the Board of Trustees for the United States Artist, where she is an alumna of the Ford Fellowship and is currently a Mellon Foundation Presidential Fellow.

Dr. William Yslas Velez

Professor Emeritus of Mathematics and University Distinguished Professor, Director Mathematics Center, University of Arizona

I was born in Tucson, Arizona and grew up in the nurturing embrace of the Spanishspeaking part of town. My parents were both born in Sonora, Mexico. Education was heavily emphasized in our home: My mother worked three jobs in order to send us to Catholic schools, through high school. All of my brothers earned their degrees from The University of Arizona and our career paths, though much different, have focused on educating the community.

I earned all of my degrees from The University of Arizona, completing my doctoral degree in mathematics in 1975. Between undergraduate and graduate school, from 1968-1970, I served aboard the aircraft carriers, USS Yortown and USS Kearsarge in the US Navy. I made two tours to Vietnam while on board these two ships. My research interests have been in number theory and algebra. My first position after completing my doctoral studies was as a member of the technical staff at Sandia National Laboratories in Albuquerque, NM, where I worked on the Command and Control of Atomic Weapons systems. In 1977, I returned to academia and accepted a position at the University of Arizona. I currently hold the rank of Professor of Mathematics and University Distinguished Professor.

I have always been interested in the ways that mathematics is applied and for four summers, beginning in the late 1980s, I worked at the Naval Ocean Systems Center in San Diego, CA, where I worked on communication systems for submarines. I was a Program Officer at the National Science Foundation, where I directed the Algebra and Number Theory Program in 1992-93. I am a Founding Member of the Society for the Advancement of Chicanos and Native Americans in Science and served as President of this organization from 1994-96. I served as the Director of the NSF funded Southwest Regional Institute in Mathematical Sciences from 1994-99.

I am currently the Associate Head for Undergraduate Affairs in the mathematics department and Director of the Math Center. My focus is to increase the number of students majoring in mathematics and also to increase diversity among our undergraduate mathematics majors. All of my efforts are directed towards achieving these goals. I have double number managed to the of mathematics majors, while at the same time increasing the percentage of minority mathematics majors. We currently have over 600 undergraduate mathematics majors, of whom 20% are minority.

Dr. Elena Ortiz Zuazaga Faculty Member Biosciences Phoenix College: A Maricopa Community College

Dr. Elena Ortiz grew up in San Juan, Puerto Rico, receiving an English language immersion education at St. John's School. While there she was inducted into the National Honor Society, and won an American Chemical Society High School award in Chemistry, while also competing in Math Olympiad all four years of high school.

She began her postsecondary education at the University of California, Santa Cruz, where she earned a Bachelor of Arts in Biology degree. As part of her undergraduate studies, Dr. Ortiz earned a prestigious scholarship, called the Minority Access to Research Careers (MARC) from the National Institutes of Health. She participated in research as an undergraduate, studying natural products chemistry, extracting possible medicines from marine sponges. Inducted into the Phi Beta Kappa Honor Society, Dr. Ortiz graduated with honors.

Dr. Ortiz returned to San Juan, where she received her Master of Science in Biology at the University of Puerto Rico, Rio Piedras Campus where she used mathematical models to study the evolution of caribbean orchids, learning how to use growth medium to propagate orchids from seeds. While earning her Master's, Dr. Ortiz discovered a joy in teaching, being invited by her high school chemistry teacher, Adele Gomez, to return to St. John's and teach Advanced Placement biology to juniors and seniors.

Soon after receiving her Master's Degree, Dr. Ortiz made her way to Tempe, Arizona, where she attended Arizona State University, School of Life Sciences to achieve her doctorate in PPlant Biology. While at ASU, she studied the effects of fire on the restoration ecology of desert grasslands. Her resulting dissertation described how invasive species of trees and shrubs would cause a hotter fire, possibly damaging or destroying grass seeds that had evolved for the dry climates, but not the hotter fires.

Dr. Ortiz was also involved in environmental education at ASU, through the award-winning ASU Ecology Explorers program of the Global Institute of Sustainability and Innovation. Ecology Explorers, the education component of the Central Arizona-Phoenix Long-Term Ecological Research site (CAP-LTER), assists K-12 teachers in the metropolitan area to incorporate ecology into their curriculum.

After receiving her PhD, Dr. Ortiz joined the Biosciences faculty of Phoenix College where she has advanced the curriculum of botany and environmental biology for more than 18 years. Teaching biology for non-majors, and human anatomy and physiology. Nominated for the Phoenix College Distinguished Teaching Award several times during her tenure. In addition, Dr. Ortiz is also a Maricopa County Master Gardener and a Certified Interpretive Guide volunteer at the Desert Botanical Garden and the Phoenix Zoo. She has developed several student research opportunities through National Science Foundation funded programs at Phoenix College. Over that time she has also been the faculty advisor for the Phoenix College Garden Club, turning an abandoned greenhouse and ruined plot into a community garden that consistently produces flowers, fruits and vegetables and seeds that students sell to fund the club. Recently, the Garden Club has acquired more campus area to launch the Phoenix College Pollinator Garden, where they will collaborate with the Maricopa Native Seed Library project as a demonstration garden and to supply native Sonoran desert plant seeds to the free seed library.

Dr. Ortiz is married, and has a teenage daughter.
