November Re-Cap by Matt Spielman

Last month our club pulled back the curtain on one of the tools in nearly every magician's possession, the marked card. From "nail nicks" of the old western saloons to the modern printed reader systems used today we went through how to create, read, and perform with your own marked deck.



Kicking off the night Larry Brodahl performed his friendship test routine "Match" utilizing the Gilbreath principle along a marked deck. A volunteer from the audience was brought up and given the option to choose between two identical packets of cards in red or blue. Next, they were given the chance to shuffle the packet and choose a card. One by one the cards ended up matching Larry's, proving that they were compatible enough to be friends. Larry highlighted the importance of having a gap between reading the card and revealing the card to help prevent the audience from backtracking on how the trick works and by giving you a space to inject some theater into your routine. I highly recommend reading up on the Gilbreath principle, Max Maven called it "a thing of terrifying beauty" and despite the somewhat heady math behind the scenes it can provide some great effects hidden behind a simple cut and riffle shuffle.

Next up **Trevor Groenjes** showed the entire group how to create and read your own marked deck using a safety pin to remove small sections of the back of a card. Every table was given a pre-marked card along with a brand new one to replicate the marking process. Just by making 2 small scratches we were all able to create coded clock style marks on the card to display the suit and value easily. While this method is trickier to read at a glance it is well hidden and can be used in a pinch when marked cards aren't available and you need to whip something up in a hurry. Once we were all through marveling at our newfound ability to mark a deck we split up into 3 smaller groups for the rest of the performances on deck.



Steve Lindeman was our next performer and presented our table with a pack of children's flash cards showing various objects a child might recognize. 3 people were then given the chance to choose a card from the deck and one by one Steve was able to mentally pick up cues to divine everyone's selected card. After the performance we were shown that the cards were in a stacked order and the marking on the back of the card showed which card was next in order. This method of marking is helpful when you have the deck cut for a selection leaving you with a ton of time and cover to read the card behind their selection, they can keep their card hidden all day long but the one in your possession gives it all away.

Trever Groenjes shared one of his favorite personal routines that he was hesitant to share with the group. He started off the routine by writing a prediction down on a





billet and storing it away. Next an audience member was given the chance to deal down the cards until they felt they were ready to make a selection and hold onto it. Before moving onto the next member Trevor wrote another prediction on a billet and stowed it away as well. The cards were then handed out to another audience member and dealt down into two piles, with one pile chosen the top card was selected. Trevor then revealed that his billet predictions correctly matched up to the selected cards. The method behind the trick was then taught to the group showing how a single glance at the bottom of a shuffled deck along with making billet predictions in reverse (makes sense when you know how it's done) can create a very fooling multi selection routine.



Last but certainly not least, **Jered Schaugaard** performed a routine at our table that gave the audience a chance to feel what its like to be a magician. A volunteer was given a deck of cards to freely shuffle and split into two parts. Next the volunteer and **Jered** each selected half of the deck and picked a single card before shuffling it back into their halves and swapping them with each other. Showing how easy it was for a trained magician. Jered quickly found the volunteers selected card and displayed it to the group.

The spotlight was then on the audience member as they chose a card, Jered then loudly told the group what his

selected card was before flipping over the card showing an exact match. The method to the routine was easy and impromptu, all that was required was the ability to read the two cards chosen by the audience and you leave them with a great sense of what it feels like to perform a great magic trick.

At the end of the night, we were given 4 great routines showcasing the range and power of a marked deck along with the training to create our own marked deck when needed. Trevor also brought out his collection of marked decks showing the wide variety of coded and reader marked systems to give us a good idea of the options available on the market and how you can utilize them for various routines. Thank you to all of our volunteers for providing well thought out routines for the group and to everyone behind the scenes for making our monthly meetings a possibility.


But this is not the only exciting announcement for our *Discover Magic* program...

If, like me, you enjoy performing effects where you are not claiming to be the prime mover behind making the magic happen, then you need to learn how to properly react to your effects. I see this bungled far too often, and it's something I used to not be very good at myself because it was something I failed to think about.

Then, one night, I was at a bar in NYC and a guy I was there with had one of those pens that tips over after a while. He balanced the pen on the mouth of a beer bottle and said to one of the girls who was with us, "I want you to concentrate and send your energy to that pen." Now, that's fine. It's not some great presentation by any means, and I have my own thoughts on *Spectator as Magician/Mentalist* that this doesn't really align with, but that's a post for another day.

So, this girl looks at the pen, nothing happens, the guy says "really concentrate," she continues looking and the pen falls. Her mouth drops open and she turns to the guy and he kind of smirks and raises an eyebrow. And her reaction immediately changed. She pointed at him and said in a sing-songy voice, "That's a good one."

I watched her go from thinking something crazy had just happened to knowing it was a trick, just based on this guy's reaction. Or lack thereof. That's the point: You have to react. If you are playing the part of the traditional magician then feel free to play it cool after the effect.



But if you're rejecting that role and instead, you're showing them some strange object you found, or trying some experiment you read about, or doing something where *they* are manifesting the power, then you **NEED** to react, or the whole experience falls apart. Not reacting is just another way of saying, "That was me. I did that. I'm special." If that's your plan, just take credit for it from the beginning. That's a lot less scuzzy than this route which amounts to, "I'm going to put the focus on you [or some external thing] to capture your attention, but then when we're done, I'm going to take the credit for it."

Whatever experience you're creating, if you're not taking direct responsibility for it, then it has to move you too. Why would you show someone something if the outcome of that thing had no affect on you?











