

INVITED BY CANADIAN BROADCASTING TO PERFORM ON CHRISTMAS SHOWS FOR THE TROOPS. AT ONE POINT ON THE TOUR, THEY ASKED IF I WOULD LIKE TO DO A SHOW FOR A GROUP OF INUITS [ESKIMOS]. We were on the edge of this little town in the wilderness, 400 miles from the North Pole, and about 60 below zero. I set up my show in a little building, and the Inuits came in to watch. They sat on the floor in their parkas, and I did what I thought was some pretty good stuff. They just sat there, didn't smile, didn't say a word and, at the end, nobody applauded. But they were completely focused on me, like I was some sort of phenomenon. Only one of them spoke English, so I asked him, "Did you like the show?"

"Yes, we like the show," he said.

THEN I ASKED, "DID EVERYBODY LIKE THE MAGIC?"

HE SAID, "THE MAGIC?"

I EXPLAINED THAT I WAS TRYING TO ENTERTAIN PEOPLE.

HE SAID, "ENTERTAINMENT IS GOOD, BUT WHY ARE YOU DOING MAGIC? THE WHOLE WORLD IS MAGICAL..." WE SAT DOWN ON THE FLOOR AND HE TOLD ME "IT'S MAGIC THAT SNOW FALLS, ALL THOSE LITTLE CRYSTALS ARE COMPLETELY DIFFERENT... THAT'S MAGIC."

I SAID, "BUT WHAT ABOUT WHEN I MADE THE RABBIT AND DOVES APPEAR?" "Why do you do those things?" He said. "It's magic when the walrus Appears each spring, he comes from Nowhere... that's magic."

Now, I was grasping, trying to explain magic to him. I thought of my "Zombie," which I thought was my best thing. I said, "I made that beautiful silver ball float in the Air... that's magic."

"But there's a ball of fire floating through the sky every day. It keeps us warm, gives us light... that's magic."

Then the Inuits started talking among themselves. The man came to me with a big smile on his face, and said, "Now, we know why you're doing that. It's because your people have forgotten the magic. You're doing it to remind them of the magic. Well done!"

I CRIED RIGHT THEN. I'VE NEVER TOLD ANYONE THIS STORY. I SAID, "THANK YOU FOR TEACHING ME ABOUT THE MAGIC. I DIDN'T KNOW." THAT WAS REALLY THE FIRST TIME I KNEW WHAT WONDER WAS. IT WAS THE MOST MEMORABLE THING THAT HAS EVER HAPPENED TO ME. I NEVER FORGOT THAT, INSIDE. THAT'S WHY I BECAME A MAGICIAN.

The Wondrous Years of Douglas James Henning

Does first paid show for a friend's birthday party. At 14, has "The Great Hendoo" business cards printed. Places an ad in the local paper:

"Magician, Have Rabbit, Will Travel." As a teenager, Doug attends meet-ings of Toronto's famed Hat and Rabbit Club, is seen at Abbott's Get-Togethers and Wisconsin's Houdini Club Conventions, and for a year, edits "The Zombie" youth-magicians section of the Hade-E-Gram.

in Toronto with plans to get a degree in psychology and intentions to continue studies at medical school. Doug books his "Magic-A-Go-Go," a show taken to Barbados during spring break, into the Yorkville coffee pouses of Toronto. "During college, I was making as much as \$5,000 a year," Doug would later tell a *New York Times* reporter. "In addition to night clubs, I did Rotary Club stag stuff in a tuxedo. You know, they'd have a belly dancer, a bad pianist, a terrible comedian — and me.

Born May 3, Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada. His father, an airline pilot, receives a promotion and the family moves to Oakville, Ontario, a suburb of Toronto.

1947

Finds the usual library books on magic. Makes props from cardboard, tin cans, and construction paper. Talks parents into buying a magic kit.

1961

At six years old, he watches a magician on The Ed Sullivan Show float a young lady in mid-air. When he asks his mother how it's done, she tells him, "That's magic." Doug is hooked.

High school-assembly show was promoted with a publicity shot of Doug levitating his younger sister Nancy.

After an invitation from the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation to perform Christmas shows for troops stationed "400 miles from the North Pole," Doug returns home and abandons plans for medical school. He desires to create an artistic magic act.

The Henning Formula: magic + theater = art

With this thesis, Doug applies for a Canadian Council Grant, governmental funding traditionally awarded to musicians, singers, dancers, painters, and playwrights. Upon receiving a rejection letter stating "Magic is not a fine art," he travels to Montreal, where he performs, thus convincing a skeptical panel of the Canadian Council to grant him \$4,000 to pursue the study of magic as an art. Impressed with the success of the rock musical *Hair*, Doug convinces college friend Ivan Reitman [pictured below] to co-produce a "rock concert of illusion"...to be called *Spellbound*. Doug borrows \$5,000 from his mother to buy the mostly-used illusions. Ivan gets a starving musician friend to write the songs. They stage a backer's audition and raise \$40,000.

After Henning completes his apprenticeship with The Professor, in his March 1972 column in *Genii*, Vernon writes: "I predict that if he keeps up with his present schedule of study and dedication, Doug

Henning will be a great success in magic, and he will help magic itself

After eight months of rehearsal, a last-minute show cancellation allows them to open at the Royal Alexandra Theatre in Toronto. *Spellbound* wins critical acclaim, audiences love Doug, and the two-week run breaks all box-office records for the theater, including *Hair* and *Godspell*. New York producers Edgar Lansbury and Joe Berun see the show, and negotiations begin for Broadway. On May 28, The Magic Show opens at the Cort Theatre in New York City.

The show not only becomes a four-and-a-half-year Broadway fixture for theater-goers, it establishes the first international celebrity of magic since Houdini. And, perhaps of greater historical significance, The Magic Show with Doug Henning ushers in a glorious new age for magic and its renaissance as a wondrous performing art.





Doug takes off from The Magic Show for two months and, with the latest from his TV special and the best of the Broadway show, tours colleges with Illusion & Reality.



Magic's new superstar finally leaves The Magic Show and, in October, moves to Los Angeles to begin work on a second special. In December, Doug Henning's World of Magic II airs, again live, on NBC.



On December 13, Doug Henning's World of Magic III airs. The hyped illusion on this one is "Walking Through A Brick Wall," and immedi-ately following the broadcast, a con-tract is negotiated with NBC for three more one-hour shows.

On December 14, Doug Henning's World of Magic IV airs. Because the theme, "A Magical Journey Through Time," presents so many technical problems, this is the last special broadcast live.



Doug shows up in New York City when the 50th anniversary SAM Convention honors Dai Vernon, then celebrating his 84th birthday.



Henning hits the road again with his twohour World of Magic show. Among the 54 major United States and Canadian cities played, the tour includes lengthy engagements at the Sahara in Reno and the Las Vegas Hilton. Doug becomes the first magica


On February 15, there's a broadcast of the fifth special, which was taped at the Las Vegas Hilton.










Henning embarks on another major tour of North America, ending up December 11 in New York City. Booked into the Lunt-Fontanne Theatre for a month, Doug Henning's World of Magic is held over an additional month, making this his third show on Broadway.

Word is out that he's leaving magic. After the conference in India, Doug is convinced that his accepts a full-time position with Maharishi Veda Land Inc., developing concepts for an amuse-ment park with themes of enlightenment, knowledge, and entertainment.





Announcement is made for future locations of Maharishi Veda Land. Press releases tell of options on prime real estate near Walt Disney World in Orlando, Florida; a site near Niagara Falls in Toronto, Canada; and a large tract of land outside Kyoto, Japan.

IN HIS WORDS After a twelve year absence from the mag scene. Doug talks about his future, as well as his past — revealing things 'I never had a chance to tell anybudy about.

In August, David Charvet suggests an interview to let the magic world know what Doug's up to. Readers of the October issue of *MAGIC* learn that Henning is indeed back to performing, but only as part of his fund-raising efforts for the University of World Peace. He also gives information concerning his career that "I never had a chance to tell anybody about."



As senior vice-president of Maharishi's Natural Law Party (founded on a belief that world peace is possible through the power of Group TM), Doug becomes a NLP candidate in England's general election. He finishes last among four candidates.


In the '93 Canadian elections, Doug runs as NLP candidate from Rosedale, Ontario, Canada, where he works on the planning of Veda Land Canada. Out of 55,928 votes cast, he gets 839.





In June, there are reports of Henning sightings in magic shops in Toronto, New York, Chicago, and Hollywood. He lets some of his old friends know that he's shut down the Veda Land offices in Holland and is moving to Los Angeles.
