

Gypsy Thread

Have you ever considered adding the classic Gypsy Thread to your magic repertoire?

This beautiful illusion makes it appear as though the strands of broken thread fuse back together in slow motion right before the spectator's eyes.

This month the workings of that effect are explained in the new online video added to our club library.



Buried on one of **Pavel's** older VHS tapes is a rope through body that I have found stunning to an audience.

Rope Through Body

You'll need two pieces of rope slightly longer than your two arms held extended out from your sides. Take a look at the rope you can find at Hobby Lobby in the sewing section. I find it very suitable for magic.

The first piece of rope secretly encircles your waist as though you're going to tie it in back. Instead, you're going to hide the rope under the waist of your pants with the two ends slightly protruding from the middle of your pants in the back with a gap between the ends.



During performance, the other piece of rope is coiled up and put behind your back as though you were going to tie it in the front. I always do two false starts in which this rope does not pass through my body.

The third time I take the rope around my back – ditching this rope in the middle of and under my pant's waist - bringing the two ends from the other rope around my body from both sides.

When I pull on those two ends, it looks the world as though the piece of rope melted through my body. Very realistic.

What's your Magic Story? by Patrice Fisher


Creating Magic

Even at the early age of seven years old, **Theron Christensen** was drawn to the art and science of creating magic. In one of the first magic shows he ever attended, Theron was fascinated by a powerful performance of the Zombie Ball illusion and set out to make one of his own. It must have seemed like an eternity to get home that day, but it did give him time to think: if he took a wiffle ball, attached a wire to it, and covered the whole thing with a dish towel, perhaps the effect could be duplicated. With a little imagination and lots of determination, it worked! This first act of reverse engineering helped cultivate his life-long desire to create his own magic.



Creating new magic is challenging. Creativity is complicated. Some say creativity is a trait that can't be learned but is inherent to the individual; that creativity is more a process of self-discovery for those elect few who were lucky enough to be born with the trait. Others adopt a more optimistic view that creativity is a

skill that can be learned, practiced, and improved by anyone willing to try it, and Theron subscribes to this philosophy. He started with the question, where do magicians get an idea for a new magical effect? Nothing in nature happens magically—magic is not natural. So, where can magicians get inspiration for creating something that doesn't exist? Convinced that there *was* a methodology, he began reading books written by other magicians who also wanted to better understand the creative process. Maskelyne and Devant, S.H. Sharpe, Dariel Fitzkee, and Darwin Ortiz were just a few of the experts he consulted. This research, along with his own experience as a magician, culminated in Theron writing his own book on the subject.



Plotting Astonishment: The Performing Magician's Guide to Creating Original Magic is his finished attempt to answer the question of what inspires magicians to create what is seemingly impossible. The book provides a framework for creativity by which the reader can develop ideas for novel and meaningful pieces of magic. Among other things, Theron outlines five different exercises to generate ideas for new magic. These exercises utilize strategies such as building on forgotten effects and finding inspiration from interesting objects. He emphasizes the importance of focusing on the spectators before getting immersed in an idea. After all, the main objective of the performance is the entertainment value for the audience.

Clearly, imagination is a key trait for a magician. One commonality among those learning magic is that, before we throw something away, we generally take a close look at it and ask ourselves, "Can I use this in my magic?" Theron's book gives insights and practical exercises to develop that type of mentality and to push your own creativity forward. By attempting to delineate the creative process, Theron's book provides tools to trigger inspiration for those passionate about creating their own unique brand of magic.



COSTUMING

-Communicating Character-

Try this experiment the next time you watch a late-night talk show!

Turn off the sound for at least half the show!

With no sound, you'll be able to focus your attention on the host's selection of clothing. Check below all that you can learn about him from his clothes.



Once you start making that list, it's amazing how much we do learn about a person's personality from the way they dress.

Now repeat this same experiment for several different evenings to observe how much s/he varies his/her attire.

You'll probably discover a definite pattern to his clothing choices!

Like an actor wears a costume to enhance the character they play, the talk show host wears his clothing to strengthen the persona he has decided to project. His/her costuming serves as an extension of his character development.

What do you think the following combinations communicate about the personality of the one wearing them?

Suit or no suit?

Double breasted suit or single-breasted suit? Long skirt, mid-length or short skirt?

Skirt or pants?

Skirt and blouse, dress, or suit?

Bright color, dark color or earth tone? Sports coat or suit?

Tie or open shirt?

Short sleeve shirt or long-sleeved shirt? White shirt or colored shirt?

Plain shirt or patterned shirt?

This chapter assumes you have already defined the character you wish to portray.

If people could turn the sound off on you as a magician, what would just your clothes reveal about yourself?



Is it the image you want?

The Year in Review - 2021


January - David Fox, Larry Brodahl and Jered






